Golf is so Much More Fun, and Less Stressful – as a Team Sport.

The first rule of an Annual Rotary Golf Event is: you talk and talk about the Rotary Golf Event. You persuade local merchants to sign up as tee sponsors. In the last days before the tournament you watch the weather reports, employing whatever voodoo you have to ward off low pressure systems.

Then the fun starts: Watch out down the fairway-I've got my bad drive warning ready to go: "Service Befooooore Self". However Golf Events might have been enjoyed by more players if it wasn't for the following worries that bedevilled them so many of them:

How Will I play?

What If I embarrass myself?

Why is golf so damn difficult?

You can blame the Scots for making the game so hard. Long ago they made the holes mere 4 ½ inches across and banned do-overs. Since then, golfers have spent too much time kicking themselves and cursing their luck and spending too little time heeding Ben Hogan's advice to stop and smell the flowers along the fairway.

Luckily for me I have hit so many lousy shots in more than forty years as a golfer, that I have developed a sort of immunity to the jitters. Here's my secret: One day I noticed that everyone on the course was as nervous as I was. Everybody else was so worried about his or her own game, they barely noticed how I was hitting the ball. Golf got more relaxing after that. No easier, but a lot more fun.

At one of the games, we played a "Scramble" with groups of four players, which is a format that allows every member of a team to hit a drive, then pick the best one and play again from there. So your group gets four tries at every shot. A scramble makes for low scores and plenty of team spirit.

Why the last mile is so important

1 There were more cases of wild poliovirus in 2018 than in 2017.

Should we be discouraged?

No, not at all. We've always expected the number of cases to fluctuate somewhat as we get closer to zero. We've gone four straight years with fewer than 100 cases per year. That's an indicator of great progress. With dedication from governments and Rotarians in areas still affected by polio, we'll get there.

2 Why is it so difficult to eradicate a disease like polio?

Remember that even in the United States, where the polio vaccine was readily available, it still took 20 years to become polio-free. And the areas we are working in now don't have health systems that are as well-developed as in the United States.

3 What challenges are you seeing now?

We have been working intensely in the endemic countries — Afghanistan, Nigeria, and Pakistan — for a number of years, and some of the citizens in those countries are getting concerned that we are spending money on polio eradication

when they have so many other needs. There's some resistance to keep on receiving immunizations for polio, and polio alone. Our challenge is to find ways to provide other services to the citizens and children so we still have the parental support we need — to provide the "plus" in PolioPlus.

4 What role does armed conflict play in those areas?

It makes the logistics of immunization far more difficult. The Global Polio Eradication Initiative partnership is not only dealing with governments — we're dealing with anti-government elements as well. While we've worked to gain everyone's trust and support, we've had areas that were inaccessible to immunization teams for months and sometimes years at a time.

5 Do immunization teams know when they miss children? Or are there children they don't even know about?

I think we have a good handle now on knowing when and where we're missing children. The challenge is to keep reducing the number we miss. In Nigeria, we have done a lot of work since we were surprised by the discovery of

several polio cases in Borno state in 2016, two years after the country had last seen a polio case. We now know through GPS mapping where the children are, and we are working with authorities there to make sure all children receive the polio vaccine.

6 Where are we seeing successes?

We haven't had any cases of wild poliovirus anywhere in the world in nearly five years except in the three endemic countries. And in Nigeria, it's been almost three years since we had any wild poliovirus cases, and those occurred in a small area of the country.

7 What's the most important thing Rotarians should know?

I've been extremely impressed with the dedication and persistence of Rotarians in Afghanistan, Nigeria, and Pakistan. They are working hard to make sure polio is eradicated. It's pretty amazing what they do in those countries.

Rotarians should continue to be optimistic and to support eradication. We also need Rotarians to bring the need for continued funding to the attention of their government leaders. We can't lose sight of the goal. — DIANA SCHUBERT

The meeting opened with the Rotary charge being read by Massimo Cau. President Lynne gave a special welcome to all our guests, including honorary Rotarian, Mike Beech Jones.

PDG David Barton then called up President Lynne and guest Janice Tapp, who was then inducted as a member of the Rotary Club as Melville. She will join the International Committee, and her mentor will be Janice Pounder.

Massimo Cau and Paul Stott then invited their guest, Jason Cox to come forward. Jason has worked for Paul for a number of years. And has been very efficient at sorting out systems and checklists. He has always been the “go to” person for clients, and has always been very accommodating. He has been a great advocate for the business. Massimo and Paul presented Jason with a “Pride of Workmanship” Award.

Chairperson Rob Willis then introduced his guests for the day from the RAAFA in Bullcreek. As a club we visited the Association two years ago, and had a chicken and champagne dinner under a Lancaster bomber. The first speaker was Trevor Prentice who was now the manager of the Association. He said that it has been forty years since it opened and although there are only 17 Lancaster Bombers in the world, we are very privileged to have one of them.

The RAAFA not only houses planes of all descriptions, it trains young people from around the age of 8-13 years in aviation, and then for the 13 plus teenagers, they have a different programme that includes simulation training. They are also learning all about the use and safety issues to do with drones, the best use for drones, such as rescue operations, and they get to handle the drone that was brought to the meeting today.

The Drone costs about \$4,000, plus camera equipment. It does not crash, as it has sensors so it will not crash into anything. It is run by two batteries with a life span of about thirty minutes. It is GPS based, and will hold fast on a spot, even if the operator moves away. By July 1st, 2019, all Drones must be registered.

During the reports section, congratulations was given to Ed and Jean McKinnon for their sixtieth wedding anniversary.

There were two market reports, one from the 25th March, and one from 31st March, 2019. Both markets ran well, and there were no issues. The market on the 31st was full by 5.30am, and at least twenty people were turned away.

Doug Minchin then gave an advertisement for the golf day on the 17th May, 2019. He explained that the golf will be played according to Ambrose rules (see elsewhere for further information on Ambrose and the second annual Golf Day).

President Lynne talked about the upcoming event, a meeting at The Haven, a home for young people. It is strictly NO alcohol, as it is a place for young people, but you can bring your own soft drinks (see elsewhere for further information on this event).

President Lynne also farewelled John Dennis as he is taking Leave of Absence for twelve months, as he sails around the world, but will be back from time to time to visit.

There were lots of Happy and Sad dollars, which were then followed by a game of Heads and tails, and the singing of the National Anthem. After the meeting closed, everyone ajouned to the lawn of the Yacht Club for a Drone demonstration.
