International Toast

Tonight's international toast is to the Rotary Club of Barrie, Ontario, in Rotary district 7010 which has 44 clubs with 1680 members in part of Ontario and Quebec.

The Rotary club of Barrie received charter in 1946, has 137 members who meet on Thursdays at 12-15pm at the Southshore Community Centre.

The Rotary club of Barrie has supported polio plus, an orphanage in Kenya, distribution of wheelchairs in Jamaica, and other international projects, is supporting construction The Trans Canada trail, a recreational trail connecting all areas of Canada from the Atlantic to Pacific to Arctic oceans.

Barrie Rotary Club is heavily involved tree planting in the local area, also supporting local charities requests for funds.

The club has a number of fundraising events such as organising an annual Internet and TV auction of donated goods and services, running an arts and crafts festival, running an Oktoberfest event, organising a Spring Tonic Maple Syrup Festival and organising an annual fun Run.

General Business

The general business centred around the Club's management committee meeting held prior to the usual weekly meeting getting underway.

Main items discussed were:

- Guest speaker – if you can't arrange a speaker, let PP Geoff Fry know and Geoff will endeavour to cover for you but give Geoff as much notice as possible – a month at least would be good.
- Members to attend meetings of the other Bathurst Rotary Clubs – do this 10 times a year, and to go

in groups of 2. The other clubs to be invited to our meetings.

- Membership evening – finger food provided with the main purpose being to highlight the activities of our Club, not just Rotary and Rotary International in general.
- Associated membership – to be further considered.
- International Project – suggested we start off in a small way by supporting the Rotary Club of Dili. We could for example, “dip our toe in the water” by sponsoring one local to become a Rotary member. It costs \$ 375.00 to sponsor one local.

Members were asked by President Peter to consider these and other ideas and put suggestions to the Committee.

Guest Speaker

Unfortunately we were unable to have a guest speaker again this week.

Three Minuter

PP Bob Newton presented the “three minuter”, giving a very interesting discourse on a very famous Bathurst landmark his grandfather helped to build, namely the Bathurst Carillion (and the tower it sits in).

The Carillion cost £ 4,002.00 to build, taking 13 years from concept to completion.

There are 35 bells in the tower, many of which were named after local villages that assisted raising the necessary construction funds by selling tea and scones, conducting raffles and other fund “raisers”. There is the “White Rock” bell, the “Rockley” bell, the “Raglan” bell and so on.

No scaffolding was used during construction with the construction being achieved hand over hand working from the inside, leaning out to place the bricks.

Opening day was 13 November 1933 and was officially opened by Ald. M. J. Griffin, the Mayor of Bathurst at the time with a crowd of around 8,000 in attendance.

“The Bathurst Times” described the occasion as: “Never before has there been in this City such a magnificent manifestation of combined loyalty and civic pride”.

Notwithstanding the Newton family connection, the thing still hasn't fallen down – thanks Bob.


The final question was:.. How do you explain the difference between COMPLETE and FINISHED in a way that is easy to understand.
