
Bob Rogers was lucky (?) enough to have his birthday on the same day as our meeting, and so

Gene Nelson drew the winning raffle ticket, was allowed the liberty of <u>repositioning the wheel of fortune</u>, and still managed to only win \$5! (Maybe there is something to these suspicions that our trusty wheel of fortune has somehow been <u>rigged</u>???)















Mike Ferguson introduced our speaker, <u>Wanda Smith</u>. <u>Wanda</u> has an impressive background as an equestrian and entrepreneur. She has a master's degree in engineering from <u>Stanford</u>, and 40 years of experience in research and development. In 1984 she was honored as one of <u>Esquire's Top 200 People Changing America</u>. She's written a book titled "Horses of the Wine Country", about the contribution horses have made to Sonoma County's history, economy, culture, and events. <u>Wanda</u> has published four other books, as well as numerous articles in scientific journals. **Mike** explained that the publication of her book "Horses of the Wine Country" jumpstarted a project to create an Olympic quality recreational and educational equestrian center in Sonoma County, and that this new facility would be her topic of discussion today.





<u>Wanda</u> proceeded to describe various aspects of the facility that she is working to bring to completion: The California Equestrian Park and Event Center (CEPEC). She provided an interesting overview of the project, which she became involved with 3 years ago. At that time, <u>Wanda</u> was approached by the Sonoma County Horse Council and asked to support the group's efforts to build a world class equestrian horse park in Sonoma County. <u>Wanda</u> walked us through the various reasons that CEPEC is needed in the County, and would be a benefit here.

She pointed out that there are <u>20,000 horses residing in the County</u>, and yet for events and medical care, <u>these horses are taken to other counties</u>, with the <u>revenue potential</u> for Sonoma County thereby being lost to those other counties.

<u>Wanda</u> described the new CEPEC as a facility that would provide, in one location, a wide variety of equestrian-related services, including space for events, veterinary services, educational opportunities, conferences (including lodging for visiting horse owners), emergency care facilities, camping, a polo field, an equine track, trails, and a variety of horse arenas. The facility will be completely green and sustainable. <u>Wanda</u> reported that projections show that once it is fully operational, <u>CEPEC will generate \$250 million a year for the Sonoma County economy</u>. During the construction phase, which is expected to last 5 to 7 years, 1,500 people will be employed. Once construction is completed, <u>70 employees</u> will be needed to maintain operations. The total <u>cost for the project is estimated at over \$200 million</u>. The land has been identified, and the landowners involved are very supportive of the project and willing to commit their land. The property consists of a 1,000 acre valley tucked in between Stony Point Road, Meacham Road, and Roblar Road [Convenient to Washoe House. <u>-Ed.</u>]. The project is moving along quickly, according to <u>Wanda</u>. It is her expectation that construction will begin in about two years, and that by the end of the third year, CEPEC will be producing partial revenue, well on its way to fulfilling the dream of having a fully functional world-class equestrian center right here in Sonoma County!

After a brief Q&A session, President Aleia thanked Wanda for her presentation, and presented her with speaker gifts.






The ABC's of Rotary

(Taken from "The ABCs of Rotary", a Rotary International publication originally prepared by Dr. Cliff Dochterman who was RI President in 1992-93)

#7: Rotary Mottoes

The first motto of Rotary International, "He Profits Most Who Serves Best", was approved at the second Rotary Convention, held in Portland, Oregon, in August 1911. The phrase was first stated by a Chicago Rotarian, Art Sheldon, who made a speech in 1910 that included the remark, "He profits most who serves his fellows best." At about the same time, Ben Collins, president of the Rotary Club of Minneapolis, Minnesota, commented that the proper way to organize a Rotary club was through the principle his club had adopted— "Service, Not Self." These two slogans, slightly modified, were formally approved to be the official mottoes of Rotary at the 1950 Convention in Detroit—"He Profits Most Who Serves Best" and "Service Above Self" as the principal motto of Rotary, since it best explains the philosophy of unselfish volunteer service.



🐧 THE POLIOPLUS CAMPAIGN 🕰



- OPLUS is Rotary International's program to help immunize the children of world against polio and other deadly diseases. Rotary International has ged to promote and assist polio immunization worldwide in partnership with governments and international health agencies.
- Rotary International's emphasis is on polio, but the problem is bigger than polio along. Each year 4,000,000 children die from six dreaded diseases that could be prevented by immunization: polio, measles, diphtheria, tuberculosis, tetanus and pertussis (whooping cough). The vaccines to prevent these diseases reach fewer than one in five children in many prevent these dise developing nations.
- It is estimated that 100,000,000 babies are born each year in developing countries. To assure polio immunity, up to six doses of the oral polic vaccine (approx. 4 cents per dose) may be required. 100 million (newborns) x 6 (doses) x \$.04 x 5 (years) = \$120,000,000. This figure is for polic vaccine only; additional funds may also be provided for other vaccines and equipment where needed.
- It is anticipated that the funds will be raised from Rotarians and through Rotarians, with Rotarians themselves contributing the majority of the total.
- The POLIOPLUS CAMPAIGN must be an EXTRAORDINARY effort and considered a priority among all Rotarians. Each Rotary club will be asked to raise a
- The POLIOPLUS CAMPAIGN will unfold in three phases: July 1986-June 1987: Organization, Education & Major Gift Solicitation July 1987-July 1988: Intensive Fund Raising Activities and Special Events July 1988-December 1990 and beyond: Gift Payment Period
