Greetings to all,

October 24 is World Polio Day. This day was established for annual observance by Rotary International more than a decade ago to commemorate the fight against poliomyelitis. Rotary is extremely proud of the global progress it has made with its commitment to eradicate this childhood disease which, at its height, crippled over 100 children per week. In 1985, there were 250 countries around the world which were experiencing outbreaks of polio. Since Rotary International introduced its polio eradication program through providing vaccinations to children in Third World countries, there remain only three countries experiencing outbreaks of polio. These countries are Nigeria, Afghanistan and Pakistan. Unfortunately these countries have been experiencing major conflict, which makes the provision of vaccines to children in need both difficult and dangerous. However, Rotary International remains committed to the program, with the goal of eventually having the disease completely eradicated from the world.

To commemorate World Polio Day, a number of members and partners enjoyed a very pleasant meal at Chawla's Indian Restaurant in Medina. This venue was chosen in view of the fact that India was the country most recently declared polio-free. The staff at Chawla's were very friendly and accommodating, and we had the pleasure of having AG Barry Berger and his wife Hazel joining us for the meal.

Our next major fundraiser for End Polio Now will be the 2017 Swimarathon!

President Max's Latest Adventures in Timor

Wednesday 19th October

Left for Naha'e straight after breakfast, arriving about 1015; had coffee on arrival with Julio and family. Then shifted the community tank into position again – just picked up the tank and walked.

Thursday 20th October

Left Laga for Naha'e again straight after breakfast, arriving about 9.15am. We then proceeded to fix the remainder of the taps, and run a stand pipe back to the Xefe's house and to the community behind the school. All tanks are overflowing and all the taps are working. The A-team has again done a marvelous job.

During the District Commodore's speech he stated for the first time in his life he has never seen either a government or a NGO follow through the way this team has, from the initial approach by the team to the villages over 12 months ago; then carrying feasibility studies; consultations with the community; written water agreement recognizing the government GMF and the Wash program and signed by the villages; then supplied all the infrastructure (tanks, pipe, fittings); installing and teaching the villagers how the system works; and finally handing it all over to the community.

He also stated that the police, school principals, teachers, health clinic workers and community leaders have been trained in the GMF (Wash) principles but could not implement the procedures because they have no water. Now they CAN.

We then traveled through Buibela, installing the new stand pipes on the way in the village, to our overnight stay at Baguia and a well-earned dinner at Leo's house.

Friday 21st October

Left Baguia for Samalari about 8.45 am with Leo and inspected the spring again with the view of finding a suitable location from which to pump water to the village. We then found a more suitable location further upstream; we then went to the school and located the site for the tank.

Saturday 22nd October

Whist Ted, Mick and Abilo cleaned up the container and did an up-to-date inventory of tools and equipment, I went up to the sisters for a minor problem – the pump used to fill the overhead tank was over-pressurizing and cutting out. We reduced the flow rate to the pump, and so all is now fine. In the afternoon we attended the funeral of Father Manuel's father. It was a very big affair, and was very well attended by the church hierarchy.

Sunday 23rd October

Ted Mick and Abilo finished off the inventory, then we went to the village of Boleha about 5km east of Laga. It seems as though the solar panels at the Boleha spring have been disconnected, therefore no power to the lorenz power box and pump.



What is Polio?

Poliomyelitis (Polio) is a highly contagious viral infection that can cause lifelong paralysis, and was once widely fatal. Although there has been no known local transmission of the poliovirus in Australia for the past 30 years, there remains a risk of the importation of polio from overseas – and vaccination of children remains critical.

Polio is spread mainly through contact with infected faeces, leading to gastrointestinal (stomach and gut) infection by one of the three types of polioviruses. Poliovirus infection may progress to paralysis or meningitis (inflammation of the membranes enclosing the brain). About one in 20 people hospitalised with polio die from it, and half of those who survive suffer permanent paralysis.

Causes

The virus spreads between people through contact with infected faeces and, less commonly, with infected saliva.


Symptoms

In 90% of cases, polio has no symptoms. If symptoms do occur, they can take between three and 21 days after infection to show. These symptoms can include: headache, nausea and vomiting, tiredness, neck and back stiffness, severe muscle pain, and paralysis.



India Declared Polio-Free

The following information was reported by CNN on 27 March 2014.

(CNN) -- India has been certified polio-free by the World Health Organization after going three years without an endemic case of polio. The eradication of polio in India is heralded as one of the biggest achievements in global health efforts.

The <u>polio-free certification by the Regional Certification Commission came Thursday</u>, along with a proclamation that Southeast Asia is free of the disease.

Just five years ago, India was home to nearly half the global polio cases and considered one of the most technically difficult places to eradicate the disease, because of sanitation challenges and high-density population.

India's last case was reported in a young girl paralyzed by polio in West Bengal in January 2011.

So how did the second most populous country in the world, considered the hardest place to end polio, become free of the disease?

Health workers determined that the children of migrants or those growing up in difficult-to-reach areas were not getting access to vaccines. So they deployed immunization efforts to reach the most vulnerable, according to UNICEF.

India launched a massive effort involving a surveillance network and almost 2.3 million vaccine administrators, who identified communities falling through the cracks.

To counter rumors and misgivings about the vaccine, social mobilizers, religious leaders and parents were included to increase understanding about immunizations.

They also bolstered communication and outreach efforts that often included Bollywood celebrities and cricket players. The efforts combined government, various U.N. agencies as well as philanthropic organizations (**including Rotary!**).

The highly infectious viral disease primarily affects young children and could lead to paralysis and death. It can be prevented through immunization, but there is no cure.
