Guest Speaker

Our guest speaker tonight was Grant Paterson, an asset technician at Bathurst Regional Council and a former independent sports and turf consultant, who has over 27 years' experience in golf, bowls and cricket.

Grant was introduced to the meeting by Rtn Tony Pollard, acting on behalf of PP Geoff Fry who could not be in attendance tonight.

Grant has a certificate in green keeping, is a certified automotive mechanic, holds a diploma in Information Technology and is an accredited Australian Cricket Board Level 'O' Coach.

An interesting discourse on Grant's experiences with stadium ground construction and just exactly how the surface preparation has changed from years ago where players had to use a wet, muddy unpleasant ground to the latest using various scientific methods.

Typically, a playing surface profile now has a consolidated base upon which 100mls of gravel is placed, with a water table forming under a layer of sand with (of course) the turf at the top. The sand is very important and is usually 300ml deep being medium in density with an organic amendment.

Along with the modern drainage methods now used, this allows for any particular stadium to be used for different purposes with very fast changes to the surface being possible.

Grant also spoke of his time overseas visiting various countries illustrating his talk with a PowerPoint presentation on the places and people he encountered.

While in Kuwait in 2004, Grant took advantage of an offer to fly in Bell Iroquois helicopter, and used the flight to check a golf course he was working on.

After his talk, many questions were asked indicating the level of interest generated. Grant was thanked by Bill Dickie on behalf of the meeting, and presented Grant with one of our unbelievably world famous coffee mugs.

A Brief History of the Bathurst 1000

The Bathurst 1000 (currently called the Supercheap Auto Bathurst 1000) is a 1,000 kilometre touring car race held annually at Mount Panorama Circuit in Bathurst, New South Wales, Australia. The Armstrong 500, which became the Hardie Ferodo 500/1000 and later the Bathurst 1000, was first held on 20 November 1960 at Phillip Island in Victoria over 500-mile (800 km) to determine which car had the best combination of speed, performance and reliability.

The popularity of the race continued to grow so rapidly during the 1960s that by 1966 most major manufacturers operating in the Australian market became heavily involved in what became known as "the Great Race". This is because an outright win in the long and tough race would add great credibility to the car and its brand, especially in proving the winning car-brand offered the best overall package in terms of performance, durability, reliability and image. This proved to be a great marketing opportunity to increase sales and market share in the local market, and so the famous "Win on Sunday, Sell on Monday" concept was born.

Notably, it was during this period that the famous Holden-Ford-Chrysler rivalry originated. Holden has won the most races of all the car makes (25) and Ford is the second most successful with 14. The Bathurst 1000 race was initially intended for small vehicles, as it was thought V8s would struggle due to the conditions and the required driving techniques. However, a Mini Cooper S' outright win in 1966 was the last time a naturally aspirated 4 cylinder car won at Bathurst. From then on V8s and V6s have dominated the winners table. The most successful driver at Bathurst is Peter Brock, whose nine victories (1972, 1975, 1978–80, 1982–84 and 1987) earned him the nickname King of the Mountain.

The track itself is the most famous landmark in the small inland city of Bathurst. In total the track drops 174m from top to bottom. The race begins at the bottom of Mount Panorama and follows a series of sharp turns, steep straights and huge drops. The cars can reach up to 300km/hour near the end of the track, on the longest racing straight in Australia (1.9km in length). Bathurst 1000 continues to draw crowds of thousands and will no doubt remain Australia's most popular racing event for many years to come.

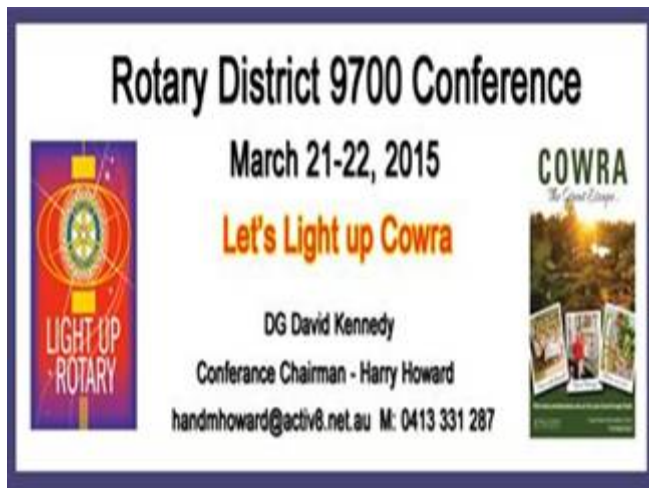

"If you don't have GI insurance, and you go into battle and get killed, the government has to pay only a maximum of \$6000."

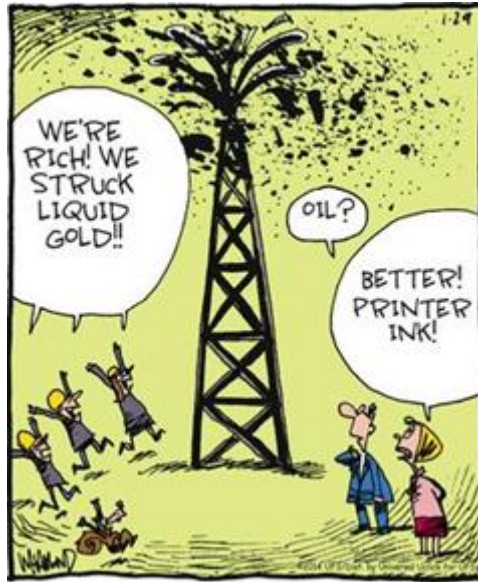

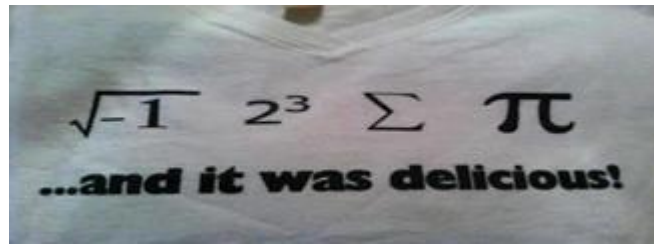

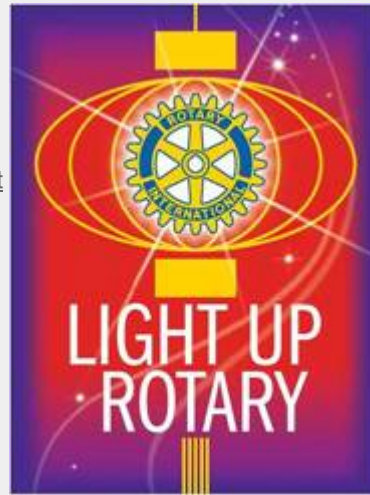
Rotary is ordinary people around the world sharing their professional skills and working together in a social environmental to build better communities.
