Club Officers

Under the management of the Club Service Director, a number of officers will be appointed to manage various facets of the club activities. These officers and their roles are as follows:

Attendance Officer

Duties:

- Be in attendance at the meeting place early, or arrange a stand-in, to take meal money and record attendance.
- Keep a record of the members' attendance at each meeting, and maintain an understanding of the rules regarding attendance.
- By the day and time, as mutually agreed between the Attendance Officer and the caterer, inform them of the expected number of persons attending the meeting.
- Inform the Membership Director of any member missing more than two consecutive meetings without an apology.
- Inform the President if the reason for an apology is the serious illness of a member or their immediate family.
- Ensure the President is aware, before the start of a meeting, of the names of visiting Rotarians, visitors and guests.
- Ensure visiting Rotarians receive a "Make-Up Card".
- Inform the Secretary and members of the weekly attendance figures.
- Manage the meeting competitions.

Sergeant-at-Arms

Duties:

- Ensure the regular meeting venue is set up prior to the meeting. Set up will include placement of the rostrum, and Past President and Past DG rolls on the head table and checking for correct arrangement of flags.
- Call the meeting to order at the appointed time and introduce the President. When an induction is scheduled call the meeting to order and initiate the Club Induction Process.
- On the President's direction, call the meeting to order following any break in the meeting.
- Act to assist the President in maintaining decorum during the meeting. This will require an awareness of accepted meeting procedure.

- The Sergeant, assisted by the Corporal, shall control the Fines Session. With due notice the Sergeant may appoint a member to act as Fines Master, and unless the President rules otherwise an open fines session may be conducted.
- On completion of the meeting, the Sergeant is to ensure that all club accoutrements are stowed away and any club material is removed from the tables.
- The Sergeant is to inform the Corporal if they are unable to attend a meeting. If neither the Sergeant nor Corporal is able to attend a meeting, the President may arrange for another club member to be appointed.

Corporal

Duties:

- Assist the Sergeant-at-Arms in the performance of his/her duties as detailed.
- Act in the capacity of Sergeant-at-Arms in his/her absence.

Space Camp at NASA in USA

A letter from the Club has been sent to the parents of Leah Urban. Leah, who lives with her family in Medina, has approached the Club for a contribution of funds to help her cover the \$6,400 cost of going to the USA for a Space Camp with a focus on STEM (Science Technology Engineering and Math) activities. This camp is recognised and accredited by the WA Education Department. The group of students are from Rockingham Senior High School (around 20 of them to go).

The request was considered by the Club Board and it was decided to advise Leah to make application for a funding contribution from the Valk Trust.

A copy of some application papers to assist in the Valk Trust submission has been provided to Leah's family for completion and submitting for consideration.

It was also explained that the Club's Valk Trust consideration of the level of funding would only be related to the costs of the STEM elements of the proposed trip recognising that there are also non STEM fun and tourism aspects of the trip.

Through Vocational Services, an application to a Commonwealth Government Department for a funding contribution for the STEM associated costs is also being finalised. There are still estimates of costs and dates of the start and finish of the STEM Space Camp and travel and accommodation costs, etc that are needed before the application can be closed off and sent. Liaison with the family and the High School is ongoing.

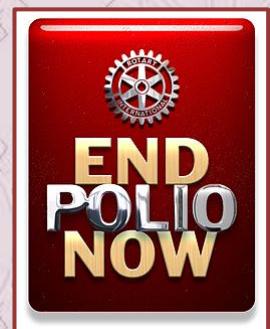

Polio This 13th November 2018

- Summary of new viruses this week:
- Afghanistan –one wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) positive environmental sample.
- Pakistan –four WPV1 positive environmental samples.
- Papua New Guinea – one case of circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus type 1 (cVDPV1).
- Nigeria – two cases of circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus type 2 (cVDPV2) and seven cVDPV2 positive environmental samples.
- As the year draws to a close, endemic and outbreak countries are making concerted efforts to eradicate the last strong holds of polio, by conducting large-scale immunization activities before the end of the year.



Kwinana's famous Lolly Run on Christmas morning



Santa and his helpers will once again deliver lollies to residents as part of Kwinana's most-loved Christmas tradition — the Lolly Run.

The first Lolly Run took place in 1954 and was run by resident Alf Lydon and Kwinana's Toc H Branch Members.

Today, the Lolly Run is co-ordinated by the Rotary Club of Kwinana and the City of Kwinana.

The Lolly Run is also made possible thanks to several volunteer groups including Mandogalup and Kwinana South bushfire brigades.

Dozens of volunteers also put up their hands each year to help organise and bag lollies in preparation for the Lolly Run.

Rotary Club of Kwinana director of projects John Iriks said he came to Kwinana in 1953. "I've received the lollies, my kids have received lollies and now my grandchildren are receiving lollies"

Kwinana Mayor Carol Adams and Lolly Run volunteer said the Lolly Run was a unique tradition showcasing the rich community spirit Kwinana was known for.

"Every Christmas morning we see groups of volunteers ride their colourfully decorated sleighs, trucks and utes through the streets- delivering lollies and festive cheer to children and their families," she said.

The Lolly Run is on Christmas Day morning, from 7.30am to noon.

Santa and helpers will visit every street in Kwinana to deliver lollies — listen for the beeps. (Sound Telegraph.)

Volunteers are invited to join us in bagging the 65,000 lollies that will be distributed by Santa throughout the streets of Kwinana on Christmas morning.

Join us at the Darius Wells Library and Resource Centre on Thursday, 6 December from 1.30pm to help us bag lollies for the festivities.
