#### <u> The Program - Ellen Maremont Silver - How to be Red Cross Ready</u>





Ellen is the Regional Communication Director for the American Red Cross, California Northwest Region. She has worked in marketing and communications for more than 25 years, in high technology, social services, and the arts. She has worked for the regional American Red Cross for the past nine years.

<u>Are you prepared?!</u> <u>Three actions all of us should take:</u>

- 1. Get a Kit At a minimum, have the basic supplies. Consider the needs of all family members and add supplies to your kit. Additional supplies to keep at home or in your kit based on the types of disasters common to your area.
- 2. <u>Make a Plan</u> Plan what to do in case you are separated during the emergency. Plan what to do if you have to evacuate.
- 3. <u>Be Informed</u> Learn what disasters or emergencies may occur in your area.

Rotate your emergency food supplies every 6-months. Make sure to stock food you are going to like! Remember it is an emergency and you will want to eat something other than, say, canned beans. Also don't forget your pets. Water of course, tools and supplies (Try a wind-up radio – Some have the ability to "charge" your cell phone, flashlight). A first aid kit; your medications and don't forget a manual can-opener.

#### #23: Exchange of Club Banners

One of the colorful traditions of many Rotary clubs is the exchange of small banners, flags, or pennants. Rotarians traveling to distant locations often take banners to exchange at "make up" meetings as a token of friendship. Many clubs use the decorative banners they have received for attractive displays at club meetings and district events.

The Rotary International board recognized the growing popularity of the banner exchange back in 1959 and suggested that those clubs that participate in such exchanges give careful thought to the design of their banners in order that they are distinctive and expressive of the community and country of which the club is a part. It is recommended that banners include pictures, slogans, or designs that portray the territorial area of the club.

The board was also mindful of the financial burden such exchanges may impose upon some clubs, especially in popular areas where many visitors make up and request to exchange. In all instances, clubs are cautioned to exercise discretion and moderation in the exchange of banners in order that the financial obligations do not interfere with the basic service activities of the club.

Exchanging club banners is a very pleasant custom, especially when a creative and artistic banner tells an interesting story of community pride. The exchange of banners is a significant tradition of Rotary and serves as a tangible symbol of our international fellowship.

The objective of publishing as a .pdf file (Adobe Reader) is to make the AK readable on most any type of computer (PC or Mac), to "lock" the content in place, and to permit graphics/photos. Inserting directly into an email would be difficult for many types of email programs to show.

This is a great idea and is done on member request - usually with President direction. It will take time to survey all the other nearby clubs. Maybe a volunteer sub-editor will step forward?

Dear Governor

In a recent opinion piece, UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon warned of the global polio threat: "Wild viruses and wildfires have two things in common. If neglected, they can spread out of control. If handled properly, they can be stamped out for good. Today, the flame of polio is near extinction — but sparks in three countries threaten to ignite a global blaze. Now is the moment to act." Rotarians have been acting to stamp out polio for the last 26 years, but our work is not yet done.

Please note the recent developments in the fight against polio which highlight the need for urgent action:

- At their May meeting, The World Health Assembly (WHA) declared the completion of polio
  eradication a programmatic emergency for global public health. In total, 35 member states spoke
  to offer their strong support to the resolution, many highlighting the feasibility and opportunity
  of eradication in the near-term, but expressing concern at the ongoing funding gap that is
  threatening success.
- The Trustees of The Rotary Foundation recently reaffirmed that polio eradication is the most
  urgent priority of the organization, and emphasized that Rotary's continued commitment is
  critical until the disease is eradicated.
- The current funding gap remains a threat. At their March 2012 meeting, the Trustees agreed to
  continue the match currently provided to PolioPlus contributions (US\$0.50 from the World Fund
  for every US\$1.00 DDF) as an incentive for districts to contribute DDF and agreed that the
  available World Fund match will be applied on a first come/first served basis and capped at
  US\$3.5 million annually for the next five fiscal years.
- Recent media coverage reinforces the message that polio is an urgent public health matter. Rotary has enhanced its communications efforts and many of the articles in the links below highlight the role that Rotarians are playing at this crucial stage in the effort. We encourage you to get involved in sharing the news with Rotarians in your district and in your communities:

Please join us by working in your clubs and districts to highlight the goal of a polio-free world. We stand on the threshold of this historic achievement, and together we can extinguish the polio flame once and for all.
