MAKING A DIFFERENCE Rotary



Interplast teddies give a reassuring cuddle to some of our youngest patients. With many different colour combinations these teddies bring a positive experience to the child when they are receiving life-altering treatment by the volunteer Interplast teams.

Teddies are used by our volunteer Anaesthetists to help calm and reassure a patient before surgery, reducing the need for additional drugs. Interplast sends teddies with every program to countries across the Asia-Pacific.

The teddies are made by members of Rotary Clubs across Australia & New Zealand and donated to Interplast. They then take a long journey with the medical equipment and the volunteer medical teams to find their new friends. They start their new life bringing smiles to children and families during their life-changing hospital visits.

Most recently, over 100 teddies were donated to Interplast by the Rotary Club of Napier and the Rotary Club of Maketu, in New Zealand. These teddies have already been sent to children facing surgery in Laos.

Meet Patma. A little girl who lives in Mount Hagen in Papua New Guinea (PNG). Patma was born with a cleft lip and palate making it very difficult for her to feed properly. Without proper nutrition in her formative years, Patma is unable to put on weight and thrive.

Interplast Australia & New Zealand has been working in PNG since 1985. PNG has one of the largest populations in the Pacific, with over 8 million people spread out over more than 150 islands. Interplast is helping our local partners to build capacity as many local surgeons are general surgeons, and only a small number specialize in plastic & reconstructive surgery.

Whilst Patma was considered too small for surgery on this visit, the Interplast team was able to teach her mother how to feed her with a specific bottle and technique. Hesitant at the new feeding technique at first, Patma's mother was taught by volunteer nurse Hayley Benbow the correct way to feed Patma so that she will be a good candidate for surgery when the team returns.

Whilst COVID-19 is sweeping the world Interplast wishes that you, your families and your club stay safe in these trying times. Children like Patma will need Interplast's & Rotary's help more than ever once COVID-19 has disappeared from her community. Through Rotary you can have a long lasting impact on these children's lives and their communities.

World Immunization Week - 24-30 April

As scientists work to find a vaccine for the new coronavirus, we can do our part to keep our communities healthy by helping Rotary spread the word about the importance of vaccinations during World Immunization Week, 24-30 April.

Immunizations save millions of lives every year and are widely recognized as one of our most successful and cost-effective health interventions. Yet outbreaks of vaccine-preventable diseases continue to put children's health at risk around the world.

Rotary knows firsthand that #VaccinesWork. Since 1985, we've contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children from polio. When children receive the polio vaccine, their pinkie fingers are marked with purple ink so health workers will know which children received the vaccine. Today, only two countries continue to report cases of polio caused by the wild poliovirus: Afghanistan and Pakistan.

Take action in three easy ways:

- Raise awareness of vaccination and polio eradication efforts by painting your nails or pinkie purple, or customize our new End Polio Now artwork with your signature and words of support. Post your pictures on social media using the hashtags <u>#EndPolio</u> and <u>#VaccinesWork</u>.

Year 12 Program Updates Update for Rotary Clubs

Dear Rotary Clubs,

We hope this email finds you as well as can be with the current circumstances around COVID-19. We have two updates to share with you all.

NYSF Year 12 Program & COVID-19

The current Covid-19 situation provides many uncertainties for everyone. We would like to assure you that the NYSF team is busily working on the Year 12 Program 2021 for January next year. The NYSF Office is working remotely and will continue to engage all of our providers, stakeholders and volunteers to plan the January 2021 program.

We encourage students who are interested in attending in January 2021 to continue to apply through the normal process via our website. Please encourage STEM interested students in your district to apply.

It is vital that we receive an appropriate number of applications (approximately 1000+) to be able to proceed with the usual selection process and enable Rotary to select the top 600 students. We will be monitoring the Covid-19 related restrictions and health advice throughout this process and have a series of contingency options ready to go as required.

To ensure promoting the program is as easy as possible, we have put together a Rotary toolkit full of resources (including social media posts and digital posters) to help you promote the program: https://www.nysf.edu.au/rotary-resources/.

We are working with Rotary District Chairs to deliver an online option for NYSF Selection and Orientation if necessary. Should we reach a point where it becomes clear that we cannot proceed in January, we intend to postpone the in-person program to a later date in 2021.

The NYSF has been providing amazing experiences to students for 37 years, and despite the events 2020 has given us, we will continue to think and act positively to ensure that our programs can be enjoyed by our future scientists for many years to come.

Year 12 Program 2020 Session C Refunds

Thank you to those who have already provided their details to receive a refund for fees paid for the cancelled NYSF Year 12 Program Session C. If you have already provided your details and not yet received your refund, you can expect to receive payment this week, or receive contact from the NYSF for further information if required.

I want to thank those Rotary clubs who have been able to donate part or all of their 2020 fees. We know it is an incredibly tough time for fundraising and for Rotary clubs across the country. We appreciate any donation, however big or small, and have been heartened by your messages and support of the NYSF as a not-for-profit charity at this tough time.

If you have not yet submitted your details to obtain a refund and intend to, please do so by 30 April 2020. We have discussed this date the with the Rotary District Chairs and it is agreed this is a reasonable cut-off date.

To obtain a refund, please complete the online form available here. Please note that Rotary Clubs are required to upload an invoice for the amount they are claiming, and that contributions paid by students to Rotary Clubs will be refunded by the NYSF directly to students, rather than via the supporting Rotary Club.

5 REASONS TO VISIT THE LEARNING CENTER

Did you know you can earn virtual badges, find courses in languages like Chinese and Swedish, and take a series of leadership courses, all in Rotary's Learning Center? Here are five reasons you should visit the Learning Center today:

1. Courses for club officers

Want to learn more about your role and responsibilities as a club president, secretary, treasurer, or club committee member? The Learning Center has a learning plan for your specific role. The content was recently updated based on the changes made by the 2019 Council on Legislation, so you can review the latest information.

2. Professional development courses

Do you need help Leading Change in your club? There's a course for that. Other recently added courses include Essentials to Understanding Conflict and a course on setting up a mentoring program for new members. You can take these courses at your convenience.

3. Report access for districts

Find out which courses your district members are taking in the Learning Center by requesting access to usage reports. The following officers can receive weekly reports by email:

- District governors-elect
- District trainers (current and incoming)
- District Rotary Foundation committee chairs
- District membership chairs

If you're serving in one of these roles and want to receive the reports, complete the Access to Learning Center Reports course in the Learning Center. You can find the course on the My Dashboard page or by searching for it on rotary.org/learn.

4. Leaderboards

On the My Dashboard page, leaderboards show the number of points learners have earned by taking courses and participating in the Learning Center. A global leaderboard shows the top 10 learners worldwide. Districts can also request district-specific leaderboards so you can see who the top 10 learners are in your district.

5. Online grant management seminars

Districts can now opt to replace or supplement in-person Grant Management Seminars with online courses, which include nine topics that conclude with a quiz. Districts can also use Learning Center reports to track progress and qualification of clubs.

It's easy to get started. Go to <u>rotary.org/learn</u>, sign in to My Rotary, and start taking courses. For tips on using the Learning Center, take the Getting Started with the Learning Center course.

- You can upload and store the materials and logos you create for future use by creating a basket.

- You can download broadcast-quality public service announcements, videos and images to help tell Rotary's story. You can achieve first-class results without hiring a designer or purchasing expensive software.
