Regional Bulletin February 2020

As we celebrate Rotary's 115th anniversary, we look to its humble beginnings when Paul Harris formed The Rotary Club of Chicago on 23 February 1905 so "professionals with diverse backgrounds could exchange ideas and form meaningful, lifelong friendships."

Fast forward to today, while much has changed in the global landscape, the vision comes full circle with Rotary reemphasising the need for diversity in its membership.

Diversity provides different perspectives through which we can accomplish our goals as an organisation. The RI Board of Directors recently passed the following diversity, equity and inclusion statement:

As a global network that strives to build a world where people unite and take action to create lasting change, Rotary values diversity and celebrates the contributions of people of all backgrounds, regardless of their age, ethnicity, race, color, abilities, religion, socioeconomic status, culture, sex, sexual orientation, and gender identity.

Rotary will cultivate a diverse, equitable, and inclusive culture in which people from underrepresented groups have greater opportunities to participate as members and leaders.

This poses a challenge in that there needs to be an openness to listen and the humility to acknowledge that we may not have all the answers – that there may be better solutions. Diversity is not just in reference to the obvious – age, ethnicity, race, colour, etc. It also refers to perspectives. People of the same age, ethnicity, etc still have differences as well, that serve as obstacles to get a group of people from achieving a common goal. Openness of mind is essential, and *purposefully* focusing on the greater good notwithstanding any personal impact is a constant challenge when conflicts arise.

Coincidentally February is *Peacebuilding and Conflict Prevention Month* so it is à *propos* to be talking about bringing people together from diverse backgrounds. While Peacebuilding and Conflict Prevention is the area of focus that gets the fewest grant applications, this cause is indirectly addressed by the 5 other causes that Rotary is focused on. Peace, after all, is not just the absence of conflict. As RI Strategic Partner <u>Institute of Economics and Peace</u> asserts: "Positive Peace describes the attitudes, structures and institutions that underpin and sustain peaceful societies". By providing basic necessities: Water, Sanitation and Hygiene, Basic Education and Literacy, Maternal and Child Health, Disease Prevention and Treatment, and Community Economic Development, Rotary is enabling communities to attain a higher level of peace.



The fire has also impacted (again) on the habitat of the vary rare and critically endangered bird - The Western Ground Parrot.

All information and photos provided by Paul Wettin who is a member of our club and Chair of the Friends of the Western Ground Parrot who are trying to stop the demise of this unusual, shy and very beautiful bird.

Albany Port support this project regularly and particularly now in time of crisis **but there is so much more that other clubs can do to support the preservation of these birds** and on going research into any other surviving populations as yet undiscovered.

The critically endangered Western Ground Parrot is a bush fire victim too, so please help*

Another major wildfire Christmas 2019 occurred in Cape Arid National Park and the adjacent Nuytsland Nature Reserve- the 3rd major fire in this area in 4 years. This resulted in the loss of another 6,000 ha of core, known western ground parrot habitat, with the total parrot habitat loss from the 3 fires being nearly **90%.** Only 14,500 ha of intact core parrot habitat remains in Cape Arid. Prior to the 2015 fire in Cape Arid it was estimated that less than 150 parrots



existed in the Park and the Nuytsland Nature Reserve. This makes the parrot one of the rarest birds in the world and WA's rarest bird.

In response to the Christmas fire, the Friends of the Western Ground Parrot launched a fund raising campaign to provide 10 acoustic recording units (ARUs) and their installation for urgent parrot survey work.

ROTARY FOREIGN COIN COLLECTION

A JOINT PROJECT OF THE ROTARY CLUBS OF WANNEROO and HORNSBY

Help Rotarians to save lives by donating your unwanted foreign coins and notes to enable us to support Rotarians Against Malaria (RAM) and other International Projects.

MALARIA

Malaria is a killer disease - the world's worst. More than a million people, mostly children, die of malaria each year and many more are left ill and disabled.

Rotary clubs throughout the world and especially in Australia have been involved in a program entitled *Rotarians Against Malaria* designed to help in the fight against malaria. Rotary clubs in Australia raise funds, distribute bed nets, arrange education programs and assist in diagnosis and treatment. Some of the money raised goes towards research into prevention, an enormous task. Most of the work of Australian Rotary clubs and the national committee in this project is carried out in the Solomon Islands, East Timor, Papua New Guinea and elsewhere in the South West Pacific.

THE COIN PROJECT OF THE ROTARY CLUB OF HORNSBY

One project to raise money for our anti-malaria campaign involves the collection and repatriation of unwanted foreign coins and notes. Travellers returning to Australia from overseas countries bring with them leftover coins and notes of small denominations from the countries they have visited. This money is usually too low in value to be changed back into Australian Currency so the travellers donate it to the Rotary charity collection. It has no value in Australia. Foreign coins cannot be converted within Australia.

The Rotary Club of Hornsby in New South Wales, assisted by Rotary Clubs in Western Australia, South Australia, Victoria, Northern Territory, Queensland and the ACT, collects the unwanted coins

and notes from Exchange Bendigo Booths Bank Booths , Bendigo Bank branches and some other sources in cities throughout The coins and Australia. notes are then sorted and returned (by Rotarians, families and friends who happen be travelling to overseas) to their country of origin where they into Australian dollars or

converted into Australian dollars or larger denomination local currency notes. Coins and notes for more remote or less visited countries are sent through a Rotary agent.

OTHER INTERNATIONAL PROJECTS

The proceeds from this process are used for two charity purposes. Much of the money collected is given to the Rotarians Against Malaria program. The remainder of the money is used for a range of other charitable international projects of Rotary, in particular for health, education and welfare of people, especially children, in poor areas of the world. Over \$300,000 (Australian) has been raised by the coin collection program over the last eight years.
