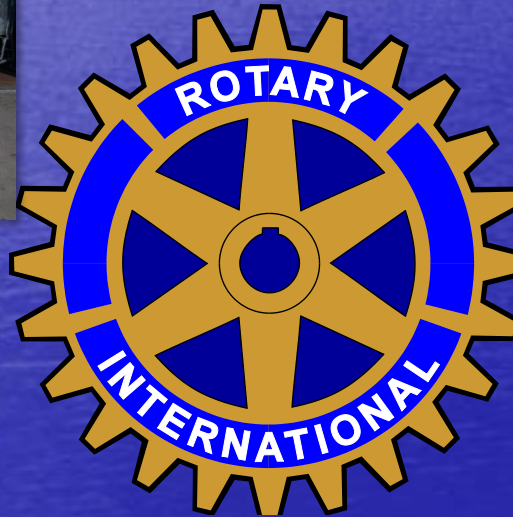

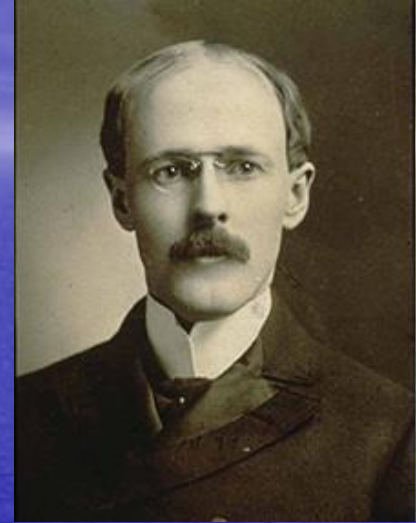
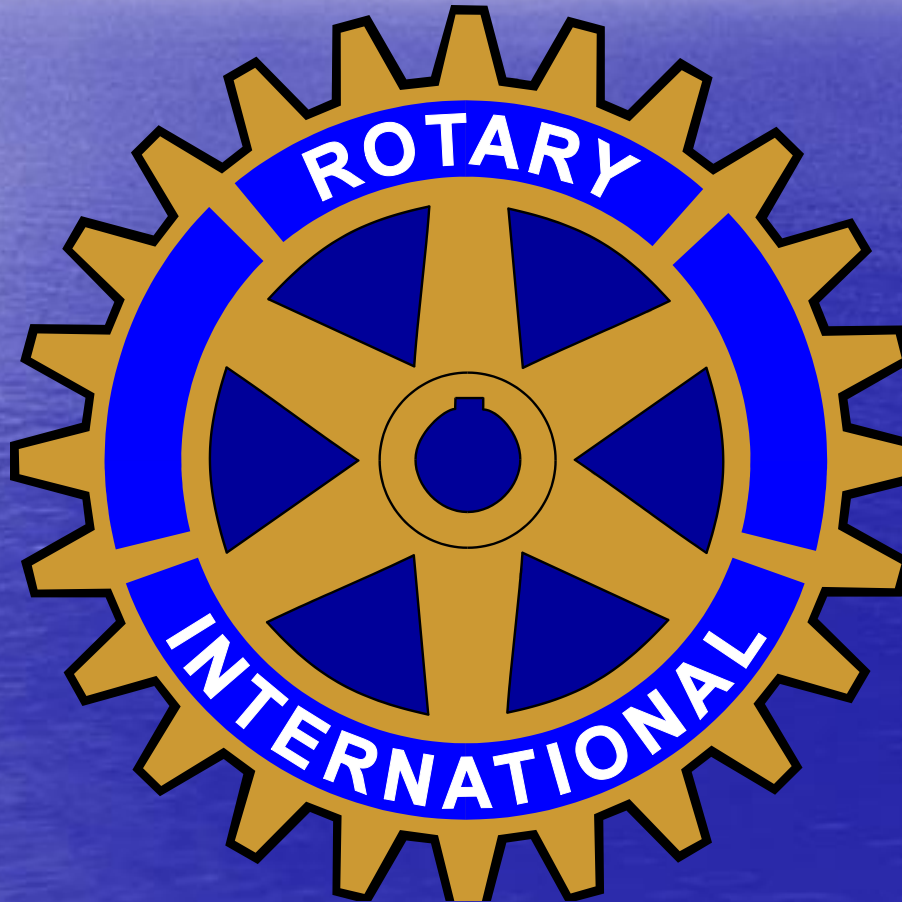

Founded 23rd Feb 1905

- Paul Harris (lawyer), Sylvester Schiele (coal dealer), Gus Loehr (mining engineer) & Hiram Shorey (merchant tailor).
- Sylvester was the 1st Rotary club president.
- 16 Clubs formed the National Organization in 1910
- Rotary became International in 1911 with Winnipeg, Canada's Charter with Paul Harris as RI's 1st President
- The meetings "Rotated" from office to office, thus the name.



Rotary Founders



- Rotarians have not only been present for major events in history—we've been a part of them.

- **Rotary International** is an international service organization whose stated purpose is to bring together business and professional leaders in order to provide humanitarian services, encourage high ethical standards in all vocations, and help build goodwill and peace in the world.
- It is a secular organization open to all persons regardless of race, color, creed, religion, gender, or political preference.
- The members of Rotary Clubs are known as **Rotarians**. Members usually meet weekly for breakfast, lunch, or dinner, which is a social event as well as an opportunity to organize work on their service goals.



What Rotarians Strive To Do

- Set an example of high ethical standards
- Encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise
- Search for the right people, not people with the right Classification to serve in Rotary
- “Service above Self” is our primary Motto — revised 1950
- Our secondary motto is, “One profits most who serves best.” — revised 2010

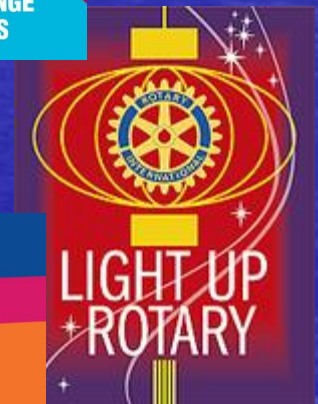
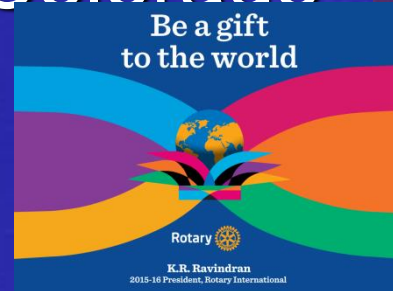
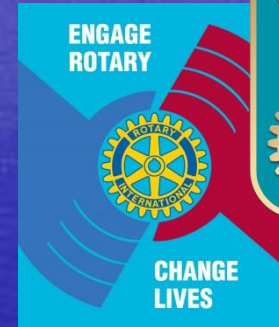
Rotary is an International Organization

Rotary International

A Global Network of Community Volunteers

- Governed by a President, President - Elect and a Board of 19 Members, 17 Directors, President and Vice-President.

Clubs elect the directors from all over the world every year at Rotary's international convention and each director serves for two years.

Each District elects a District Governor.

Vocational Service

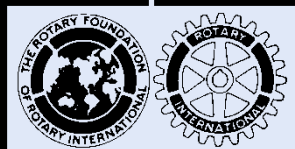

PolioPlus Accomplishments



- Rotary launched PolioPlus in 1985 and was a founding member of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative in 1988.
- Through decades of commitment and work by Rotary and our partners, more than 2.5 billion children in 122 countries have received the oral polio vaccine.

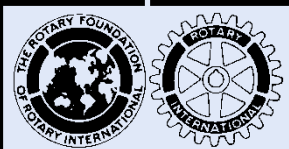

- \$1,000 DONATION = FELLOW
 - RECOGNITION
 - OPEN TO ROTARIANS & NON-ROTARIANS
 - District Matching Fund Programs
 - Rotary Direct – most efficient
- SUSTAINING PROGRAM = \$100/year, each year
- PAUL HARRIS SOCIETY = \$1,000 each year / \$84/month
- Benefactor – \$1,000 through estate
- Bequest Society– \$10,000 through estate



Salida Sunrise Rotary

- SSR Club
 - Club Bylaws establish the organization structure and high level operation
 - Policy Statements (ex. Code of Conduct, Dues, Meeting Programs / Presentations, Donations, etc.)
- SSR Charitable Fund
 - Articles of Incorporation filed Oct 2014
 - 501(c)(3) status received in Dec 2014
 - Bylaws establish how organized & run
 - Separate organization from the SSR club

- ❖ Fiscal year starts June 1st



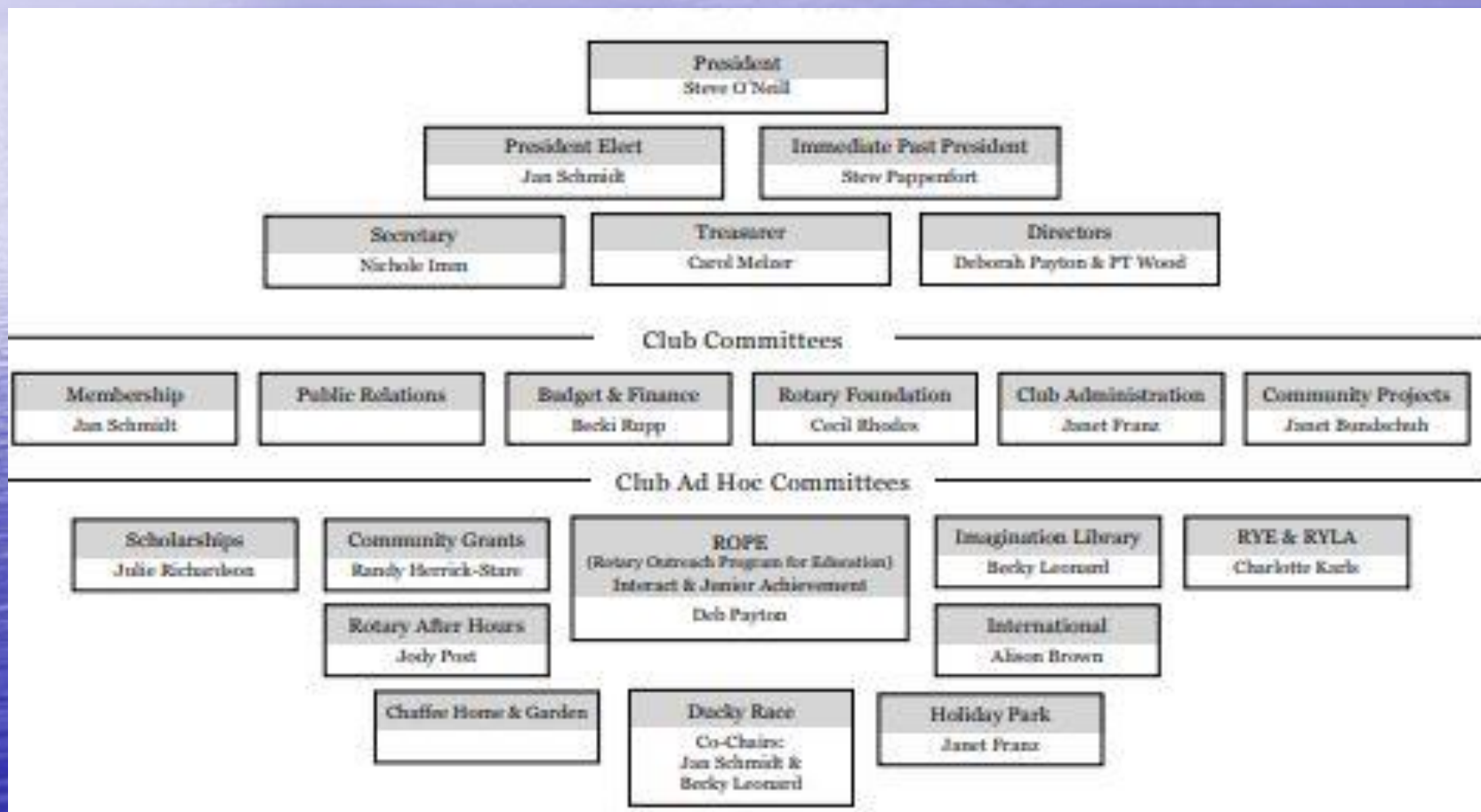
