

Sue has over 25 years' experience in direct response, general marketing and management roles working for diverse industries including the media,

publishing, card marketing and energy sectors. After four years working in London for a worldwide direct response advertising agency, Sue returned to Sydney where she worked in senior marketing positions in John Fairfax & Sons and in WA with The West Australian and Alinta.

United Way were founded 125 years ago in 1887 in Denver, Colorado in the USA.

In 1887, a Denver woman, a priest, two ministers and a rabbi recognised the need for cooperative action to address their city's welfare problems. They put their heads together to plan the first united campaign for ten health and welfare agencies and created an organisation to serve as an agent to collect funds for local charities, as well as to coordinate relief services, counsel and refer clients to cooperating agencies and make emergency assistance grants in cases which could not be referred.

That year, Denver raised \$21,700 and created a movement that would spread throughout the country to become the United Way. Over 118 years later, United Way is still focused on mobilising the caring power of communities and making a difference in people's lives.

Today there are nearly 1,800 community-based United Ways in 41 countries and territories and we raise \$5 billion annually for local communities.

And nationally are a network across Australia with offices in Sydney, Melbourne, Queensland, Ballarat, Glenelg, Central Coast, Perth and South Australia. Annually we invest \$6million and engage over 3400 volunteers into community projects around the country, that improve the lives of 18,000 Australians.

We are united globally and locally by our Community Impact mission in mobilising communities to create lasting changes in community conditions that improve lives.

At United Way we acknowledge that many of the social issues facing Australia today are highly complex. That is, no one organisation can solve them. Instead we believe in working across sectors and organisations to leverage the available resources to make a collective impact in communities.

We are uniquely positioned as a 'neutral broker' to bring together government, community organisations, citizens and businesses – all that we fundamentally believe are required to overcome social issues. That's how we tackle issues strategically. Tactically we work in high need geographic communities, rolling our sleeves up with our volunteers to engage and directly support families and children. Combined, we call this approach Community Impact – changing the lives of whole communities for the better, for a long time.

During 2011 and 2012, we took time to investigate and understand the facts and data behind key social issues and 2013 was the time to act on our findings. We became laser focused on education and building relationships with key people and organisations. We also saw the need to refine our strategic direction and operations in 2013 to be able to deliver on our promises. Whilst maintaining our overarching three community impact areas, we decided to focus on developing education – building on where our key strength and experience lies. And we call this work 'ReadLearnSucceed'.


Membership

For more than a decade, Rotary's membership has lingered around 1.2 million. That means that for every person who joined during that period, another person left. Last year, membership hit a 10-year low, at 1,185,000, though we've since rebounded, raising the figure this year to 1,207,102.

For RI President Gary C.K. Huang, that's not good enough. He hopes to increase membership to 1.3 million by the end of his term.

"It's simple: The more members we have, the more people we can help," Huang says. "A stronger membership base will result in strong communities."

How can we reach his goal? And how can we keep the members we already have? Here's a look at regions and countries that have increased membership, as well as an overview of ways that Rotary leaders are working to grow our membership.



Where is Rotary growing and why? Germany.


Germany gained more 11,000 members from 2003 to 2013, an increase of 27 percent. "German clubs put an emphasis on personal connections between members and their families and try to develop programs and events in which many play an active role," says Rotary coordinator Peter Iblher. "We try not to overwhelm our members with financial requests and purely financial goals. We try to create an impression of club life as being rewarding and valuable for members and their families."

Polio this week as of 24 November 2014

In an embarrassing development, Pakistan has been ranked on top of a list of 10 countries that recorded the highest number of polio cases so far this year. As many as 108 fresh cases – including four Wild Type-1 cases one each from Punjab, Sindh, K-P and Fata – have been reported in Pakistan in eight months of 2014. Afghanistan has been ranked 2nd, with only 8 cases, according to the list compiled by the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI).

The GPEI figures show that last year there were 93 confirmed polio cases in Pakistan, while the numbers have soared well past 100 so far this year while four months are still to go. Somalia reported 194 cases and topped the same list last year. The impoverished country's performance has been stunning this year as only 4 new cases have surfaced so far.
