### Golf is so Much More Fun, and Less Stressful – as a Team Sport.

The first rule of an Annual Rotary Golf Event is: you talk and talk about the Rotary Golf Event. You persuade local merchants to sign up as tee sponsors. In the last days before the tournament you watch the weather reports, employing whatever voodoo you have to ward off low pressure systems.

Then the fun starts: Watch out down the fairway-I've got my bad drive warning ready to go: "Service Be**fooore** Self". However Golf Events might have been enjoyed by more players if it wasn't for the following worries that bedevilled them so many of them:

How Will I play?

What If I embarrass myself?

Why is golf so damn difficult?

You can blame the Scots for making the game so hard. Long ago they made the holes mere 4 ½ inches across and banned do-overs. Since then, golfers have spent too much time kicking themselves and cursing their luck and spending too little time heeding Ben Hogan's advice to stop and smell the flowers along the fairway.

Luckily for me I have hit so many lousy shots in more than forty years as a golfer, that I have developed a sort of immunity to the jitters. Here's my secret: One day I noticed that everyone on the course was as nervous as I was. Everybody else was so worried about his or her own game, they barely noticed how I was hitting the ball. Golf got more relaxing after that. No easier, but a lot more fun.

At one of the games, we played a "Scramble" with groups of four players, which is a format that allows every member of a team to hit a drive, then pick the best one and play again from there. So your group gets four tries at every shot. A scramble makes for low scores and plenty of team spirit.

The list goes on. You give kids education they never thought they'd have. You make sure mothers and babies have a chance at a good fruitful life. You help communities develop so they can care for themselves through their own actions.

We are a special breed of people because we honestly and fervently believe in the concept of Service Above Self. It's not a magic formula. It just means that we are prepared to give so that others less fortunate can have a better life.

Make a point of telling your friends how special it is to be a Rotarian. Take pride in what you do. Be gals you have saved lives, helped stop that war, given kids better health, provided a toilet, given education and helped make whole communities to a better life.

I'm glad I'm a Rotarian and have been able to do all that. I haven't changed the world all that much, but I tried, and I know I'm not alone.

Antimicrobial Resistance – What is it?

Antimicrobial Resistance (AMR), refers to an increasing number of micro-organisms in the human body, including bacteria, fungi, viruses and parasites, that have become resistant to

antimicrobial treatment such as antibiotics. Microbes resistant to antimicrobials are called multidrug resistant, or often superbugs.

A World Health Organization (WHO) report released in April 2014 stated "This serious threat is no longer a prediction for the future, it is happening right now in every region of the world and has the potential to affect anyone, of any age, in any country. Antibiotic resistance occurs when bacteria change so that antibiotics no longer work in people who need them to treat infections. This is now a major threat to public health."

Antimicrobial resistance is on the rise. Estimates suggest several million deaths are caused by AMR every year world-wide. Drug resistant infection is now a very serious global problem and a huge challenge for public health administrators and producers of animals for human consumption.

Antibiotics are used in animals for treatment, disease prevention and growth promotion. Antibiotic resistance can be transmitted through food, which therefore makes it a major public health safety problem. Antibiotics used in meat production are widely distributed in the soil and water in many countries.

Within some health facilities and the community, antibiotics have been prescribed inappropriately, often for conditions where the infection is either self-limiting or not susceptible to antibiotic treatment, such as viral infections. Australia is one of the highest antibiotic using countries in the world.

Without effective antibiotics, prevention and treatment of infections, illnesses of humans and animals become much harder to treat. Common surgeries become much more dangerous and untreated infections lead to longer hospital stays, higher medical costs, and increased mortality. The Grattan Institute estimates hospital infections costs Australia \$440 million annually and AMR will make these costs rise.

AMR Aware Inc, supported by Rotary Clubs, is a not for profit organisation providing health education on the ways to limit exposure to infection, thereby reducing the need for antibiotic treatment. The aim is to ALERT, INFORM and ACT

Information is being introduced to schools, community health groups and aged persons home
etc comprises three messages: –
☐ Strongly support vaccination programs
☐ Be educated about the proper use of antibiotics
☐ Encourage hand washing and safe sanitation

Chair, Doug Minchin then introduced the four students, Amy, Alex, Alby and Shali who went on exchange to Texas over the Christmas holidays.

They told us about travelling as a group to Austin Texas, where they were met and taken to the beautiful ranch of Don Ray, and the next morning woke up the aroma of a breakfast of waffles, pancakes and bacon being cooked by Don Ray's wife, Linda. They then met with the host families and beg four weeks of a wonderful experiences including feeling fully welcomed and loved by their host families, many of whom they are still in contact with. One host mother even presented each of the students with a key to her house saying that they were able to return any time and have a place to stay at her home. The students enjoyed the food, and talked about eating an enormous number of burgers. They also mentioned a petrol station with about 100 petrol bowsers.

As part of their charity work, the student spent time at Foodbank helping to pack food. They went to two high schools, one of which was like "High School Musical" with over 2,000 students in year 11 and 12.

The students wound up their talk by donating a cheque to Karen from the Shenton Park Dog Home. Karen and a helper brought in one of the dogs "Charlie" from the Shelter, for us to meet. The student s manned the lower spinner at the markets on a couple of separate Sunday mornings to raise the money.
