# Why the last mile is so important

### 1 There were more cases of wild poliovirus in 2018 than in 2017. Should we be discouraged?

No, not at all. We've always expected the number of cases to fluctuate somewhat as we get closer to zero. We've gone four straight years with fewer than 100 cases per year. That's an indicator of great progress. With dedication from governments and Rotarians in areas still affected by polio, we'll get there.

### 2 Why is it so difficult to eradicate a disease like polio?

Remember that even in the United States, where the polio vaccine was readily available, it still took 20 years to become polio-free. And the areas we are working in now don't have health systems that are as well-developed as in the United States.

### 3 What challenges are you seeing now?

We have been working intensely in the endemic countries — Afghanistan, Nigeria, and Pakistan — for a number of years, and some of the citizens in those countries are getting overworked that we are spending money on polio eradication

when they have so many other needs. There's some resistance to keep on receiving immunizations for polio and polio alone. Our challenge is to find ways to provide other services to the citizens and children so we still have the parental support we need — to provide the "plus" in PolioPlus.

### 4 What role does armed conflict play in those areas?

It makes the logistics of immunization be more difficult. The Global Polio Eradication Initiative partnership is not only dealing with governments — we're dealing with anti-government elements as well. While we've worked to gain everyone's trust and support, we've had areas that were inaccessible to immunization teams for months and sometimes years at a time.

### 5 Do immunization teams know when they miss children? Or are there children they don't even know about?

I think we have a good handle now on knowing when and where we're missing children. The challenge is to keep reducing the number we miss. In Nigeria, we have done a lot of work since we were surprised by the discovery of

several polio cases in Borno state in 2018, two years after the country had last seen a polio case. We now know through GPS mapping where the children are, and we are working with authorities there to make sure all children receive the polio vaccine.

### 6 Where are we seeing successes?

We haven't had any cases of wild poliovirus anywhere in the world in nearly five years except in the three endemic countries. And in Nigeria, it's been almost three years since we had any wild poliovirus cases, and those occurred in a small area of the country.

### 7 What's the most important thing Rotarians should know?

I've been extremely impressed with the dedication and persistence of Rotarians in Afghanistan, Nigeria, and Pakistan. They are working hard to make sure polio is eradicated. It's pretty amazing what they do in those countries.

Rotarians should continue to be supportive and to support eradication. We also need Rotarians to bring the need for continued funding to the attention of their government leaders. We can't lose sight of the goal. — DRAGI ZECHE

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## ROTARY CLUBS AROUND THE WORLD

The Rotary Club of Whistler Millennium was founded in 2000 when a few members of the Rotary club of Whistler, which meets at 7.15am decided to start a lunch club. The club now has 23 members, aged from people in their 30's to their 70's, and 13 of whom are women, and it helps give people a sense of community in an area that has a lot of transient people and tourists. Many only live and work in Whistler for a season and then move on. Only about 12,000 people actually call Whistler home.

One of the club's most important projects is to help the town's seasonal workers acclimate to a new and unfamiliar country. The club hosts a pancake breakfast every November, when the new seasonal workers arrive, as part of the Whistler Community Services Society's Welcome Week. Club members also work to keep the area beautiful, doing things like clearing underbrush to prevent forest fires.

The setting is idyllic, between the peaks of the Whistler and Blackcomb mountains with green forested valleys and snow capped mountains, and with the wonders of a natural environment at their doorstep, club members make outdoor sports a part of their daily life. So it makes sense that their annual fundraiser is a 10 km walk called the Brandywine Boogie.

At the club meetings, lunch is usually a Cobb salad or a ham and cheese sandwich, and after lunch a piggy bank in the shape of a bear (being Canada), each person adds a dollar or more and shares a bit of news.

The Rotary Club of Whistler meets at 12.15pm on Thursdays at the Pan Pacific Whistler Mountainside hotel. The view from the window is impressive.

**Meeting Date: Monday 13<sup>th</sup> May, 2019**

The meeting opened with the Rotary Charge being read by Kareena Ballard. After the introduction of special guest, Patricia Jamieson from the Rotary club of Canggü, and Kwenele Ndlovu from the workplace Equality Project, a special meeting was called to vote on the Rotary Club of Melville Constitution and ByLaws.

David Porter gave a brief outline as to how and why the Rotary Club of Melville Constitution and ByLaws have been updated. A copy of these had been sent to all members on 15<sup>th</sup> April, 2019. He then put forward a motion that the new Constitution be adopted. This was seconded by the secretary Ralph Newton and was passed unanimously.

David Porter then proposed that the Rotary Club of Melville Bylaws adopt the ByLaws. This was again seconded by the Secretary, Ralph Newton, and was passed unanimously.

The new Constitution and ByLaws will be in the new Rotary Club of Melville Club Manual which should be completed by the end of the year.

President Lynne thanked David Porter and D McKinnon for all the work they have done in regards to these two documents.

Ross Ballard, as Chair of the Community Committee, and committee member, Reza Jafari then introduced the guest speaker, Kwenele Ndlovu and her and her involvement in the Gender Equity Project at UWA. Kwenele spoke to us about how the university aims to get women who have children to have financial support for childcare to help continue their studies, including attending important conferences. Many women stop studying because of the limitations when they have children.

UWA has gender equity for both men and women in the Science Dept. They aim to increase the number of women studying science and as such have a programme called “Girls in engineering Programe”. The future plan for UWA 2020-2030 is to create a culture that gets women into top positions.



Kwenele was then presented with a cheque which would give a scholarship for two women to help them continue their studies. The selection criteria would be that the women were high performers scholastically, they need to write an essay on why they need the scholarship, and hopefully will come along and share their stories with the Rotary Club of Melville.

In the reports section of the meeting the market report was given by Kareena Ballard. She said that James Morris was the captain and assisted by Laura Porrato and Terry Newby. The market was full, which was very good considering that it was Mother's Day.

Kareena Ballard also reported that the security guard can be used to assist in any altercations. Also Glen has now done a refresher First Aid course. She also mentioned that the Lower Spinner has vacancies, so if there are any groups such as sporting organisations that need to do some fundraising, then please let Kareena know, as it is important this spinner is also manned.

Another great meeting, this time upstairs in the Ward Room of the Yacht Club, with 20 Rotarians and two guests present

Our first speaker was Jenny Jones who is a polio survivor. Polio is a motor neuron disease attacking the nerve endings in the body and causing atrophy. There are 1,00-1200 survivors of polio in Western Australia alone.

Jenny contracted polio as a small child before going to school, because immunisations were given once a child went to school. At first she was hospitalised, and then after recovering at home, Jenny didn't want the world to pass her by. She began to attend school, but had to go in a baby's pram, as she was unable to use her legs. She attended Palmyra primary school, John Curtin SHS, Princess May, and forged a career in teaching, as well as getting married and having children.

Although Jenny appeared to have overcome the afflictions of polio, she had some health scares later in life, due to the after effects of polio. It hit her once when she was swimming and ran out of energy to push her muscles any further, resulting in rehabilitation at Shenton Park.

Last year, Jenny's body shut down and she became seriously ill, once again due to the late affects of polio. She found the experience terrifying, as she did not know what was happening to her. The first sign that something was wrong when all her muscles were aching, and then a little while later she collapsed due to her legs giving way. She also had other paralytic episodes.

Treatment has included complete rest. As a result, Jenny had to take time out for herself and to recover, and she now is careful about not overcommitting herself, and takes time out to rest when she finds her muscles begin to ache. She is now focussed on "seeing all the beauty around her", rather than rushing from here to there.

Jenny's talk was followed by a talk by Paul Cavendish. Paul described Jenny's later polio effects as "Post Polio Syndrome."

Paul reported that Australia was declared polio free in 2,000, as the last person to contract it in Australia was in 1996. Despite Australia being declared polio free, the virus was found in waste water in Melbourne last year. With the speed of world travel today, polio is still just around the corner, and until it is fully eradicated, it is the vaccinations (now given at 8 weeks of age) that stop us contracting it.

Rotary is a massive supporter of getting every child in the world against polio, and every dollar raised through rotary in the name of polio plus (eradication), will be more than double by the Melinda and Bill Gates foundation, who very much support the work of Rotary.



After the excellent presentations, two new members, Colin Delane and Bruce Thomas were inducted in the rotary Club of Melville and were warmly welcomed by everyone present. PDG David Barton said in his introduction that they were the rest of Ralph Newton's crew on his yacht, Eu Na Mara, as there were already other crew members in the club.

Announcements followed, and David Hewitt asked Janice Pounder to report on Assembly on Sunday 19<sup>th</sup> May. Janice reported that she attended with other Rotarians from the rotary Club of Melville and she learnt a lot. There were a couple of take home messages for Janice. One was that committees should meet regularly every month, and they should be including new member, and helping them with various projects.

A second take home message was that the Facebook page would not have social gathering advertised, but instead stories about the Rotary Club and what it has done over the years.

The market report was given by Mike Rainsford who was the captain and ably assisted by Marilyn Barton and Doug Minchin. David Barton came along, but was sent home to keep his knee operation out of the cold, and it was cold!!!! Two degrees!!!! Despite the cold, the market was almost full, and as the morning wore on and warmed up slightly, lots of buyers came along. The lower spinner was manned by Doug Minchin's grandson, Josh, who was raising money for a school project to help out the aged.

Doug Minchin announced the results of the golf day the Friday before and the winning team (on handicap) (Doug Minchin, Janice and Ian Pounder and Marilyn Barton) were presented with the perpetual trophy to be held by them until the next golf day this time next year.



David Porter, director of the Youth Committee, reported that the RYPEN camp was held over the weekend and all who attended really enjoyed it.

The meeting concluded with a game of Heads and Tails, and a lovely bottle of McLaren Vale Sauvignon Blanc was won by one of our guest speaker, Paul Cavendish.
