
President Hal Kwalwasser rang the bell at precisely 12:15 PM to officially start the September 23, 2022 meeting of the Rotary Club of Sebastopol.





And aren't there a lot of announcements? Must be a lot of things going on in West County and beyond.

What is happening in Rotary News. Just look.



President Hal was presented a plaque of Appreciation at the Aged to Perfection event on September 17 thanking our club for its good work.

Aleia Coate announced that our own Myriah Volk has been named Executive Director of the Sebastopol Chamber of Commerce. Congratulations to Myriah. President Hal levied a \$5 fine for the honor.





Our own sharp-eyed bird spotter **Keller McDonald** took the microphone to make a startling announcement. It seems that several Vaux's Swifts have been seen with regularity right in Sebastopol.

Why is this startling? Vaux's Swifts are very strange birds. They migrate this time of year going from Canada to Mexico and stop along the way to rest. But they can only stop in chimneys or smokestacks. Most years they can be seen by the thousands in Healdsburg funneling into an unused chimney. This



year some, as many as 1,500, found an unused duct at Parkside School and have been spending several nights there. Or at least stopped for a break.

Linda Irving put out the word that Swifts were in the smokestack and many residents have come out to see them at sunset circling and diving into the chimney. Thanks for letting us know **Linda**. It's a rare sight. And **Keller** says no one knows why they do this or where they go next. Probably on to Mexico.





Kathy Hicks introduced our program presenter <u>Kelly Grant</u>. <u>Kelly</u> is with New York Life but also has her own financial advising company. She also works in conjunction with AARP. <u>Kelly</u> brought us a program on Long Term Care (LTC) insurance.

Information about LTC is actually difficult to access. It is highly regulated and considered *Marketing to Seniors* which adds another layer of regulation. Complete information about LTC is not readily available on the Internet due to the regulatory environment.

Only eight companies offer Long Term Care Insurance. LTC kicks in, you might say, when one becomes so elderly that one is unable to do simple tasks that everyone takes for granted without assistance such as dressing, eating, continence, etc. When these tasks become unmanageable you can access an

insurance policy that you have taken out previously.

You can use LTC insurance to stay in your home with assistance or move to a care facility. One must keep in mind that this assistance can be expensive if there is no insurance, however it does not usually last for more than a few years. The best advice is to speak with an expert about individual needs and desires.

To get LTC insurance, a full medical workup is usually required. The older the applicant, the more expensive the premiums. Of applicants aged 70-79 about 55% are approved for LTC insurance. It is clearly an individualized decision, and one would be advised to get assistance from an expert.

October 7, 2022 - Patti Wick - Dementia Facts, Research, and the Walk to End Alzheimer's



My mom and mother-in-law both died of Alzheimer's. They were diagnosed a year apart and had the disease simultaneously for 12 years. They even ended up living in the same memory care community ten minutes from our home.

Their journeys, from the time they were diagnosed until they passed away, spanned 13 years. There were highs and lows for all of us throughout those years, but I learned incredible life lessons.

Alzheimer's can be a frightening experience...for those with the disease and for family and friends.

I learned a lot about life, laughter, and loss. But the biggest lesson was learning to live in the moment because with Alzheimer's there really is no past or future.

Nevertheless, there was always love, even if we had to learn new ways to communicate that to each other.
