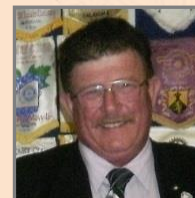

Club Vision Facilitating



PDG John introduced by President James

The purpose of tonight's presentation is explain all the steps in the Visioning process.

To show how Visioning fits in with Rotary International's strategic initiatives.

To assist clubs in planning for the future.

A multi-District program currently promoted by Rotary International as best practice, Club facilitation helps a Rotary Club to design its own vision / identity and then sets out the necessary steps to achieve that vision.

Rotary International strategic priorities and goals are

- To support and strengthen clubs
- Focus and increase humanitarian service
- Enhance public image and awareness

Rotary International long range planning guide for Clubs and Districts.

- Involve past, current and incoming club leaders
- Have an unbiased facilitator
- Align club goals with those of District and Rotary International
- Draft a vision statement describing your club's future
- Prioritise club goals by participant consensus
- Identify club goals that support the top 3 year goals

1. The Process:

- A 2-3 hour event
- Led by a trained experienced Rotarian facilitator
- Should include a representative body of the club's members (or all members in a smaller club)
- All members' ideas are of equal value

2. Writing exercise:

- Envisage your club as to where you want to be in 5 years' time
- Write your ideas down and bring to facilitators session
- Ideas written in very simple short sentences or dot points

3. Extraction and scribing

4. Dot Voting

5. Summary of charts

6. The action plan

90% of 250 clubs in 10 Districts who have completed the process shared two common results

- The club encountered membership growth in the first year
- Clubs initiated at least one other significant service project or endeavour

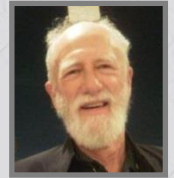

Good old Ausie BBQ

We have just left the BBQ season. But it is important to refresh your memory on the etiquette of this sublime outdoor cooking activity

A Little History Lesson
