

Mike O'Kelly

A native of Susanville, Mike O'Kelly is a graduate of Lassen High and Lassen College, and he majored in Mathematics at Chico State. He is the third generation of O'Kellys in the dairy/ dairy distribution business. His grandfather, Frank O'Kelly was lured to Susanville by Fruitgrowers to supply millworker families with milk from his herd of dairy cattle in the 1920s. The cattle and dairy were located at the current Susanville Ranch Park where the old foundations of some buildings are still visible. Mike's father took over the business after WWII and later partnered with his son in various business arrangements in the dairy industry. In 1972 the business turned strictly to distribution through a cooperative with local dairy farmers. Eventually the cost of producing and transporting milk from Lassen County to the processors in the Valley and then transporting milk back again became prohibitive. Consequently, distribution of non-local milk, dairy products, and ice



became the entire O'Kelly business. Over the years Mike's current business, Morning Glory, Inc. has grown to be a prime wholesale supplier of dairy and other staples like bread to Lassen County.
