PROGRAM – Michael Ellis – Footloose Forays

Sally Glendening introduced Michael Ellis, in "itinerant naturalist" whose company, "Footloose Foravs" leads adventure trips around the world. Today, he focused on Tanzania and the vast Serengeti grassland. This could very well be the last place on earth to witness great concentrations and migrations of wildlife. The Serengeti is the size of Switzerland and encompasses two countries - Tanzania and



southern Kenya. The borders, however, are essentially determined by the paths of migrating animals, millions of animals, especially the Wildebeest. He presented a fascinating program on the wide variety of animals in the Serengeti, efforts to preserve it, and threats to it. It is amazing how volcanic ash reacts with soil to produce the grasslands that support this vast array of animals. I have never seen it but, after listening to Michael, I know we cannot afford to lose it. He did a wonderful job of showing and explaining what is truly an international treasure.





Acting President Mike thanked our speaker and presented him with a gift. With a reminder that next week's meeting must be made up, he blew his air horn one more time and adjourned the meeting.

#20: Room 711—Rotary's Birthplace

The number 711 has a very special significance for Rotary. Room 711 of the old Unity Building, formerly located at 127 North Dearborn Street in downtown Chicago, Illinois, U.S.A., was the birthplace of Rotary International. That historic room, which was the office of engineer Gus Loehr, was the location of that first meeting when Paul Harris met with several friends to discuss his new idea of a club for professionals and businessmen.

It took extensive research and dedication by a few Chicago Rotarians to preserve the room and restore it to its 1905 authenticity. For years, Room 711 was preserved as a miniature Rotary museum by Rotarians around the world who voluntarily belonged to and contributed to the "Paul Harris 711 Club", which provided funds for leasing, maintenance, and preservation. In 1989, the Unity Building was about to be torn down. Members of the 711 Club carefully dismantled the landmark room and placed its contents in storage. There it stayed until 1994, when the recreated Room 711 found a permanent home, and this piece of the Rotary heritage is preserved at the RI World Headquarters in Evanston.
