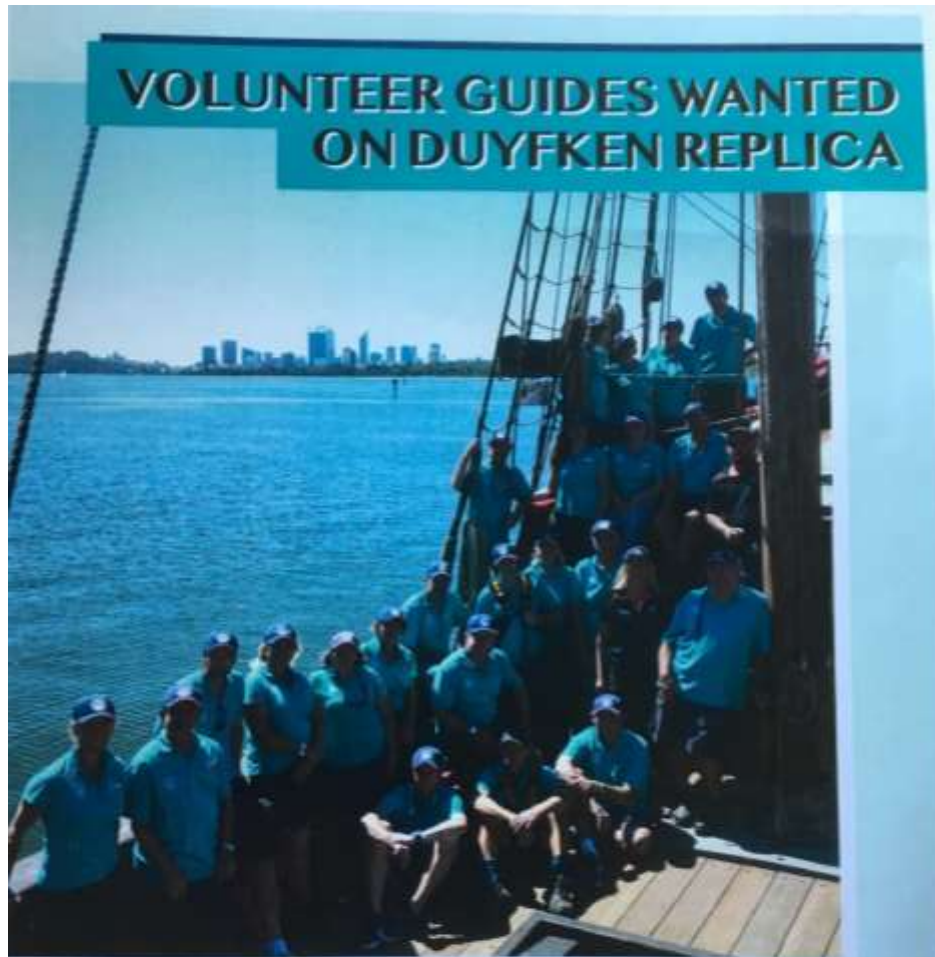
LOMBOK SCHOOL FOR KIDS FUNDRAISER

FOUR WAY TEST SPEAKING COMPETITION

The Four Way Test Speaking Competition was conceived in 1932 at the height of the Great Depression by Herbert J. Taylor, a Chicago Rotarian, who later became President of Rotary International during its 50th anniversary year (1945/55). He joined a company which was the verge of bankruptcy and searched for a yardstick of ethics that the workers of the company could use. He hit on four questions that became known as the Four Way Test of the Things we think, say or do. As a result, goodwill developed, and changed the prospects of the company. Today it is considered to be central to all Avenues of Rotary service.

The Four questions were:

1. Is it the Truth?
2. Is it Fair to all Concerned?
3. Will it Build Goodwill and Better Friendships?
4. Will it be Beneficial to all Concerned?

What is the Four Way Speech contest?

The Four Way Speech contest is a public speaking contest between young people, initially in year 10 within District 9465. Each speech should be 5-6 minutes long, on a topic of the contestant's choice and incorporate the four Way Test throughout.

Heats are held at Club, Group and Zone levels, culminating in the District final at the District 9465 Conference in March the following year. The winner and runner up from the District final compete against the winner and runner up of District 9455 to determine the winner for W.A.

ROTARY CLUB OF MELVILLE MEETING REPORTS

Meeting Date: Monday 18th February, 2019
Venue: South of Perth Yacht Club

The Rotary Club of Melville hosted the Zone Final of the Four Way Speaking competition, and wow, what a meeting. There were 23 Rotarians from the Rotary club of Melville, as well as 19 guests, including Emile (Amen's son), AG Lesley Coombs, Rtns Jan Moore District Co ordinator), Barry Berger (RC Rossmoyne), John Tuffin (RC of Booragoon) and Ian Knight.

Acting Sergeant David Barton opened the meeting, and Acting President Ed McKinnon welcomed everyone, and Rotarian Janice Pounder introduced the speakers, Cameron Dagggers, Haru Jayasekara, Henry Kent and Sophie Steel and their parents, Carolyn Dagggers, Rose Jayasekara, Natalie Kent and Louisa Steel, teachers Joanne Ray, Suzanne Lawrence and Noreen Stevenson, along with the judges for the competition, Graham Mcdonald, Thulani Rajapaksa and Kevin Sansome.

AG David Porter then introduced the first speaker, Cameron Dagggers, from Rossmoyne Senior High School, who spoke on the topic "How to End Racism". He talked about how racism was unfair, unjust and discriminating, and how it is prevalent across the world, including Australia. He commented that racism was embodied in the phrase "How can you hate me when you don't know me?".

The second speaker was Haru Jayasekara, also from Rossmoyne Senior High School, with the topic "We should all Cycle to School". Haru informed us that less than 1% of children cycle to school and only 7% of children get one hour of exercise per day. He talked about the benefits of the 30 mins of riding to school every day, and how it could offset diseases such as obesity and diabetes. It is social and could also help reduce the traffic around the schools.

The third speaker was Henry Kent from Wesley College, whose topic was “An Antisocial Society”. Henry opened his speech with exclaiming how appalling it was that technology has exceeded our humanity. He talked about the development of technology and compared then and now. He also discussed the anti social aspect of using technology and our desire for stronger, better and faster technology.

The fourth speaker was Sophie Steel from Corpus Christie College with the topic “It’s Time to Face the Truth”. Sophie’s talk was based on the image of the Barbie doll, and the effect of this image on young children and how it can lead to depression and eating disorders. She also discussed the objectification of women, and how they can be seen as an event rather than a person. She believes that society’s expectation of women needs to change, and they can be supported by being given the opportunity of an education. Sophie concluded with the statement “My name is Sophie and I am a Human Being, not a game or a Barbie Doll”.

The judges then retired to make their decision, and during this time, Jan Moore spoke about the Four Way Test Speaking Competition generally, and said that the District Finals will be held on the Saturday afternoon of District Conference in Collie.
