What is the Rotary Four Way Test Speaking Competition?

The Rotary Four Way Test Speaking Competition is a state-wide competition with a State final being conducted in conjunction with fellow Western Australian District 9465.

Aims

The aims of the competition are to:

- introduce Year 10 students to the Rotary Four Way Test. This will assist them to understand that positive life values are important foundations to making decisions and acting with integrity.
- provide Year 10 students with an opportunity to compete in a public speaking competition, thereby fostering excellence in the art of public speaking and developing the confidence and self-esteem of participating students.
- provide an opportunity for students to test their skills before an audience.
- bring the concepts of the Rotary Four Way Test to the attention of students.
- provide Rotary and the Rotary Four Way Test with valuable exposure in the community.
- develop relationships between Rotary and schools.

Eligibility

Year 10 students in any high school or college in District 9455 applying through a Rotary Club. Students will participate in the district final and the state final in their Year 11.

Any topic may be chosen but the participants must address and refer to the Rotary Four Way Test in their speech and focus on the four elements. (Points are lost for failure to comply with this condition).

Prizes

Prizes will be awarded to the winners of the club heats, district finals and the state final.

Adjudication

At Club heats, the students are adjudicated by one qualified adjudicator and two members of the Club. The semi-final/s, district final and the state final are all adjudicated by qualified adjudicators.

Organisation

With the guidance of the district committee, Rotary Clubs invite schools to participate. It is strongly recommended that schools be approached early in term 2 (around May). Individual clubs manage their involvement in the competition with the assistance of the district committee. Clubs in the north-west of the State are encouraged to conduct a competition within their area and provide a semi-finalist to compete in the district final. Teachers, family and friends should be encouraged to attend all events.

Club heats will usually be held during September with district semi-finals being held in November. The district final is usually conducted at the district conference with the state final being held after that.

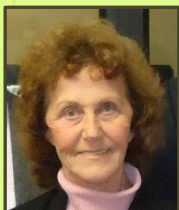

Guest Speaker

Jane Davies – Mosaic Community Care

Thank you for inviting me to come and speak to you this evening about Mosaic Community Care. I'd like to begin by acknowledging the traditional owners of the land on which we meet today, the Whadjuk People of the Nyoongar Nation and pay my respects to elders past and present.

My connection with Kwinana goes back to 1966, when a family of 10 pound Poms arrived in Western Australia and moved into state housing in Medina. In 1967 we moved to a house in Calista that Mum and Dad had built, and I moved from Medina Primary to Calista Primary School. Five years at Kwinana High School Followed. Dad worked at BP and Mum's last job before retirement was managing the SEC canteen. Dad still lives in Calista, as does my brother and his family. My niece is currently a student at Gilmore College. I have always been connected to this area and I'm currently the Chairperson of the Kwinana Early Years Services.

So, to the topic I have been asked to talk about – Mosaic Community Care Inc. Originally named GACLA (Gosnells and Armadale Community Living Association), Mosaic was established in 1992 by a group of community members interested in developing improved options for their family members. Over 25 years later, two of our founding members' family members are still with us. We are a not-for-profit and registered charity, and our vision is "to enrich the quality of life of people with disability". We work in partnership with our clients and the important people in their lives to explore opportunities, plan and shape services, and achieve personal goals. We have over 200 employees, and 20 residences in the southern suburbs, including Medina, Bertram, Baldivis, Safety Bay, Armadale, Kenwick and Canningvale.

We support people to live independently in their own homes and live a normal life. All up we currently support over 130 people who have a variety of disabilities – including physical, cognitive, intellectual, mental, sensory, developments, or a combination of these.

Our values are:

1. **Integrity:** We hold ourselves to the highest standards of honesty and ethics
2. **Respect:** We acknowledge and value the rights of others.
3. **Safety:** We create safe environments for our participants, team members and others.
4. **Inclusion:** Our participants and staff are enabled to engage fully within Mosaic and the broader community.
5. **Choice:** We enable our participants to make individual plans that allow control over their personal growth, development and quality of life.

Great words, but how does that look? For instance: safety – that is a great term ...the dignity of risk. Dignity of risk is the idea that self-determination and the right to take reasonable risks are essential for dignity and self-esteem, thus should not be impeded by excessively cautious caregivers concerned about their duty of care. For example, a client of ours was given a gift of a helicopter ride by her sister. Our job is not to say 'too risky', but to manage the risk so the client can exercise her choice.

There are six national quality standards that apply to disability service providers and that we are all measured against.

1. **Rights:** The service promotes individual rights to freedom of expression, self-determination and decision-making, and actively prevents abuse, harm, neglect and violence.
2. **Participation and inclusion:** The service works with individuals and families, friends and carers to promote opportunities for meaningful participation and active inclusion in society.
3. **Individual outcomes:** Services and supports are assessed, planned, delivered and reviewed to build on individual strengths and enable individuals to reach their goals.
4. **Feedback and complaints:** Regular feedback is sought and used to inform individuals and organization-wide service reviews and improvement.
5. **Service Access:** The service manages access, commencement and leaving a service in a transparent, fair, equal and responsive way.
6. **Service management:** The service has effective and accountable service management and leadership to maximize outcomes for individuals.

Mosaic recently underwent an external quality audit with a result of 'no required actions', so this was a great result.

OUR SERVICES

Supported Accommodation

We support people with disability to live as independently as possible in the community of their choice. This could include support to live in your own home, or support to live with other people, concluding in one of our modern residences.

Staffed by dedicated, experienced teams provided 24/7 support, our residences are located in hubs across the metropolitan area and provide residents with:

1. A welcoming, homely atmosphere in a supportive and safe environment
2. Company, friends and entertainment
3. Access to specialist health services
4. Opportunities to learn new skills to assist transition to independent living
5. Access to community facilities and events

When we get new enquiries, most people have no idea what supported accommodation looks like, and often have a very outdated, institutionalized view.

CAS

Our Community Access and Support team provides tailored supports to assist people to live independently in their own homes, and/or participate in activities of interest.

Some of the activities we support include:

1. Maintaining and developing friendships and informal community connections;
2. Participating in sporting and recreational activities;
3. Accessing educational and training courses;
4. Life skills training such as housekeeping, meal preparation, transport training, money management and shopping;
5. Assistance to attend medical, dental, therapy and other appointments

NDIS

The biggest change here is choice and control. Previously there was block funding – DSOs would get a lump of money and decide how to allocate it. Now all the power is with the consumer. Funding is allocated to each client and then they shop around for their provider. And they can move very easily if they aren't happy.
