

Welcoming Speech, Greetings of RI President:

After introduction of dignitaries and a brief welcoming speech by District Governor Maureen Merrill, RI President's Representative Sunny Sharma from the Rotary Club of Fort Bend, TX, conveyed the greetings of RI President Kalyan Banerjee to the members of District 5130. During his talk he mentioned some interesting statistics...for instance, did you know that in all of District 5130 there are 5,800 Paul Harris Fellows...and that since 1917 our district has contributed over 9 million dollars to the Foundation (Try and guess what that figure would be adjusted for inflation in today's dollars). [According to www.inflationdata.com, CPI Inflation makes 6¢ in 1917 have the "same buying power" as \$1 today. -Ed.]

Sunny's final message was "Become involved!"...and he gave an interesting personal example. He joined the Sugar Creek Rotary Club in Texas (now known as Ft. Bend Rotary) as a charter member in 1985. And for the next ten years sent his dues in annually, but attended minimally and was otherwise a non-active Rotarian. In 1996 he received a message that the club was being disbanded. Alarmed, he asked why, and was told that the club was in debt to the tune of \$4,000 and was down to 8 members. When he asked what he could do to help prevent this from happening, he was told, "Become the President...get involved...we will back you." And so, he did. One year later the club had grown to 26 members and had \$20,000 in the bank, and Sunny earned an award for membership growth.

Sunny has since become more involved, serving on various Rotary District committees and eventually served as District Governor in 2010-2011. This Rotarian became involved!!!



Throughout the weekend, awards were announced, and I'm happy to say that <u>Sebastopol Rotary received their share of the recognitions</u>, 15 in all. Categories and methods were changed somewhat this year from previous years. For example there were no small, medium or large categories for clubs...all were thrown into the same pot, so to speak. And except where noted, there was no first, second or third places. Instead, if your club did well in a category, you were given an "award". If your club stood out from the others, you received an "award, with honors". Announcements



Polio Update:

PolioPlus District Chair Larry Meyers (South Ukiah) gave us a brief update on our fight against polio. 67...that's the number of paralytic polio cases to date, worldwide. Compare that to the 350,000 cases that were occurring annually when we began this battle in 1985 in over 120 countries worldwide. In India, which was declared Polio free earlier this year, not only has no child contracted the virus in over a year, but soil samples taken from previously infected areas show no trace of the polio virus at all. Extremely good news!

This year our district has contributed \$84,000 toward the cause, with another 15 to 20,000 last minute contributions enroute. That will put us close to the \$100,000 mark, if not over it, by June 30th. {Scribe's Note: That's equivalent to 167,000 doses of the bivalent polio vaccine. Way to go 5130!!!} To date, the Rotary world has contributed \$220.4 million dollars towards the Gates Challenge, surpassing the \$200 million number by over 10%. WE WILL WIN THIS BATTLE!!!



GSE Team Updates:

We heard presentations from our <u>outbound</u> teams to France and Turkey, both of which had experiences they will never forget, according to their presentations. We also heard from the <u>inbound team from Turkey</u>, who are now wrapping up their trip and <u>leaving shortly</u>, although it was rumored that one member was trying to lose <u>his</u> passport so <u>he</u> could stay longer. Speaking of rumors, he said, "If you heard rumors about me...if they're good, they're true...and if they're bad...they may be true."

They were all dressed in <u>native costumes</u> associated with the marriage ceremony, and they all looked wonderful. They wrapped up their presentation by dancing, and in the process, got at least half of the audience to stand up and join in...a good time was had by all.



Honor Flight Project:

We heard a presentation about The Honor Flight Project, a brain child of the Eureka Rotary Club, designed to honor the veterans of WWII by arranging to fly them to Washington D.C. to visit the WWII Memorial, as a way to honor these veterans and thank them for their service. To date, they have raised over \$246,000 in this endeavor. One of the recipients of the trip was 90 year old Lt. Col. Gordon (sorry, I missed his last name), who told the story of his B-17 being shot down over Germany and spending the rest of the war in POW camp, both the humorous and not so humorous sides of his experience. He expressed how much this trip to D.C. meant to him and how grateful he was to Rotary for this opportunity. He received a heartfelt standing ovation at the end of his talk. The Eureka Club would be happy to help any club in pursuing a similar project.


Pathway Home Project:

Keynote Speaker – John Blount_



#21: World Understanding Month

The month of February is special in the Rotary calendar since it is designated World Understanding Month. The month also includes the anniversary of the first meeting of Rotary held on 23 February 1905, now designated World Understanding and Peace Day.

In designating World Understanding Month, the Rotary International board asks all Rotary clubs to plan programs for their weekly meetings and undertake special activities to emphasize "understanding and goodwill as essential for world peace."

To observe this designated month, many clubs arrange international speakers, invite Youth Exchange students and international scholars from schools and universities to club meetings, plan programs featuring former Group Study Exchange team members, arrange discussions on global issues, present entertainment with an international cultural or artistic theme, and schedule other programs with an international emphasis.

Many clubs take the opportunity to launch an international community service activity or make contact with a Rotary club in another country. It is a good month to initiate a Rotary Friendship Exchange, a 3-H project or encourage support for PolioPlus and other Rotary Foundation programs.

World Understanding Month is a chance for every club to pause, plan and promote the Fourth Avenue of Service—Rotary's continued quest for goodwill, peace and understanding among people of the world.


