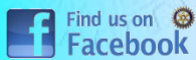

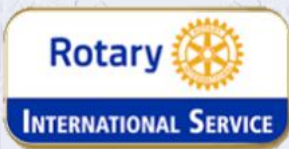


Youth Services Report

Guest Speaker: Beth Webster, Anglicare WA



Beth is currently working in Kwinana with Anglicare, RVAU, and 100 families.

RUAH Community Services, Ruah Community Services has been supporting and empowering vulnerable and disadvantaged people to create positive change in their lives for more than 60 years – leading innovation and delivering tailored, wrap-around support for people experiencing homelessness, family and domestic violence, mental health challenges and, as a result, needing legal advice and support.

100 Families WA In 2018, 100 Families WA, a collaborative action research project made up of academics, community service organisations and people with lived experience, came together to better understand the issue of entrenched disadvantage as experienced by families living in Perth, Western Australia. Over 2.5 years, 400 families took part in data collection (see graphic for details) shared their lived experience of living in long term disadvantage and in terms of the support they had/were receiving, what works, what doesn't, and what could work.

Anglicare WA and RUAH have been quietly working down in Kwinana. Our design team has spent the better part of this year with a small number of families who are wrestling multiple intersecting hardships, to understand more about their experiences at this time, through COVID and beyond, bringing resources to the table and trying out some different ways of working together.

We have noted the great work of many services, but also the ways that the system can itself contribute to complexity, costing families valuable time and emotional load.

We have noted the ingenuity and collaboration of families and informal community networks in helping one another get by.

We have also noted the ways that insufficient income puts families in a position of choosing between undesirable and sometimes risky options to meet needs and protect their kids.

Our work builds on the work of 100 Families, the work of Hilary Cottam (Radical Help), and most importantly the knowledge of local families and community organisations. We want to understand the best role that organisations like ours can play in creating the conditions for people to move towards their good life.

We've been playing with scale, zooming in and out from the lived experience to the system blockers and enablers.

Recently we hosted our first gallery walk in Medina to showcase our learning so far and invited stakeholders to engage with the content. We were stoked to welcome so many diverse stakeholders through and look forward to partnering to try some new things.

This is slow work. We know that wicked problems can't be shifted with a single intervention. We are building from the bottom up, with an eye to connecting with other local (and sometimes overlooked) players who hold the keys to place based resilience, as well as for opportunities to influence commissioning, policy and practice to create better conditions for families to build the good life.

Polio this week

11th January 2023

Ahead of the WHO Executive Board that is scheduled to take place from 30 January to 7 February 2023, the Secretariat has prepared two reports which will inform Member State discussions, namely on [polio eradication](#) and on [polio transition planning and post-certification](#).

On polio eradication, the report provides an update on work towards fully implementing and financing all aspects of the Polio Eradication Strategy 2022–2026, which received support at the Seventy-fifth World Health Assembly. The polio transition planning and polio post-certification report provides an update on the implementation of the Strategic Action Plan on Polio Transition (2018–2023), with a focus on steps being taken by the Secretariat in 2023 to respond to the recommendations of the [mid-term evaluation of the Strategic Action Plan](#), and on progress at the country level.

13 January 2023 marks 12 years since the last case of wild poliovirus in India – a remarkable public health success. “It seemed impossible until it was done!” – Dr Hamid Jafari, Director of Polio for WHO’s Eastern Mediterranean Region, reflects on his time eradicating polio in India and what lessons we can take from this to address the final challenges for achieving eradication in Afghanistan and Pakistan.

Well-known science educator Hank Green discusses polio’s rise to explosive outbreaks in the 1950s and the ensuing development of the inactivated and oral vaccines in this educational video on polio eradication. The clip looks positively upon OPV, while recognizing its drawbacks and the GPEI’s plan to switch to exclusive IPV use in the next few years. Vaccine-derived polio and “the switch” are also discussed, accompanied by on-message explanations. Though Green does not cover nOPV2, the video gives a very good historical and scientific overview of the existing polio vaccines, their strengths against various types of polioviruses, and some of the challenges and promises of eradication.
