Keller "Birdman of Rotary" McDonald led a flock of avian loving Rotarians last week to the marshlands of Petaluma. Highlights of the morning were Virginia Rail (heard, not seen), Common Gallinule, Great-tailed Grackle, barn owls in nest box, male marsh hawk, pair of white-tailed kites, Northern shoveler, and marsh wren (heard). Least bittern was seen there on Sunday, but not by us ... It's a nice birding spot. We'll return in the fall when the migrants are there.

As mentioned earlier, **Greg Jacobs** introduced the Roto-flock to Terry and Joan Dale, major benefactors of the Learn to Swim program. Terry wished to share this at Friday's meeting: "The Center for Disease Control and Prevention reports that drowning is the leading cause of death in children 1-4 years old. Is is the second leading cause in children 1-14 years old after motor vehicle crashes. Nationwide, there are approximately 4000 fatalities and 8,000 hospitalizations annually.

Swimming lessons teach children how to swim, but perhaps more importantly, it teaches water safety. The Sebastopol Rotary is to be commended for supporting this program, which is unquestionably a vital service for the children of our community.

As trustees, of the Neil and Amelia McDaniel Charitable Trust, we are proud to partner with Rotary to sponsor this essential program for the Sebastopol Community.

We also want to acknowledge and commend the work of **Greg Jacobs** and all the volunteers who do the heavy liftin; without their unwavering support, the program would not be feasible".



After a great lunch, the group was ready to trek the few hundred feet to Georgetown.

In 1953, after many years in old Hollywood, **Guy Smith's** father <u>George Smith</u> moved the family to this ranch adjacent to and sometimes underneath the Laguna De Santa Rosa. George spent years providing cars, carriages and other rolling stock to the Hollywood studios and he amassed a large collection.



<u>George</u>, **Guy** and the rest of the Smith clan set about building an Old West town complete with saloon, grocery, barber shop, and several, several garages for the vehicles. <u>George</u> found Victorian gingerbread decorations on various tear downs in the Santa Rosa area and grabbed them up. He enhanced the Old West look of the buildings with boardwalks and decorative elements.

Each building is packed with vehicles, signage, and artifacts of all kinds. The *American Pickers* television show once paid a visit and didn't know where to begin. Vehicles include Model Ts, Model As, multiple Rolls Royces, a buggy used in *Gone with the Wind,* an armored car, a classic Lincoln Continental (the car <u>George</u> drove), **Guys** old race car and others. The Saloon is something out of the Hollywood movie reel, ready for a poker game and some red-eye.





<u>George</u> passed away a few years back and Georgetown became property of the family. **Guy** loves to show it off and talk about Old Hollywood. **Guy** became good friends with <u>Fred MacMurray</u> and his family. He remembers <u>Fred</u> setting up his easel by the side of the road to paint and arguing about prices in the Forestville Hardware. **Guy** said that <u>George</u> spent his retirement years in Georgetown, working all morning around the place, then relaxing in the room above the saloon in the afternoon, usually with a Dutch Masters cigar. <u>George</u> was a visionary and an eccentric. And aren't those the best kind of people?



**Guy** took the group out into the Laguna de Santa Rosa. It is a peaceful spot full of wildlife and plant life. Most people aren't aware of this ecological treasure right in the backyard.

Everyone thanked Guy for letting us have a meeting at Georgetown.

# COMMUNITY SERVICE - HARRY POLLEY, DIRECTOR:

ANNUAL MAJOR FUNDRAISER (**J.T. Martin**, Event Chair; Committee Chair, TBD) - The good news is I am back from my 20day exploration of the Great State of Alaska. Truly it is the "Last Frontier," and I had a wonderful time. The bad news is both Teresa and I have Covid. We are OK but are on day five and still testing positive. However, I only have remnants of symptoms remaining, and am well enough to report.

I have been thinking fundraiser ever since I discovered I will be the Pres next year. Then I found out that I can start fundraising this year. This is really great news for me because I know I will be too busy for fundraising if I am "Presidenting" (sic). So, this is what I want to do if it works out and is OK with everyone else who is involved on the board and committee. Please share this with **Pres Hal** and the committee members on the ninth because I probably cannot make that meeting.

I will be DIRECT. First, I would like to use music as a re-occurring theme for my presidency. I would like to do "A BLUESMAN COMES TO TOWN" musical concert in Ive's Park late in May or early in June with Tommy Castro and the Painkillers as headliner. I would like event proceeds to go toward upgrading the Ive's Park existing bathrooms or new ones, perhaps even having a shower component like the Doran Campground. **Rick Wilson** and I have tickets to Castro's concert in Nicasio later this month where we will approach him. **Rick** has promoted him before and is personal friend with his bass player, <u>Randy MacDonald</u>. We tried to email him earlier this summer but got no response. We were not sure of email address, and we wanted to hear from the horse's mouth first before going through the booking agent. Tommy Castro is hot right now. I have seen him twice in the last 3 months. He won the 2022 BB King Entertainer of the Year Award, Blues Band of the Year Award, and Blues Album of the Year Award. He has 5 Grammy's. He has a big following! His new album is "A BLUESMAN CAME TO TOWN."

Because I have been away, I have not completed all my homework. Before <u>Linda Collins</u> at the Chamber of Commerce retires in another month, I need to talk to her about her about AppleBlossom attendance numbers. I want to talk to <u>Jim</u> <u>Corbett</u> about attendance at his free concerts. I want to take a look inside both bathrooms again and look at alternatives. I want to talk to the city.

I know it is not my job to come up with a major project for Rotary, but a Major Fundraiser gets easier if the goal is plainly in front of you. Also concert goers who have to use that bathroom may want to contribute extra. I am right now thinking \$20 advanced \$25 at the door. 1,000 people spending \$60 each on admission, food, and drink = \$60,000.

I am also thinking a big barbecue with chicken and ribs, baked beans, salad, and bread \$20. We just have to rent, borrow, and staff a lot of those portable wheeled pits. We would need a wine tent with locally donated wine and beer optimum.

Yeah, it is a lot of work for Rotarians. They have to step up. Yeah, we are old now but don't let the grey hair fool you. I am hearing that they still want to have fun. They want to do a major fundraiser. They want to make money again. They want to work together. We'll let see if they can still "cut the mustard."

This does not have to be an annual thing, like the Cajun Festival. This should be easier because stage is there, shade is there, green room sort of there. None of that dance floor, hay bales, precooking overhead to deal with or pay. Park is better, city wants utilization. Get in and get out.

I have asked **Aleia** to help, **Rick Wilson** to help, **Patti Blount**, **Cindy Carter** (I think) to help. Amee Sas will help. Ruthie and Jack Dunlap signed up to help on the committee survey. Thank you to **John Blount**, **Dave Madsen**, and **Gene Nelson** for volunteering - all energetic team members. I would also like to see if I can get **Tim Moore** and **Meredeth** to help. They would be good with the wine tent along with **Harvey** and **Ken Silveira**. **Gene** would be good for the wine tent. **Tim Moore** was president in 97 when I was on his board. He was always appreciative and proud that the 23-year Cajun Festival was incubated in his presidency.

On another fundraising note, Soon as I am back to safe mode, I would like to introduce the club to a \$100 per chance, only 100 chances raffle for a trip to Washington DC. I will need help from an artist like **Bud Daveiro**, **Paul Thielen**, and anyone else who can put a few iconic images on a board to be at the back table to be there manned until board is filled. When filled, the drawing takes place and winner is determined. The winner gets \$5,000 to go on his trip - go on another trip - not go on a trip - or pay his bills. I have an old friend living in DC for 53 years working on hotel ideas, places to stay, eat, and best, fun things to do in DC. This is just for interest's sake. Not in stone. The club makes \$5K, the winner gets \$5K. I want to go to Boston next, New York, Chicago, Charleston, Anchorage, New Orleans, Nashville. We may could have \$30-40K in our account before our major fundraiser. I am hoping that most spots will be taken by club members over a 4-week sale period so that a club member will win - although nothing wrong with a friend of Rotary winning. The board should be as hard to fill as the super bowl board. A \$100 chance to win \$5,000. Somebody is going to win.

I also would like to work on a few higher dollar live auction items if case there is an opportunity to have them.

CRAB FEED (**Cindy Carter**, Chairs) – Crab Feed will be Saturday, February 11, 2023. Just starting to kick the tires. Checking to see if the road signs will still be usable another year; a bit faded from weather. Looking at the profits from the last few years to start discussions regarding whether the 2023 event will be a drive-thru or in person. A hybrid would be very difficult to pull off. This is always a great social event and the in person is a bit more profitable which provides more money for the Mark Sell Teacher Grants. More to follow in the coming months.

COMMUNITY GRANTS (**Dorothy Rodella, Cindy Carter**, Co-Chairs) – No update this month. This committee does not begin its work until December

COMMUNITY NEEDS SUMMIT (TBD, Chair) – Still working on finding someone to accept the committee chair position.

COMMUNITY VOLUNTEER PROJECTS (**Mia Del Prete**, Chair) -- **Mia Del Prete** has accepted the chair position. The following report was put together by last year's chair, **Cindy Carter**, **Community Volunteer Projects**:

1) Redwood Empire Food Bank (REFB) - joint workday with the sunrise club - was held on Wednesday, July 27, 2022, from 2-4pm. **Mark Fink** and **Gene Nelson** were there and bagged carrots, carrots, and more carrots.

2) A HOP workday was held on Saturday July 23, 2022. Helping Other People (HOP) is a program run by the Sebastopol Area Senior Center, which invites seniors who have small projects they cannot do themselves to submit requests to the Center for help. The Sebastopol Service and Action Coalition, of which we are a part, volunteered to respond to as many of the requests as possible. **Ellen Harrington** pruned all the rose bushes for a senior and then trained him on how to trim and fertilize them. His wife passed away a few years ago and she loved her roses and now he can take care of them himself in the future and continue to enjoy them. **Gene Nelson** and **Cindy Carter** helped a senior with clearing and cleaning her front porch & back deck, cleaning solar panels, and power washing siding.

3) Gravenstein Apple Fair - 25 of the 52 volunteer slots have been filled by our club members for the August 13 and 14 event. Farm Trails increased the stipend from \$2k to \$3k so our club will see approximately \$1,442 for this event and all the volunteers will receive a two-day pass to the fair, food, drinks, an apron, and other perks. Plus, there should be a bit of Rotary advertising at the event.

4) Walk to End Alzheimer's - just kicking off our club's participation in this event to be held Saturday, October 8, 2022, at Sonoma State University. All club members can help with fundraising and volunteer to walk. The walk is designed for everyone and includes a very short route (less than a mile), or a little bit longer track (2.5 miles). Entertainment kicks off the event.

HOMELESSNESS (Jack Dunlap, Chair) – On July 15, the Homeless Committee along with members of the Sunrise Rotary Club visited the Horizon Shine safe parking village across the street from the Exchange Bank. The village is essentially full, and they are beginning to improve their organization. We asked them to think about what they need to improve their operations or facility. The committee is asking for a budget of \$500 that will allow participation with other organizations in West County in projects that help homeless reach the goal of moving to supported permanent housing.

LEARN TO SWIM (**Greg Jacobs**, Chairs) – Learn-To-Swim goes into full swing in in 1Q23. Ives Pool has been reserved for April 17 to May 12, 2023.

Working on 2022 budget, shopping for the best t-shirt prices, volunteer advertisements, and starting to approach the schools to ensure they budget for transportation, where needed.

**Greg** is inviting the Ives Pool manager <u>Ricardo Freitas</u>, and <u>Terry and Joan Dale</u>, (our benefactors), to Georgetown. He won't be able to publicly recognize them for several weeks otherwise.

MAJOR BIG PROJECT (Aleia Coate, Jack Blasco, Co-Chairs) – Committee Chairs have had one meeting with **President** Hal. Work will begin in earnest once the results of the second club survey are compiled and distributed.

MARK SELL ROTARY TEACHER GRANTS (**Patrick Dirden**, Chair) – The committee will start work on the Teacher grants program in early September. We intend to open the submission period by mid-September.

DICTIONARY PROJECT (Mark Fink, Chair) - Waiting to hear if there is a budget for the program.

ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY (**Lu Frazier**, Chairs) – So far, there are only two members on the Environmental Committee- me and **Tom Boag**. If this committee proceeds forward, I plan on concentrating on things members can do to help the environment. To that end, I am looking for speakers who can show members what they can concretely do to help the environment. I plan on asking for speakers from such organizations as Blue Barrel (rainwater catchment), Daily Acts (water conservation and more) Master Gardeners, and the Stanford and UC Berkeley Environmental Centers.

WORLD COMMUNITY SERVICE – (Keller McDonald – Chair) - Keller has worked with President Hal, David Schreibman, and <u>David Mark-Raymond from Sebastopol Sunrise</u> to partner with Sebastopol Sunrise and Rotary Clubs from Rohnert Park to support the Lone Pine Ukrainian Family Aid project to bring a Ukrainian refugee family to Sonoma County.

Sebastopol Sunrise is the lead club in a multi-club district grant to match club contributions up to \$2,200 per club. The grant application has been submitted and we are awaiting approval from Rotary District 5130.

**Keller** has researched the possibility of applying for a RI Foundation Global Grant of \$25,000 to help fund Ukrainian relief. Applicants need to have a Rotary partner in Ukraine of a neighboring country doing relief work. My recommendation is to not go after this global grant, as applications are due in early September, and we do not have an international partner, or a project developed yet. If we want to get involved, we can partner with another club in District 5130 that successfully secures this grant (e.g., clubs from Santa Rosa, Petaluma, and/or Mendocino.)

**Steve Beck** is in communication with Rotarians in Arizona who are not applying for an RI Foundation global grant for the Village Hope Corps Street Business School project. Our club allocated \$1,000 for this project last year, which is now being held in reserve until the global grant application is processed.

On August 5, I plan to report to our club on the successful completion of our baby incubator project for Chidamoyo Hospital in Zimbabwe. The incubator is getting good use and has helped several preterm babies thrive and start healthy lives.
