

Guest Speaker:

Josie from Mobile Alert Safety Pendants

Family business that started 4 years ago.

Josie was a Carer at the time and she and her husband noticed that there was a gap for vulnerable people living on their own. If they had an accident, they may not be able to get to their phone (landline or mobile) to call for help,

This was further reinforced when Josie's mother had a stroke and she was found passed away in the bathroom 2 days later.

The existing service 4 years ago relied upon the landline which was connected to a monitoring service. The main problem was that it's range was limited and if you went into the back yard, it wouldn't work.

Josie and her husband Lance were the 1st to bring in the Mobile Personal Alarms.

They use a SIM card the same as a mobile phone, so anywhere there is mobile coverage, these Mobile Personal Alarms will work.

The coverage depends upon the service provider, and Telstra's coverage is better than Optus. Josie found that Telstra provided good coverage and reception in Kwinana, and Optus was not so good.

The Mobile Personal Alarms come in a number of different colours. They are very light and easy to carry. In an emergency situation, the user only needs to push the button to activate it. A mobile phone requires much more work to login, go to the phone app, find the contact, etc

The units can be programmed with up to 5 numbers (preferably mobile numbers) of family, friends, etc In an emergency, the Mobile Personal Alarms will start by sending text messages to the 5 numbers (1 at a time), with the message "It's Stephen, I need Help". The unit also sends the Google Maps link so that the receiver can see where the Mobile Personal Alarms is currently located.

After the text messages, the unit then calls each of the numbers in turn until 1 answers. There is confirmation of the answer (and it's not message bank), and the helper can talk to the user via the Mobile Personal Alarms, as it has speakers and a microphone built in.

000 can be the 5th number if that is what is required.

There are other similar units around, but they do not provide the individual services that Mobile Alert Safety Pendants offers. These services include programming the Mobile Personal Alarms with the 5 numbers, providing instruction, etc.

The units are bought outright, and there are no ongoing costs for the unit. There is an ongoing cost for the mobile service, and Josie advised that \$15-\$20 per year was the norm, depending upon the suppliers and the plan.

They have a long life rechargeable batteries. The unit is dropped into it's caddy on the bedside table each night and is charged while you sleep.

There is an Automatic Fall Alert that can be turned on if required. This activates if there is a downward movement followed by the unit lying flat. After a brief period of time, the unit then starts playing a tune loudly to advise that if there is no cancellation in the next 20 seconds, then it will start to send out a "Fall" message to the 5 numbers. If the unit has accidentally been dropped, then the user can push the button to cancel the Auto Fall Alert.

There is a new IHelp model which offers some additional features including a mobile app to manage the unit.
