



contributing funding to the program.


program has doubled in size in just one year. Be sure to come to the meeting to find out how Solar Power Lunchboxes are made among other fascinating details.



Sebastopol Community Church card and a prize of a *Book of Rev Nelson's old sermons*. His excitement was palpable.






The Program - Mike Carey - Baseball's Early Dark Days



The Way the Game Was Meant to be Played



Speaker for the Day was Rotarian, our own **Mike Carey**, on Old Time Baseball, from around 1886. Mike, as a younger man, had an undistinguished career on the diamond but as he has gotten older and wiser, has taken up the sport again, <u>this</u> time playing by the rules of the 1880s.

Mike became interested in old style baseball while researching the famous poem "Casey at the Bat." He uncovered many interesting facts about our national pastime and started to dig deeper into the old rules and teams from years past. The original game became wildly popular during the Civil War as men from all over the country came together. It was the only sport around and considered All-American. The rules were quite different - the "feeder" (pitcher) threw underhand from 50 feet not 60 feet. It took seven balls to walk a batter (which would be just fine for Barry Zito). There were no time outs and you were required to run out foul balls. In the event of a close play, it was not unusual for the umpire to ask for the opinion of the players involved under the "Gentlemen's Rule." If the play was still not satisfactorily resolved, the umpire could ask the opinion of the spectators.

A new era of baseball popped up in the 1880s with the approval of <u>overhand pitching</u>. The <u>90 foot basepaths</u>, <u>9 inning games</u> and <u>9 player teams</u> were codified and professional teams began to form - the first being the <u>Cincinnati Redlegs</u>.

Gambling was endemic as was cheating. The Louisville professional team was banned after only two years. King Kelly became famous and infamous for his dishonest play.

There are today several organized leagues playing by the rules of the 1860s as well as the rules of the 1880s. The game is fast and exciting. Baseball gloves are really just gloves and the manliest of players won't use them. Most of the teams play in the Amador County Gold Country area but there are others in the Bay Area. It is possible to catch a game if you are interested.









The Closing Bell



President Edwin remarked that many of our clubs' best programs are presented by members and thanked **Mike Carey**, presenting him with a donation in his name to <u>The Pathway Home</u>, serving Iraq and Afghanistan vets transitioning back into society. The ABC's of Rotary

(Taken from "The ABCs of Rotary", a Rotary International publication originally prepared by Dr. Cliff Dochterman who was RI President in 1992-93)

#28: Vocational Service

Vocational Service is the second Avenue of Service. No aspect of Rotary is more closely related to each member than a personal commitment to represent one's vocation or occupation to fellow Rotarians, and to exemplify the characteristics of high ethical standards and the dignity of work. Programs of vocational service are those that seek to improve business relations while improving the quality of trades, industry, commerce, and the professions. Rotarians understand that each person makes a valuable contribution to a better society through daily activities in a business or profession.

Vocational Service is frequently demonstrated by offering young people career guidance, occupational information, and assistance in making vocational choices. Some clubs sponsor high school career conferences. Many recognize the dignity of employment by honoring exemplary service of individuals working in their communities. The 4-Way Test and other ethical and laudable business philosophies are often promoted among young people entering the world of work. Vocational talks and discussion of business issues are also typical Vocational Service programs at most clubs.

Regardless of the ways in which Vocational Service is expressed, it is the banner by which Rotarians "recognize the worthiness of all useful occupations" and demonstrate a commitment to "high ethical standards in all businesses and professions". That's why the second Avenue of Service is fundamental to every Rotary club.
