Dan Rasmus introduced today's program highlighting the work done in the community by several non-profits. The Rotary Club of Sebastopol supports these groups and the program was to give an update on various projects.

The first speaker was from the *Ceres Community Project*. The Ceres project trains youth to prepare nutritious meals. The meals are then delivered by volunteers to mainly seniors who have suffered health setbacks. These meals are often specifically designed for those with special dietary needs.



<u>Deborah Ramelli</u> is the Community Director for Ceres. Also with her was <u>Alisa Gibbs. Deborah</u> has spent many years with Ceres. She noted that Ceres began right there in Memorial Hall of the Sebastopol Community Church kitchen. They have since expanded to three locations. Teens learn about growing food, harvesting food and preparing food in the Ceres kitchens. In 2020, Ceres delivered over 180,000 meals to over 1500 clients. The Ceres motto is "Nobody's perfect, but everyone can be awesome."

The next community representative was Ricardo Freitas. Ricardo is the head honcho at the Ives Pool.

Ives Pool is where the Rotary Club of Sebastopol teaches second graders to swim every year at the Learn to Swim Program. It is also the home of many swim teams, adult swim, water polo competitions, and **Greg Jacobs**. Not really, he doesn't live there. Does he?

A quick photo of **Greg** was flashed on screen and it turns out that **Greg** is now so old, they have to replace the picnic tables that he sat on as a young man. The Rotary Club of Sebastopol is kicking in some community funding to help with the table project.



The final representative was <u>Katy Davis</u>. <u>Katy</u> is the Executive Director of the *Sebastopol Senior Center*. The Center is in an old house that was rehabbed into a Center. The Rotary Club of Sebastopol has given a major assist in some of the updating and upgrading work in recent days. <u>Katy</u> gave a specific shout out to **Jim Pacatte** for his hard work around the place.



The Senior Center provides a meeting place and classes for area Seniors including Zoom Classes. Covid required major rethinking of how the services were delivered but the Senior Center never stopped. Tai Chi is really popular these days and the Center is very grateful to our Club for the new flooring.

The Center now has a new food venue "The Harvest Café" serving lunch on Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday. They are hoping for a major kitchen remodel and an expansion of service. <u>Katy</u> is also working on a HOP program. HOP stands for "Helping Other People" and

offers volunteer opportunities to help seniors with minor projects around the house to enable them to stay in their homes.



President Ellen Harrington thanked our guests and noted that the Club will make a donation to the Overcoming Obstacles scholarship fund in their names. Then she rang the bell.

Henry Kaku, a third generation Japanese American, will be speaking to our club on Asian Hate Crimes dating back from WWII to present day.

His entire family was incarcerated during WWII for 4 years. At the end of the War, they were deported and had their US Citizenship taken away because Henry's Father spoke out against being sent to Prison. When Henry was born in Japan, he was Stateless. He became US Citizen in 1956 when his family was reinstated

as US Citizens.

Henry graduated from SJSU with a degree in Psychology. He was a High School teacher/Counselor as well as a Human Resource Director in Banking for 30 years. Currently, Henry is a Substitute Teacher and Martial Arts and Origami Instructor in Petaluma.
