## **District Conference 2020**



Rockingham City Councilor Hayley Edwards presented to the club on the Sleepbus project. Hayley outlined the issues associated with homelessness and the Sleepbus solution.

A bus costs \$100,000 but once the bus has been purchased, the Sleepbus organisation will run and maintain it through corporate sponsorship.

Each Sleepbus has 20 pods, each with their own power, TV, USB connections, and a bed. It also has two toilets and space below the bus for pets and storage for personal items.

A blue bus is a mixed sex facility and a pink bus, which has 14 pods, is designed for women and children.

## Ground Breakers! City of Canning launches unique new youth pilot



We are very excited to launch a brand new youth project taking us into the New Year. The **Ground Breakers** initiative has been designed to completely empower young people to affect youth-led change, and we would love to ensure the opportunity is made widely available to all young people. The youth participatory budgeting program is the first of its kind for City of Canning and will provide the resources to take grand ideas from a dream to a reality, without the red tape.

Funding of *up to* \$10,000 will be awarded to people, or groups, (aged 11 – 25 years old) to have their youth-led and youth-focused ideas come to life in their community in 2020. If you work with, or support, any young thought leaders, change-makers, innovators or impact creators; encourage them to submit their ideas for their chance to be awarded the following resources to bring their projects to life next year:

- · Funding of up to \$10,000
- A Ground Breakers toolkit
- Mentors

All ideas for projects are encouraged, whether they are the wildest and most innovative, tackling global issues through a local lens, or even the simple but significant. If you are a school, group or not-for-profit organisation that is supporting young people, you are welcome to submit ideas and apply for the funding also – though the projects **must** be youth-led and designed.

We would encourage you to please spread the word about this unique opportunity amongst all of your students, clients, families, networks, groups and any specific young people you work with.

## **Frequently Asked Questions**

## 1. Who is eligible?

- Young people or groups aged 11 to 25 years old that live, work, learn or play in the City of Canning.
- Groups or local not-for-profits directly supporting and empowering groups of young people that live, work, learn or play in the City of Canning.
- Schools are eligible to apply, although the application needs to support a youth-led project or idea.

## 2. How much funding will I receive to roll out my idea?

The Ground Breakers project provides funding of *up to* \$10,000 per project subject to each project pitch, though the amount you receive will be dependent on your project and your project budget. Please note, projects that require less than \$10,000 are also encouraged and welcomed.

You don't have to have your entire budget planned to submit an idea; a rough idea of how much you might need will suffice and - if your project is successful - the Youth Team will work with you to iron out the finer details.

## 3. Is there anything the funding can't be spent on?

- salaries or payments to any individual involved for time/staff costs
- activities which seek to make a financial profit for the individual/s involved
- donations to other entities
- projects that don't have any youth involvement
- projects that do not benefit the Canning community/are not delivered in or for the City of Canning
- everyday living costs
- insurance costs
- projects that benefit only single individuals rather than a community or wider reach
- towards any activity that has already taken place or anything in retrospect
- existing/ongoing projects
- overseas/interstate travel or projects





## 4. When would the project need to be completed?

This funding supports projects that are rolled out and completed by December 2020, however funding must be committed by 30 June 2020.

#### Can I submit more than one idea?

Absolutely! The more ideas, the better! While only one project will be successful in receiving funding – the more ideas, the larger your chance of receiving funding.

## 6. What happens after I submit my idea?

Once we have received your idea through the City's website, the Canning Youth Team will be in touch to chat about your project idea. Your idea will be visually displayed at a pop-up 'Ground Breakers Ideas Installation'. This will take place in a series of locations, however the first 'pop-up' will occur at the Riverton Library during the last week of February. You will be invited to the launch evening where the Ideas Installation will be officially opened and the community are invited to vote on their preferred project ideas. The project ideas with the most votes at the end of the pop-up installations will be informed of their success, offered a mentor and provided a toolkit of resources to support them in bringing their idea to life in the community in 2020.

## 7. Who approves the funding allocation?

The projects with the most votes will be presented to a specialist selection panel represented by City of Canning senior officers and leadership team members. City of Canning reserve the right to all final decisions on the appointment of successful projects and funding allocation. The decisions made by the panel will be final and may not be disputed.
