## FROM THE DUGOUT AREA 8

The eight Area 8 Clubs in our District continue their high level of activity with so many events and great fundraisers, it would take too long to list them all. We also have several Area wide programs with participation from several or all Area 8 clubs. These include the KNPB Young Writers Contest, Achievement Beyond Obstacles Scholarship Program, the Foundation Dinner, and support for Awaken's effort to provide awareness about human trafficking and support for its victims and Bridges Out of Poverty. Last year one very successful project was raising \$25,000 to fund one room in the newly enlarged Veterans Guest House; veterans and their families can stay at this facility when receiving treatment at the local VA Hospital. The following are highlights of Achievement Beyond Obstacles Scholarship Program and our planning for the Foundation Dinner on January 11.

The Achievement Beyond Obstacles (ABO) Scholarship Program has reached out to the schools of the Reno/Sparks area for nominations of students that meet our criteria: will be graduating high school in 2019, have had major life challenges, and could succeed at the next level of education (university, community college, trade school, etc.). The selected students are required to attend a Leadership Weekend on November 10 and 11 led by Dean and Rochelle Whellams (of REGL and RYLA fame). They are then invited to a Financial Literacy Workshop on December 8. Starting in January we hold monthly meetings with the students and the University of Nevada's Dean's Future Scholar (DFS) students, many of whom have similar backgrounds. The DFS students that support our program are college students that can help the ABO students learn more about what to expect at the next level of education. In April, the students will give a short talk at one of the four sponsoring Rotary Clubs (Reno South, Reno, Sparks and Reno Central) which helps them to further deal with their experiences and be more committed to their future education; they are awarded \$100 at this time. Based on all our interactions, ABO judges will select the students for larger scholarships. It is a great program and all Rotarians involved benefit from the students. On Friday, January 11, Area 8 and 9 will hold their annual Foundation Dinner at the Atlantis. The speakers will be our DG Tina Spencer-Mulhern, Dr. Barry Turner and Dr. Christopher Gales on our District Project, "Smiles Without Borders". The evening will begin at 5:30. ## **AREA 8 ROTARY CLUBS UNITE TO SUPPORT**

#### VETERANS GUEST HOUSE EXPANSION

Reno is the site of the Veterans Guest House, a one-of-a-kind facility for any veteran or active duty military and their family members who travel to the Reno-Sparks area to receive medical care. In recent years, this need has outpaced the size of the facility. That set plans in motion for an expansion which was opened this August.

The facility receives no government funds, and is supported entirely by the local community, including Area 8 Rotary Clubs. "Rotary has been involved with the Guest House for years," said Noreen Leary, CEO of the Guest House, and a member of the Reno Sunrise Club. "A Rotarian, in fact, was one of our founders. The local Rotary clubs' financial support of the new expansion was significant to us in making sure we are able to serve the growing needs of our veterans and their families. Over the years, Rotary has provided much support through donations, in-kind services, volunteer hours, dinners and events. Other clubs throughout the district have been supporters, as well. Our guests actually come from the communities of District 5190's clubs. Rotary is a very special partner of the Veterans Guest House," she added.

In the months leading up to the expansion, Bill Boon, president of the Rotary Club of Reno lead the effort with the Area 8 Clubs to sponsor one of the lodging rooms for a total contribution of \$25,000. A plaque outside this room now memorializes this contribution.

The 11,630-sf addition takes the bed count from 17 to 33. This equates to being able to provide more than 12,000 annual room nights. The \$4.4 million expansion was all accomplished through private funds. With the new expansion, the Guest House stands ready to provide lodging to twice as many veterans and their families. who travel to the Reno area to receive medical treatment. Veterans from all across the globe are welcome, but most of the guests come from towns such as Grass Valley, Elko, Tonopah, Alturas and Bishop—and every community in between.

There's also a good chance that you know a veteran or two. There's also good chance that Reno is the place where they are receiving medical treatment. Whether they are visiting the VA Medical Center, or any medical facility in the Reno area, all are welcome to stay at the Guest House. It is at 880 Locust St. in Reno, at the corner of Locust and Taylor streets. "Please stop by and take a tour of our exciting new expansion that will serve more deserving veterans and their families—and see how Rotary dollars are being put to great use," Leary concluded.

The Veterans Guest House Inc. is a Nevada 501(c)3 nonprofit corporation and provides United States Military service veterans and their families' temporary overnight accommodations when receiving treatment at a medical facility in the Reno/Sparks area. It also accommodates veterans traveling to Reno for outpatient medical care.







#### Rotary Youth Exchange Inbound Students – Enjoying U.S. Celebrations

By now, the 2018-2019 RYE Students are more comfortable in their new home. Finally, they are feeling more comfortable with their English language skills; they are finding themselves truly a part of their new family; and their fellow students are getting to know them better. Many have already traveled to San Francisco and Disney Land.

What does November bring our RYE students? Well, Halloween – or as we know it in Nevada – Nevada Day. Each year, the Carson City Sunset Rotary club and the Carson City Noon Rotary Club hosts the students from Friday to Sunday, October 26 – 28, to celebrate Nevada Day in Carson City and participate in the Nevada Day parade. This will be the second time since they arrived that they have all been together again. For them, that is the main draw. But they will have many activities to keep them busy. There is a party (costumes encouraged) on Friday night; the Nevada Day parade on Saturday and roaming through the Nevada capital in the afternoon; and a trip to Virginia City on Sunday.

Of course, November also begins our holiday season and Thanksgiving Day will be a new experience for our visitors from everywhere. Thanksgiving is such a family-oriented time for Americans, sometimes our students don't "get it" until they are surrounded by aunts, uncles, grandpa and grandma and lots of children. And, of course, the over-eating also makes the day memorable. Followed by Black Friday, this is another memory they will take home.

The Inbounds have been in country since August or late July and the time nears when they will be moving to their second host family. We are always alert to the known high-stress points in our students' exchange experience. Changing families can cause the most anxiety for many of them. It is also



difficult for our host families because of the holidays. Now that they have bonded with their student, most families want them to

stay not only for Thanksgiving but also for Christmas. We leave these decisions up to the student and their first and second host families.

Often, we are asked why the students have to move between two to three host families. This is a Rotary International policy and it is done to provide a broader range of experiences for our students. Even though finding host families can be a challenge and our host families and the student can become very attached, we have found that multiple host families offer an expanded cultural experience for our students. Returning Outbounds echo the value of this policy as well. So emotional times ahead: fun, excitement, friendships renewed, and a new family as they wave goodbye to the first family. We know it can be difficult, but we know the benefits outweigh the stress. And we tell them to remember that they are welcome to visit and stay in touch with the first family. Besides, they will probably enjoy visiting with all of their families sometime in the distant future in their own country when those families come to visit.

At the end of November, we will also be hosting all of the RYE students in Reno for a Winter Weekend from November 30 – December 2. We will have two host families for the weekend event, one for the boys and one for the girls. They will enjoy lots of activities and the chance to get together with their fellow RYE students again. More on this in the December newsletter.

Our viewpoint is that we impact our future by preparing our young people to be World Citizens. Not only will your participation be a help to the RYE Program, but it will be a rewarding experience for you, your family and friends, and for your community.

#### POEM TO END POLIO

Mid twentieth century Polio outbreaks brought America to its knees
No Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade... no Boy Scout Jamborees
Schools closed, football games cancelled, and public meetings banned
FDR was overwhelmed with letters enclosing dimes to lend a hand
Terrified toddlers quarantined with loud cries as they began to seethe
Small bodies often covered by an iron lung just so they could breathe
Tens of thousands handicapped by Polio were isolated and stigmatized
Candles and porch lights signaled donations so a cure could be devised

The March of Dimes funded research and offered programs for patient aid Jonas Salk and Albert Sabin developed Polio vaccines still in use today As the virus passed from brothers to sisters and neighbors to nations Worldwide eradication became the primary goal of the Rotary Foundation

Partnering with the CDC, WHO, UNICEF, and Bill and Melinda Gates The Global Initiative that began in 1988 has halted Polio transmission rates Afghanistan, Pakistan and Nigeria, the few countries where cases still remain Until Polio is found only in history books, Rotary will continue their campaign

At its peak, polio paralyzed and killed nearly half million victims a year With no known cure, decades after the diagnosis symptoms can re-appear Most survivors live active lives, but are challenged by the emotional scars As with any highly contagious disease, the problem is not theirs, it's ours





## ROTARY CLUB OF TAHOE-INCLINE TRF EVENT

Demystifying The Rotary Foundation (TRF) process was the goal of our evening event with new members of the Rotary Club of Tahoe-Incline (RCTI) in Incline Village, Nevada on 20 September 2018. Jim O'Brien, RCTI Foundation Chair, Past President, and former District 5190 Area 5 Assistant Governor, hosted the event at his house. We invited RCTI new members and a few old hands to join an informal discussion about TRF. Our evening Fireside event followed Jim's formal presentation at our regular breakfast meeting that morning. RCTI is very lucky to have many long-time Paul Harris Society and Bequest Society members. A hallmark of our Club, joining PHS can be intimidating to our younger members with families and limited resources. To address this issue Jim offered the incentive for new members to participate in EREY and the Paul Harris Society (PHS) by offering matching points from older members with reserve PHS credits.

Our evening began with personal stories about RCTI global grants on water and health in Tanzania and mangrove reforestation in the Philippines. We also fielded several questions about how TRF donations make their way from individual Rotarians to Rotary International and back again to District 5190 and eventually RCTI to support projects in our community. It was clear that the connection between TRF and projects in our schools resonated with our new members. Recognizing that many of our younger members rarely handle either cash or checks, I had my computer set-up to walk them through the process of donating to TRF through Rotary Direct. The hands-on process helped three new members sign up with TRF and allowed several others to watch, observe and promise to do this at home.

For long-time Rotarians TRF is at the heart and soul of Service Above Self. For younger members balancing many personal and professional demands, donating to TRF can be a daunting prospect. RCTI is endeavoring to make donating to TRF simple for new members by demystifying the process and providing matching points to support their participation. ## THANKSGIVING QUICHE

1 ½ cups of evaporated milk (1 can)

4 teaspoons butter

3/4 c feta cheese, crumbled

1 can of whole cranberry sauce

3 eggs

2 scallions (green onions) chopped

3 teaspoons flour

5 teaspoons nour

1 deep dish pie shell, thawed

½ teaspoon sage seasoning 1½ cups chopped turkey

Salt and pepper to taste

Prick the bottom and sides of the pie shell and bake for 15 minutes at 350 degrees. Cool. In a blender mix the milk, butter, cheese, eggs, onions, sage seasoning, flour and salt and pepper. Set aside. Spread½ can of the cranberry sauce in the bottom of the pie shell, and spread the turkey pieces on top. Pour batter over all and bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes.

Recipe Note: This is a great use for leftover turkey. Two regular size pie shells can be used in place of the deep dish pie shell.

### **REGL UPDATE**



The purpose of the **Rotary Eighth Grade Leadership (REGL) Program** is to provide high quality leadership training with a strong emphasis on ethics to selected 8th grade students who have demonstrated leadership skills. Our aim is to provide these selected students with tools for the difficult choices they face as they move into high school.

In 2018 the District 5190 REGL program offered two residential sessions for three days each at Grizzly Creek Ranch in Portola, CA. This facility is truly an amazing facility and the Sierra Nevada Journeys staff are professional and fun.

Clubs interested and willing to sponsor a middle school for the District REGL Program at Grizzly Creek Ranch were notified in January 2018 and asked to send in their reservation form and payment to

secure a place. We had capacity for 22 middle schools during REGL I (September 14-16, 2018), and for 22 middle schools during REGL II (September 21-23, 2018). By the end of March, REGL II was full. By the end of April, REGL I was full.

Dean and Rochelle Whellams of Sparks, NV, remained universally positive with students, parents, school administrators and Rotarians. Impressive was a common word! We are so fortunate to have such talented and dedicated youth leadership program directors!

Three Rotary Clubs took advantage of the District Service Grants offered by District 5190. Seven Rotary Clubs qualified for and received Searles Foundation Grants awarded through the Sparks Community Foundation.

#### **Program Delivery:**

- 36 Rotary Clubs in District 5190 sponsored 44 Middle School groups.
- 200 Eighth Grade Students from throughout District 5190 enjoyed a REGL experience.
- 44 Rotarians served as REGL Coordinators and provided a Rotary interface with their middle schools.
- 21 Rotarians and volunteers were Adult Mentors for the two sessions.
- 27 RYLA graduates from this summer's RYLA programs volunteered as Counselors
- 15 Rotarians were actively involved in preparing and delivering the program.
