

Golf is so Much More Fun, and Less Stressful – as a Team Sport.

The first rule of an Annual Rotary Golf Event is: you talk and talk about the Rotary Golf Event. You persuade local merchants to sign up as tee sponsors. In the last days before the tournament you watch the weather reports, employing whatever voodoo you have to ward off low pressure systems.

Then the fun starts: Watch out down the fairway-I've got my bad drive warning ready to go: "Service Be**fooore** Self". However Golf Events might have been enjoyed by more players if it wasn't for the following worries that bedevilled them so many of them:

How Will I play?

What If I embarrass myself?

Why is golf so damn difficult?

You can blame the Scots for making the game so hard. Long ago they made the holes mere 4 ½ inches across and banned do-overs. Since then, golfers have spent too much time kicking themselves and cursing their luck and spending too little time heeding Ben Hogan's advice to stop and smell the flowers along the fairway.

Luckily for me I have hit so many lousy shots in more than forty years as a golfer, that I have developed a sort of immunity to the jitters. Here's my secret: One day I noticed that everyone on the course was as nervous as I was. Everybody else was so worried about his or her own game, they barely noticed how I was hitting the ball. Golf got more relaxing after that. No easier, but a lot more fun.

At one of the games, we played a "Scramble" with groups of four players, which is a format that allows every member of a team to hit a drive, then pick the best one and play again from there. So your group gets four tries at every shot. A scramble makes for low scores and plenty of team spirit.

Vocational Visit with the Rotary Club of Canggu, Bali

On Sunday 28th April, we were invited to join the Rotary Club of Canggu on a vocational visit to one of the President's villas that he manages through their company, INDOHOMES. The meeting took the format of a BBQ luncheon at an exclusive near Tanah Lot. The villa comprised six double bedrooms, seven bathrooms, a full gym, swimming pool, complete with gazebo and outdoor entertaining area, set in landscaped gardens a stone's throw from the beach. From the viewing deck on the third floor, guests can obtain an incredible view of sunsets over the Indian Ocean.







The meeting was opened, and a motion to suspend standing orders was received and voted on, and the meeting subsequently closed. The president, Mark Savage, had pre cooked two legs of

lamb that we had brought up from Perth, and the staff cooked the sausages on the BBQ that we also brought up from Perth. Ten other members of the Canggu Club and their partners, along with four Rotaractors attended, and all brought plates of delicious food to share. President Mark and his wife Lisa, showed everybody over the villa before we settled into the gazebo where we shared a fantastic afternoon, eating the sumptuous food laid out before us, and washing it down with fine wine and ice cold beer.







When the mercury rose, and we all became overheated, it was time to plunge into the pool, and cool down whilst chatting and enjoying fantastic Rotary fellowship. Our conversation touched on many subjects and them members expressed their appreciation to the Rotary Club of Melville for its assistance with the Lombok project. We also discussed the possibility of another Malaria eradication project on Timor Leste, and the possibility of a matching grant from the Rotary Foundation.

The Rotary Club of Canggu is very pro-active, and after the success of their Black and White Ball, they are now venturing on a pop up Trash and Treasure market. This might sound like an unusual concept, but as they have no fixed venue at this point, their aim is to pop up at different locations, which is a concept we could consider in the future.

With the close proximity it may be worth considering a sister club relationship with the Rotary Club of Canggu.

ROTARY CLUB OF MELVILLE MEETING REPORTS

Meeting Date: Monday 6th May, 2019 Venue: South of Perth Yacht Club Scribe Marilyn Barton

Acting Sergeant Leigh Smith called the meeting to order at 12.30pm precisely. The meeting opened with Massimo Cau reading the Rotary charge to the 23 Rotarians present. Guest included Bruce Ivers, Lorel Maybury, and former Rotary club of Melville member, Peter Sim.

Peter Smith introduced Lorel Maybury to give us an update on the Borderless Friendship Organisation. She talked about the work that the organisation has done, and that they now have forty young people about to graduate, with one person applying for university. Lorel and her team also are continuing Sexual Education with these communities in order to steer them away from allowing their young girl to enter the prostitution trade. Lorel encouraged anyone who would like to sponsor a child to do so, at cost of \$40.00 per month. The children will write letters updating you on third progress. Lorel told u about a girl Marlee, who was nine years old when the programme began, and she is now bout to graduate. Lorel was then presented with a cheque of \$5,000 by Peter Smith, Chair of the International committee.

Our next speaker was Bruce Ivers who updated us on the programme Trees4Change - a tree planting programme for young people. The programme started when a neighbour complained about the ugliness of the front of Ardross primary school, and Bruce planted some seedlings. Some years later, the aspect now looks really beautiful, with the trees now grown and covering the area. They started with one propagation bench, and now have a nursery. The Trees4Change programme encourages children to go out and plant trees, as well as being involved in a Noongar Experience programme.

Bruce demonstrated a tree planter which saves you having to bend over to plant the seeds. The seeds are dropped in the top of the tube and one lever is used to push the tube into the ground and another to let the seed go. They are \$400.00 each and have made the job of seed planting much easier and quicker.

Bruce also talked about the different research he is doing in looking at the best type of seedling protection "tree guards" and also whether it is more economical to buy seedlings in a seedling tray or in separate seed pods.

After the two talks, President Lynne presented Lorel and Bruce with a "Be the Inspiration" pins.

During the reports section of the meeting, Massimo reported that the markets were quiet, as rain was expected, even though it didn't eventuate. There were two Heads and Tails and tickets to a photo art exhibition were the prize, with two tickets being won by Lyn Ware and James Morris. President Lynne remined everyone about the District Assembly for the Secretary, Treasurer and all Chairpersons on the 19th May, 2019, the Art Show in June.
