#### **5.3 Community Services**

#### **5.3.1** Annual Christmas Appeal Donations

The Community Service Manager will arrange for the Club to donate a minimum of \$500 each in early December to Kwinana St Vincent de Paul, Kwinana Anglicare (Anglican Parish Kwinana Emergency Relief Fund), Margaret Court Community Outreach Kwinana and Kwinana Salvation Army to assist with their annual Christmas appeals.

#### 5.3.2 Rotary Wildflower Reserve and APEX/Rotary Park

The Community Service Manager shall liaise with the City of Kwinana in matters that may arise with regard to the Rotary Wildflower Reserve and APEX/Rotary Park.

#### 5.3.3 Management of Club Food Van, BBQ Trailer and Equipment

The Club Food Van, BBQ Trailer and equipment will be made available for local community group usage at the discretion of the BBQ Management Officer, subject to the following:

- Community groups will be required make a \$100 donation to the Club for use of the food van (plus \$40 for gas). The club food van is only to be hired out for use within the City of Kwinana and its immediate boundaries.
- Community groups will be required to make a \$60 donation to the Club for use of the BBQ trailer (plus \$40 for gas).
- At the discretion of the BBQ Management Officer, Community Groups may be required to provide a \$200 bond when hiring the club food van or BBQ trailer. The bond is refundable on return of the van or trailer in an acceptable condition.
- The BBQ Management Officer is authorised to adjust the aforementioned BBQ donations requirement for deserving individual community groups.
- For safety purposes, gas bottles are only to be renewed and fitted under the direction of the BBQ Management Officer.

# Polio This Week 28th August 2018

- Summary of new viruses this week: Afghanistan one new wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) case. Democratic Republic of the Congo Based on positive contacts, two negative AFP index cases classified as circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus type 2 (cVDPV2). Nigeria three new cases of cVDPV2. Papua New Guinea two new cases of circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus type 1 (cVDPV1). See country sections below for more details.
- To assess if the 2016 trivalent-bivalent oral polio vaccine "switch" was successful, a group of researchers from Imperial College London, WHO and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation analysed stool and sewage samples from 112 countries collected in the first 15 months after the switch. Study results published this week in


The New England Journal of Medicine show that VDPVs and Sabin type-2 excreted into the environment after vaccination disappeared rapidly after the switch, shrinking to a much smaller geographic area.

These findings validate the GPEI decision to withdraw the OPV and demonstrate that the switch achieved its desired goal of reducing VDPVs and VAPP.

This research also provides important evidence that the complete withdrawal of OPV after eradication of all wild polioviruses will eventually eliminate the risk of VDPVs, provided high immunity and effective surveillance are maintained. Eradication is simply not compatible with continued use of OPV.

The Western Australian **State Emergency Service (SES)** a volunteer based division of the Department Fire and Emergency Services of Western Australia. It plays a key role in countering the effects of **natural and man-made emergencies**.

#### **Functions**

- To raise, train and equip a volunteer based emergency service.
- To be the 'Hazard Management Agency' for flood, cyclone, storm, earthquake and tsunami.
- To be a 'Combat Authority' for land search, vehicle rescue (in specified areas), cliff / cave rescue and civil defence.
- To act in a support role to other hazard management agencies.
- To support emergency management committees at State, Regional and Local level.
- To act in support of the police in tasks acceptable to the volunteers but excluding those where it is likely that offenders will be present.

When a natural disaster strikes: a storm, cyclone, earthquake, or flood. State Emergency Service (SES) volunteers can be found assisting the communities and get them back to normal. SES provides a wide range of services to help cope with the effects of natural disasters from emergency repairs on houses and building buildings, to restoration of essential services.

But responding to the effects of natural disasters is only part of SES' responsibility. Volunteers also carry out land search (which can involve tracker dogs and horse-back searchers) and cliff and cave rescues. Our volunteers have also assisted in air search observation. In remote areas where Fire and Rescue Service is unavailable, SES volunteers are responsible for the difficult task of extricating people from vehicles involved in road crashes.

SES is a large team and many volunteers work behind the scenes as radio or computer operators, in administration or incident control, planning and logistics. During prolonged incidents, SES volunteers can even provide catering services. Equally important is the safety education role of SES. Volunteers actively promote prevention and preparation measures in visits to service groups, senior centres and homes, local business and schools.

Christine and Angela are part of the management team at R/Ham/Kwinana SES and regularly assist in promoting prevention/preparation etc. at local schools and senior centres. Many older residents are reluctant to call out the SES especially in the middle of the night as they think they are being troublesome or overreacting. Please call us 132 500 'We love it'

Every 3 months volunteers undergo training exercises to keep them fit and up to date with the equipment they may be using during a call-out.

Christine says that they are from time to time called upon to search for elderly people who may have dementia etc. we strongly recommend families fitting their loved ones with a simple GPS tracking device, when and if they go missing they are easily found most times by a family member with a smart phone.

Volunteers are always welcome, come along, we are like family.


A man was on his way home with a new car, which was absorbing all his attention, when it struck him that he had forgotten something.


Twice he stopped, counted his parcels, searched his pockets, but finally decided he had everything with him. Yet the feeling persisted.
