### **OUR PROGRAM: BOB RICHARDSON, AUBURN CITY MANAGER**

uburn is a great place to call home, but just what is it that makes it so special? Well, take a look at the collection of photos adjacent to this article and you have just a small hint of why we love this place. But it takes more than just historical (and some not so historical) landmarks and the self-designated moniker of "Endurance Capital of the World" to attract and keep businesses and homeowners in the area happy. So, what is the general economic health of Auburn these days? Here are some answers from the city's website:

- Real estate activity is strong with far more demand than available inventory.
   In short, people want to live in Auburn and most homes aren't staying on the market more than a week.
- Since the beginning of 2011, Auburn has had an average sales tax growth of 20% per quarter.
- Few retail spaces are available in town.
- Building permits are up 33% over estimates.
- Hotel tax revenues are coming in over estimates.
- 30 new businesses moved into the airport industrial park area last year.
- Auburn Airport hangar space is almost completely filled.
- Efforts to co-locate the California Welcome Center and Auburn Chamber of Commerce, along with public restroom amenities and new community meeting spaces across from Central Square at our "Old City Hall."
- Development of ongoing summer entertainment in Central Square as it becomes a comfortable place for community gathering.
- Renovations of East Placer Park for enhanced safety and ambiance.

nanger Jordan Fisher Smith, author of Nature Noir: A Park Ranger's Patrol in the Sierra, had worked in the Sierra Nevada, the Grand Tetons, and Alaska.

But he found the greatest adventure of his life when he took a job watching over forty-eight miles of the American River canyons long condemned to be inundated by the Auburn Dam.

By the time Smith arrived on the American River, former residents had been bought out or condemned by the federal Bureau of Reclamation and their homes, mining cabins, and ranches were being burned to the ground as the river's canyons were readied to go underwater. But the dam's completion was delayed and what remained was a giant vacant lot of 42,000 rugged acres, which became a dangerous free zone for armed squatters, gold prospectors, and fugitives from the law. Over the next decade three dozen people would perish on Smith's beat in accidents, murders, and suicides. Intending to stay only a year, Smith emerged from the American River canyons fourteen years later, his body wracked by Lyme disease he'd contracted from a tick bite there. Unable to forget what he'd witnessed, he spent another four years researching the river's human and natural history.

Now Jordan Fisher Smith has published a book about his experiences to rave reviews. "He writes about the natural world with more grace than anyone since Edward Abbey," says Newsweek. The New York Times calls Nature Noir "eloquently meditative." And Outside Magazine asserts: "Nature Noir marks the debut of a terrific new nature writer."

"At the tip of the Foresthill Divide just before the dead man descended the last grade onto the bridge, there is a place where the new road to the bridge had been blasted through a hill of greenstone. Since the cuts were exposed in the seventies, tufts of apricot monkey flower, Mimulus bifidus, had grown all over them, in pockets of soil carried down from above by rain and gravity. In the late spring these incredibly tough plants were covered with thousands of azalealike yellow-orange blooms, and in recent years this unlikely spot had become one of the best places on the Bureau's land to see them.

Although thousands of people drove that road, I had never seen anyone stop and admire these gardens, and I doubted that the dead man did either. We are all so caught up in the struggles we get into on the way to the lives we dream of, and the dead man was probably just a little farther down that road than the rest of us. Maybe he had lost a good woman, a good job, or a good friend, or maybe he'd never had them. Or maybe it was bad chemicals, of internal or external origin, that pushed him over the edge.

But maybe he was just suffering from the same regret we've all known at one time or another, when life hasn't lived up to our expectations. . . if people are doing something wrong, refuse to cooperate; if the music's too sad, for God's sake change the station or turn the radio off. Stop before the bridge. Get out. Walk down the road. Sniff the air, and if it smells good, breathe deep."
