


<u>Major Mereki</u> from Chidamoyo Hospital in Zimbabwe was introduced by **Steve Prandini**. **Steve and Roseanne** visited Zimbabwe in June of last year, and came back dedicated to raising money for a generator for the hospital in Chidamoyo. Major reports that nothing as important as receiving the generator has ever happened in Chidamoyo. Multiple demands on the generator don't faze it. "The hospital can actually have operations being performed at the same time as laundry, cooking, lab functions, and x-rays are taking place." Major was here to thank the club for the generator.

**Mike Long** introduced our speaker, club member **Brendon Houston**. **Brendon** was raised in Zimbabwe, which was Rhodesia then, prior to attending school in the U.S., where he became a C.P.A. **Brendon** experienced white rule in Rhodesia as a child, then as a young man, he lived under black rule in the newly independent Zimbabwe.

**Brendon** gave us a brief history and geography lesson of Rhodesia/Zimbabwe, from tribal trading societies and conflicts, to the importance of mineral rights in British colonization. The country had 250,000 white citizens, and 7 million black citizens. Farming, tobacco (2<sup>nd</sup> largest producer in the world), mining, and tourism form the backbone of the economy. Victoria Falls, one of the Seven Wonders of the World, is in Zimbabwe.

**Brendon's** father was in the Air Force, and served all three governments. His family stayed on after independence even though many white families left. The only blacks their family knew were the maid and gardener, who were paid \$20/month, and provided with rudimentary housing. It was a privileged life at the expense of others, according to **Brendon**.

And then, the black majority, led by Robert Mugabe, revolted. As Mugabe strengthened his hold on power, the press was controlled, so **Brendon** knew nothing of the struggles. The new government preached racial reconciliation, and for the first time in his life, **Brendon** went to school with black children, although everyone gravitated to his/her own race. **Brendon's** impression of the new government was positive because trade sanctions were lifted and they got to experience foreign candy!

In summary, Brendon told us that, politics aside, Rhodesia/Zimbabwe was a great place to grow up.

He then shared family photos, including the <u>Rotary obligatory fishing pictures</u>, although his fish were a lot more interesting than those we see on a weekly basis – Tiger Fish, Bream, Catfish, Bottlenose. Other photos detailed the rich biology of the country: a fish eagle catching a Bream, elephants, lions, hippos, crocodiles, rhinoceros, leopards, a Baobab tree, Victoria Falls, and **Brendon** riding an ostrich.

Zimbabwe from 1988 to the present struggles with 25% of the population being HIV positive, 11.2 million percent inflation, and corruption and bribery epitomized by the arable land struggles depicted in the documentary Brendon showed us. **Brendon** emphasized that the corruption is being perpetrated by the government, not by the Zimbabwean people. He also praised Rotary for finding a way to bypass the greed and graft, and do great things like supply the Chidamoyo hospital with its generator.



Bob Rogers announced the next International Project, an ambulance for Chidamoyo Hospital.



The meeting adjourned at 1:30 to Tina Turner crooning "Proud Mary", which President Aleia dedicated to Patti Blount.

## The ABC's of Rotary

#### <u>#58: Interact</u>

Interact, a Rotary-Sponsored youth service club, was launched by the RI Board of Directors in 1962. The first Interact club was established by the Rotary Club of Melbourne, Florida, USA. Interact clubs provide opportunities for young people of secondary school age to work together in a world fellowship of service and international understanding. The term "Interact" is derived from "inter", for international, and "act", for action. Every Interact club must be sponsored and supervised by a Rotary club and must plan annual projects of service to its school, community, and the world.

Today, there are more than 8,600 Interact clubs with about 200,000 members in some 110 countries. Interactors develop skills in leadership and attain practical experience in conducting service projects, thereby learning the satisfaction that comes from serving others. A major goal of Interact is to provide opportunities for young people to create greater understanding and goodwill with youth throughout the world.


