Richard Power announced that the Overcoming Obstacles Award Program of this club was recently recognized by Rotary International. (See on Page -. -Ed.)



Patti Blount announced that the Sebastopol Rotary Education Fund recently awarded over \$14,000 to fund three club projects including Read to Me, Learn to Swim, and the Dictionary program. Dictionaries are presently being distributed to local third graders.

Chris O'Neill and **Diana Rich** were thanked for their work on the recent Mystery Dinner Theater programs held at Cork's Restaurant. The dinners were auction items last fall and netted the club over \$7,000. And a good time was had by all.

John Ward of the Lotus Foundation took the microphone to thank the club for its donation to the foundation's work. The Lotus Foundation works with the government of Viet Nam and several NGOs to identify and treat Vietnamese children with heart problems. The Foundation facilitated 93 heart surgeries last year. Sebastopol Rotary gave \$5,000 to the foundation last year to promote its work. At this point, the president of the Hillcrest Interact club, Miranda Ward announced that the Hillcrest club had raised and was donating \$1,500 to the Lotus Foundation.

President Aleia announced that Rotarian **Tom Farrell** was inadvertently left out of last week's list of long time Rotarians. She pointed out that Tom has 40 years in the club. **Tom** told this **Scribe** that he joined the club at age 12 but that seems to push the boundaries of *The Four-Way Test*.



Guenter Meiburg held the lucky ticket. He said on his was up to the wheel of fortune that it was the first time he has ever won the raffle. He did not win the spin however. Better luck next time, **Guenter**. It could happen again.



Greg Jacobs introduced the program featuring CASA - Court Appointed Special Advocates. **Greg** remembered his days working at the District Attorney's office dealing with children who were removed from their parents. In most cases, it became an adversarial situation with the DA office taking up a position and attorneys for the parents a different one. Too often, the children, and their best interests were not considered.

CASA is a private, non-profit organization dedicated to speaking up for Sonoma County's abused, neglected, and abandoned children. CASA recruits, screens, trains and supervises volunteers from the community to serve as advocates for the children. The program was brought to us by CASA Board members, Sharon Smith, Susan Medieros, and Chris Roach. CASA is made up of average individuals who use their skills to help kids who are in a very bad situation.



CASA is both the name of the organization and the moniker given to an individual volunteer. CASAs put in a few hours a week interacting with their child or children. They attend court hearings with them and write short progress reports. Most of all, they serve as a constant for the child who is experiencing a world of change. Their world consists of judges, cops, social workers, lawyers and others. CASAs seek to stabilize the chaotic situation and provide whatever support is necessary.



There are about 600 children in the county's child welfare system at any given time. CASA tries to work with about 150 of these. The program was started by Judge Arnold Rosenfield (Juvenile Court Judge of Sonoma County **-Ed.**). It is supported by fundraising, grants, donations and hundreds of volunteer hours. Volunteers are trained and screened but depended on to use their common sense life skills to help kids in need.

Chris Roach, a CASA for many years and presently a member of the board, described his experiences working with two young brothers who were in the child welfare system. Chris spent five years working with the boys, seeing them from adolescence to young adulthood. He was allowed to review case files and select who he wanted to work with. He mainly served as a constant for them, playing sports, going to movies or helping with homework. He attended custody hearings and interacted with them regularly.

CASA relies on one major fundraiser every year, this year on March 24th at the Vintner's Inn. Interested individuals can learn more at www.sonomacasa.org. CASA is always looking for volunteers to serve as CASAs, especially men who can work with the older boys who find themselves caught up in the child welfare system and need support.



The Closing Bell



President Aleia thanked Sharon Smith and Chris Roach for their informative talk about CASA and presented them a donation to Polio Plus in their honor. She then adjourned the meeting at 1:30 so *members could return to work*.

The ABC's of Rotary

(Taken from "The ABCs of Rotary", a Rotary International publication originally prepared by Dr. Cliff Dochterman who was RI President in 1992-93)

#2: The Official Rotary Flag

An official flag was formally adopted by Rotary International at the 1929 Convention in Dallas, Texas. The Rotary flag consists of a white field with the official wheel emblem emblazoned in gold in the center of the field. The four depressed spaces on the rim of the Rotary wheel are colored royal blue. The words "Rotary" and "International" printed at the top and bottom depressions on the wheel rim are also gold. The shaft in the hub and the keyway of the wheel are white.

The first official Rotary flag reportedly was flown in Kansas City, Missouri, in January 1915. In 1922, a small Rotary flag was carried over the South Pole by Admiral Richard Byrd, a member of the Winchester, Virginia Rotary Club. Four years later, the admiral carried a Rotary flag in his expedition to the North Pole.

Some Rotary clubs use the official Rotary flag as a banner at club meetings. In these instances it is appropriate to print the words "Rotary Club" above the wheel symbol, and the name of the city, state, or nation below the emblem.

The Rotary flag is always prominently displayed at the World Headquarters as well as at all conventions and official events of Rotary International.

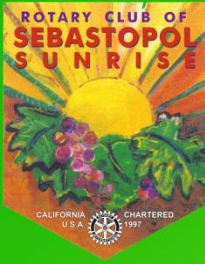

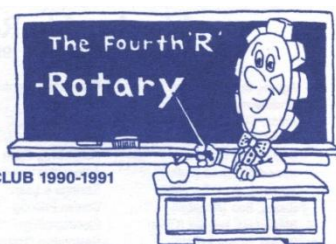

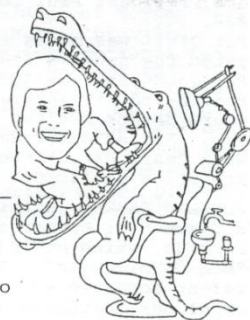
