#### The ABC's of Rotary

(Taken from "The ABCs of Rotary", a Rotary International publication originally prepared by Dr. Cliff Dochterman who was RI President in 1992-93)

#### #14: International Responsibilities of a Rotarian

As an international organization, Rotary offers each member unique opportunities and responsibilities. Although each Rotarian has first responsibility to uphold the obligations of citizenship of his or her own country, membership in Rotary enables Rotarians to take a somewhat different view of international affairs. In the early 1950s, a Rotary philosophy was adopted to describe how a Rotarian may think on a global basis. Here is what it said:

"A world-minded Rotarian:

- Iooks beyond national patriotism and considers himself as sharing responsibility for the advancement of international understanding, goodwill and peace;
- > resists any tendency to act in terms of national or racial superiority;
- > seeks and develops common grounds for agreement with peoples of other lands;
- defends the rule of law and order to preserve the liberty of the individual so that he may enjoy freedom of thought, speech and assembly, and freedom from persecution, aggression, want and fear;
- supports action directed toward improving standards of living for all peoples, realizing that poverty anywhere endangers prosperity everywhere;
- > Upholds the principles of justice for mankind;
- Strives always to promote peace between nations and prepares to make personal sacrifices for that ideal;
- Urges and practices a spirit of understanding of every other man's beliefs as a step towards international goodwill, recognizing that there are certain basic moral and spiritual standards which will ensure a richer, fuller life."

That is quite an assignment for any Rotarian to practice in thoughts and actions!

#### REMEMBERING ROTARIAN DON STILING



In 1986 Don decided to leave a very successful business career with Proctor and Gamble and International Paper to begin a new life as a California farmer. After considering other options he decided on viticulture and purchased 30 acres on Vine Hill Road.

Applying his well learned business skills he evaluated the grapes best suited for the climate, the potential market and crucial practices for producing premium grapes. He proceeded to plant 25 acres of chardonnay and 10 acres of pinot noir although pinot noir was not popular at the time. Customers included Darioush Gary Farrell, Simi and vineyard designate wines for Eric Kent Wine Cellars.

Don joined the Rotary Club of Sebastopol Feb 1, 1992, and attended regularly until Parkinson's disease and related dementia limited his activities. He passed away March 31, 2012.

As a Rotarian Don's barn became a convenient storage place for some of the many props and other items we need to store for our various fund raising events. Dave Madsen recalls that he also donated some home made pinot noir for the Great Getaway (for newer members this was Rotary's major fundraiser until it was replaced by the Lobster Feed). Made from some of the best pinot noir grapes in Russian River Valley it was DELICIOUS even if a little high in alcohol. Read to Me was a favorite Rotary activity for both Don and his wife Barbara.

Don was active in continuing to experiment and improve both business and viticultural practices in Sonoma County. He and his wife Barbara were awarded the 2007 Viticulture Award of Excellence from the Sonoma County Winegrape Commission (SCWC). Don served on the Boards of Directors of both the Russian River Valley Winegrowers and the Sonoma County Winegrape Commission.

Don's farming philosophy was "never assume you know everything you need to know. Always keep learning, asking questions, networking and seeking advice." He held Board positions on the Sonoma County Grape Growers Association and Russian River Valley Winegrowers.

Brad Benedetti says about Don - He was a good friend. I met Don in his early vineyard days. I had been repairing tractor tires for the Garbo Ranch when they were growing apples and continued doing Don's tire work as he transformed the ranch into a vineyard. We had many great talks about business and about the business of growing grapes.

Don let Rotary use his barn for storage. There were many cats living in the barn (and lots of rats for them to feast on) – he had named them all (the cats that is). One time Don invited Kathy and me and some other Rotarians for dinner. They had this large dog that loved to roam around the table and beg for food during dinner. Suddenly he left and later we learned he had eaten all the dip left on the coffee table. Don just laughed but said the next day the dog was very uncomfortable doing his duty.

Don was a fine example of a gentleman, a caring person, a good businessman and a great Rotarian.
