

President Hal responded that a committee is forming to research and recommend a major project. If such a project cannot be found, the money will be returned to the Community Projects budget.

Donald Laird - Taking Flight; The World of Drones

<u>Professor Laird</u> is Chair of the Computer Studies Department at Santa Rosa Junior College, where he has taught for 29 years. He holds an FAA Remote Pilot (drone) Certification, and has created the Drone Studies program at the JC.

First...the Good:

Drones are proving to have a bewildering number of good and helpful, even vital, uses. Modern film and video productions could hardly exist without the use of drones and the many unique angles they provide. They can provide a number of different perspectives, for example, flying both above a building and then inside of it. Even productions within the Rotary Club of Sebastopol have come to depend on drones [piloted by **Edwin Wilson** under the direction of various debunking committees – **Ed**].

Another illustration shared by Professor Laid is the contribution of drones to the enhancement and preservation of natural resources. In Costa Rica, for example, the use of drones has enabled scientists to study the return and nesting of sea turtles without having to disturb the turtles. Drones can also see underwater, enhancing the ability to study sea life. Drones can actually take water samples and transmit them for study. And no one gets wet feet!

The humanitarian uses of drones is an area that keeps expanding. In Rwanda, for example, where hospitals and doctors are few and far between and many people live in remote villages, drones can be used to deliver necessary medicines and medical supplies. How might such a use of drones impact Rotary's fight against polio? This application of drones for medical purposes is not yet approved in the United States, but the day is coming.

Drones can be used to monitor construction projects, aid in promotions, enhance public safety and on and on. Our speaker said that the use of drones will become a billion dollar business.

The Bad...

When people who are flying drones act stupidly or thoughtlessly, bad things happen. Professor Laird showed a blooper video of a number of drone failures, again more human error than equipment malfunction. Power lines, walls, trees, animals and people seem to come into contact with drones on a fairly regular basis.

The Ugly...

There are regulations, such as altitude limits, governing the use of drones. But there are reckless operators who refuse to abide by the rules. He showed video of a drone actually dive bombing a commercial aircraft. This led to a discussion of privacy. Interestingly, in the United States, air space is public. You do not own the air around your home and place of business. So, if a drone flies over your home or yard, it is not a violation of privacy. However there are trespassing and anti-harassment laws, so if a drone flies into your yard and hovers by your bedroom window, you can make use of such laws. Of course, I suspect that if a drone got a look at a number of us in the nude, it would never come back! Professor Laird pointed out that since a drone is considered an aircraft, it is as protected against attack as any plane in the sky. So think twice about blowing a troublesome drone away with that shotgun.

From public utilities to fire-fighting to health care to construction and on and on, the use of drones is expanding at a geometric rate. Thank you, <u>Professor Laird</u>, for a fascinating and entertaining program.



With that, President Hall adjourned our meeting promptly at 1:30.


President's Report for AppleKnocker for July 2022
