<small>Fill out your name and a charity that's important to you each time you attend a meeting. Drawing will be at the last meeting of the month and the winner's charity will receive a \$100 donation in their honor. *Charities must be 501c3 or local organization accepted by the club board.</small>	

As a club, we want to support the causes that are important to our members, both through service and through donations. If something is worthy of your charitable giving, we can get behind that!

Starting the second week of December, we will begin a new monthly drawing called Charity of Choice. Here's how it works:

Each time you attend a regular meeting you will fill out a form (see sample above) with your name and charity of choice, and drop it in the box. Preferably this is a cause that you also make donations to or help out with! The forms will be available right at check-in for the meetings. At the end of each month, we will do a drawing from all of the forms that have accumulated and the winner's charity will receive a \$100 donation in their honor.

This is limited to members only (no guests), you get one for each regular meeting you attend (makeups don't count) and your charity is subject to review by the club board. After the monthly drawing we dump all the forms and start fresh the following month.
