2021 Event Wrap Up

Congratulations to the committee and all volunteers who helped with this year's 26th annual Seneca River Days. The festivities on the island were a welcomed sight after all of our social distancing in the last year and a half, and the response from the community was phenomenal. We broke a record for duck tickets sales (not counting the year we made people buy a duck ticket to get onto the island), with 2,895 ducks in the pluck. We also had tremendous support from local businesses, the community and our own members with sponsorships and donations that covered the cost of 14 prizes worth over \$3,500, paid for our bands and made sure we had a gorgeous fireworks display over the river at the end of the night. The library also came through with fun activities for the kids throughout the day and even sponsors like SECNY made stopping by their booth fun for the little ones. WHAT WE'VE LEARNED

August brought another month of great programs (thanks Programs Chair Barb Hunt!) where we learned a lot about a lot of different topics. Here's a little look back at knowledge we gained just by going to a Rotary Meeting.

VERA HOUSE

Nicole from Vera House gave us a rundown of all the ways in which their organization serves the community, from immediate crisis care, to counseling, to programs that can help end domestic violence before it starts. 3GNY - DESCENDANTS OF HOLOCAUST SURVIVORS

David Reckess, Executive Director of 3GNY, shared with our group his grandmother's story of escaping a concentration camp in Poland during the Holocaust. The bravery of his Bubbe Sarah and her family, the people who risked their lives to help escaped Jews and his skillful story-telling were moving to all who attended. The organization he runs encourages second and third generations of Holocaust survivors to tell their family stories in order to keep that important oral history alive and teaches them how to tell that story in 20 minutes. They then take those talks into schools because children who hear first hand (or even second or third hand in this case) about the Holocaust come away with a more real understanding, a more humanized perspective, that encourages empathy. Teaching compassion at a young age has a long-lasting impact. KINDRED KINGDOMS

We learned some more about animals this month with a visit from Jean Soprano, a wildlife rescuer with a big facility just on the edge of Phoenix. They primarily rescue wild birds, but also rehabilitate baby bears and other wildlife. Her presentation focused on the care that goes into getting these animals back into their natural habitat. One important tip she taught is that it is a myth that mommy and daddy birds will abandon their babies if we touch them. If you find a baby bird on the ground under a tree, it fell out. Create a nest by poking holes in the bottom of a plastic dish (like a cottage cheese container), fill it with some soft bedding and tack it up in that same tree as high as you can reach. Put baby in there and its' parents will come find it. They even do this with really large baby birds of prey! We hope to have Jean come visit us again and bring one of her feathered friends so we can meet it in real life. You can learn more and donate to support their work at www.KindredKingdoms.com.


