### **STUFF YOU NEED TO KNOW**

June 1, 1869: Thomas Edison beat his competitors to the punch - or at least the patent office - and was issued an official U.S. copyright on his device, #90,646...the first voting machine. Edison, best known for inventing the lightbulb, movie-making and sound recording, is not remembered for one of his biggest flops, the voting machine, but it could have changed the course of American history - that is, if it had ever been given a chance. While he went on to have 1,093 patents to his name in his lifetime,

at the time he was a lowly telegraph operator, recently fired from Western Union for tinkering with a lead-acid battery (which leaked sulfuric acid onto the floor, irreparably damaging it) on the job. The event drove him to work on what would become his first patented invention: a machine which recorded the ballots of would-be voters with the help of a simple switch and an electric current. Washington, D.C.'s city council was considering the utility of a mechanical recorder in lieu of roll calling votes, having reps say "aye" or "nay" one by one, with a scribe tallying up the votes. Edison's plan was to speed up the process with a machine, which he named the "electrographic vote-recorder," that let legislators vote with the flip of a switch - one end would signifive a "yes" vote, and the other a "no" vote - and deliver the information via electric current to a main recorder, which would dispense the votes into two columns. After the legislators voted, a clerk would feed a piece of chemically-treated paper, which would then be used to "print" the votes out for everyone to see. Unfortunately, the machine might have been a bit too ahead of its time. Edison's took it to the nation's capital to showcase it to Congress. The response? The chairman of the committee responsible for rubber-stamping the machine for government use scoffed, "if there is any invention on earth that we don't want down here, that is it." The manual roll call method "enabled members of government bodies to filibuster legislation or convince others to change their votes." The Senate still uses the roll call method to this day.

When we talk about "Rotary Fellowships", we actually refer to the groups of Rotarians, Rotarian spouses and Rotaractors who join together to: Share a common interest in worthwhile recreational activities. Rotary Fellowships are intended to be a great way to make new friends around the world and enhance your Rotary experience. Rotary

Fellowships are international, independently organized groups of Rotarians, family members, program participants and alumni, who share a common passion....The oldest fellowship dates back to 1947 when a group of Rotarians who loved sailing began flying the Rotary flag from their boats, calling themselves the International Yachting Fellowship of Rotarians. Today, more than 3,300 Rotarians sail together in one of 109 Rotary fleets in 37 countries.... Currently, more than 60 other fellowships similarly unite Rotarians in friendship..... These groups range from cycling to skiing, Latin culture to jazz, doctors to photographers, and even wine-tasting to beer. One Rotarian writes, "I recently joined the Recreational Vehicle Fellowship and rallied for a week in Tucson, with 12 couples from Canada, California, Colorado, Texas and Arizona. We toured local attractions together, shared meals and enjoyed the comradery of like-minded leaders including two past DG's. My wife Kathleen and I hope to join the thousands of Rotarians in the United Kingdom who caravan together in recreational vehicles across Europe every summer."....The Rotary Wine Appreciation Fellowship is a learning tool for those who are interested in sharing ideas on all aspects of wine appreciation. Most fellowships have an email newsletter....Many fellowships use their special interests to serve others. The Fellowship of Canoeing Rotarians has organized cleanups of polluted rivers; members of the International Computer Users Fellowship have conducted training sessions for Rotarians and others in their community. Developing friendships by participating in a Rotary Fellowships can help improve your understanding of the world. "The best way to cultivate international understanding is through business and social intercourse," said Paul Harris at the Pacific Rotary Conference in Tokyo, 1928. Could we create a fellowship that would unite members of all our RGV clubs? Would such a fellowship help recruit new members? Sure we could.
