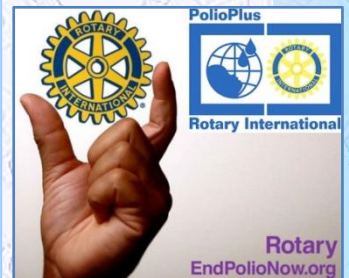

Rotary Club of Mill Point Linen Distribution Project

USED BED LINEN RECYCLING PROJECT, PHASE 2, AUGUST 2016

Purpose: To recycle used Linen from Fortescue Metal Group in the Pilbara to deserving Perth based charities .

Approach: Forty-seven pallets arrived, transported free of charge by Toll Holdings on 22nd August. The material was laundered and much of it was in an as-new condition. Temporary warehousing was provided by Rapallo Pty Ltd. Various charities operating out of the Perth area were contacted and volunteers from the Rotary Club of Mill Point (RCMP) dispensed all of the linen on 26th and 31st of August. Each volunteers signed a declaration that all linen handled was to go to charity and each receiving charity signed a document stating its end usage. A few damaged doona inserts were donated to the dog home.

Summary of Receiving Charities:

1. E Timor National Hospital, Dili: 350 bed hospital. Much of the linen is old or completely missing.
2. E. Timor Ref, Baucau: 135 bed hospital. Most of the linen is old or completely missing.
3. Student accommodation, Dili: 6 medical students
4. Loretto woman's refuge: Facility run by nuns in Fremantle. No government support.
5. Hope: Over 100 year old support centre for those afflicted by drugs and alcohol.
6. Bindoon Aboriginal aid: Op shop and support centre for nearby communities
7. Jacaranda: Belmont based charity giving aboriginal support and school inclusion programmes.
8. Borderless Friendship: Supports over 300 orphans in Northern Thailand. Many have little or no bedding. Singapore and Thai Airlines have been approached for transport.
9. Nadine Wimmins Centre: Women's refuge. They were very excited to receive the linen.
10. Foundation Housing: Developers and managers of affordable housing for underprivileged.
11. United Care: Provides accommodation, day centres and many other services for old, sick and addicted. Linen is going to 5 different groups within United Care.
12. Mission Australia: Multi faced support for homeless, addicted and mentally unwell.
13. Crossways: Christian group proving live in care for severe mentally impaired 18-65 year olds.
14. Aboriginal Aid Group, Midland: Support centre for nearby communities
15. Esther Foundation: Provides residential housing and support for 50 at risk young women in Perth with no government help.
16. Shalom House: Provides residential housing, support and rehab for 60 drug addicted men in the Swan Valley, with a great track record.
17. South Care: South Perth community support for the needy.
18. Rotary for Cambodia/E. Timor: Rotary Donation in Kind to needy in SE Asia Linen will be sent in September.
19. Parkville: Provides outreach services and programs to children, youth and families in need.
20. Victory Life: Church and support group distributing >25 tons of food and goods weekly to the needy.

The receiving charities and the members of Mill Point Rotary Club would like to thank FMG, Toll and Rapallo for their assistance in this worthwhile project.

RCMP continues to develop contacts with additional charities, both in WA and nationally, who would benefit similarly to the 20 noted above. As such we would be pleased to continue working with you should further linen or other used material become surplus to your requirements.
