<u> The Program – Restorative Justice in Irag – Jessalyn Nash</u>



Gene Nelson introduced our speaker for the program, <u>Jessalyn Nash</u>. She has her MA in education and is also an author and consultant in restorative justice. <u>She teaches internationally on restorative justice</u> and spoke with us specifically on her time in <u>Iraq</u>.

Iraq has a deep background in culture and history and is known as the <u>'Cradle of Civilization'</u>. Iraq is also known for the invention of the wheel and boasts the <u>first university in the world</u>. There are about <u>31 million people</u>

living in Iraq and 93% are under the age of 54 years. Their average gross income is \$2,000 a year and their main ethnic groups are Arab and Kurdish with 97% of the population being Muslim.

According to Jessalyn's perspective, the invasion of Iraq back in 2005 had a ripple effect with the rebuilding of the country. <u>\$1.7 trillion has been spent on the war efforts thus far and a total of \$6 trillion is estimated to be spent over the next 40 years</u>. The state of the country is still in building mode and Jessalyn sees there to be a <u>major need for the teachings of peace through restorative justice</u>.

Jessalyn spent some time in Iraq teaching restorative justice and to establish training in this system for social workers, lawyers and judges. Restorative Justice is based upon three assumptions:



- 1) Meeting needs is the priority after someone is hurt.
- 2) The harmer needs to make things right.
- 3) The offender gets to be involved to make things right.

Jessalyn claims that this restorative justice process can work well in Iraq as the practices of peace traces back to Sulha, a pre-Islamic practice of peace making. Sulha can resolve disputes by working through to a peaceful resolution where both parties work together. Jessalyn's goal was to start training teachers and also children in this type of practice so that they grow up to hopefully change the future culture to one of non-violence. Jessalyn's experience was one that makes her think that the Iraqi people are open to learn about the peacemaking processes that restorative justice entails. She urged our Rotary club to consider taking on Iraq and restorative justice as a future process.



As a gift to our speaker, **President-Elect Bob Rogers** presented Jessalyn with a statement about our donation to the Pathway Home, a residential program to help transition Veterans back into society.



PE Bob closed with a fishing story that went a little bit like this:

"I went bass fishing recently but after a short period of time, I ran out of worms. Just then, I saw a snake with a frog in his mouth. Hmmmm, I think frogs are good bass bait.

Knowing the snake couldn't bite me with the frog in his mouth, I grabbed him right behind the head, took the frog, and put it in my bait bucket. Now the dilemma was how to release the snake without getting bit.

Lookin' around for a solution, I eyed my trusty bottle of Jack Daniels I always bring on my fishin' trips. I grabbed the bottle and poured a little whiskey in the snake's mouth. His eyes rolled back and he went limp. I released him into the lake without incident and carried on fishing using the frog.

A little later, I felt a nudge on my foot. I looked down, and it was that damn snake again, this time with two frogs in his mouth!"

The ABC's of Rotary

(Taken from "The ABCs of Rotary", a Rotary International publication originally prepared by Dr. Cliff Dochterman who was RI President in 1992-93)

#65: The Rotary Foundation's Beginning

Some magnificent projects grow from very small seeds. The Rotary Foundation had that sort of modest beginning.

In 1917, RI President Arch Klumph told the delegates to the Atlanta convention that "it seems eminently proper that we should accept endowments for the purpose of doing good in the world." The response was polite and favorable, but the fund was slow to materialize. A year later, the Rotary Endowment Fund, as it was originally labeled, received its first contribution of US\$26.50 from the Rotary Club of Kansas City, Missouri, USA, which was the balance of the Kansas City convention account following the 1918 annual meeting. Additional small amounts were contributed each year, but after six years the endowment fund had reached only \$700. A decade later, The Rotary Foundation was formally established at the 1928 Minneapolis convention.

In the next four years, the Foundation fund grew to \$50,000. In 1937, a \$2 million goal was announced for The Rotary Foundation, but these plans were cut short and abandoned with the outbreak of World War II. In 1947, upon the death of Paul Harris, a new era opened for The Rotary Foundation as memorial gifts poured in to honor the founder of Rotary. From that time, The Rotary Foundation has been achieving its noble objective of furthering "understanding and friendly relations between peoples of different nations." By 1954, the Foundation received for the first time a half million dollars in contributions in a single year, and in 1965 a million dollars was received.

It is staggering to imagine that from those humble beginnings, The Rotary Foundation is now receiving more than \$65 million each year for educational and humanitarian work around the world.
