
The concept of vocational service

The Object of Rotary is a philosophical statement of Rotary's purpose and the responsibilities of Rotarians. The concept of vocational service is rooted in the Second Object, which calls on Rotarians to "encourage and foster":

- High ethical standards in business and professions
- The recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations
- The dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society

As a Rotarian, how can you put these ideals into action? Consider these suggestions:

- Talk about your vocation in your club, and take time to learn about fellow members' vocations.
- Use your professional skills to serve a community.
- Practice your profession with integrity, and inspire others to behave ethically through your own words and actions.
- Help a young person achieve his or her career aspirations.
- Guide and encourage others in their professional development.



If you do any of these things, you are performing vocational service. And if vocational service motivates and energizes you, then you're in the right place, because vocational service is the very essence of Rotary. It is what sets Rotary apart from other service organizations.

MEMBER SATISFACTION SURVEY RESULTS

Of the members responding to the satisfaction survey, there were some areas with unanimous results, areas with near unanimous results, and areas of concern.

Areas of Unanimity:

- 1. Members feel welcome in the club, are comfortable sharing concerns with club leaders and comfortable with level of club involvement in The Rotary Foundation.
- 2. Members enjoy weekly meetings and feel meetings are well-organized, club bulletins and the meeting length and time are adequate.
- 3. Members actively participate in club projects and activities, noting that they have volunteered for some activities and have been asked to participate in others.

Areas of Near-Unanimity:

- 4. Most members feel that Fellowship, Community, and International Service projects and Fundraising and contributions to The Rotary Foundation are adequate or reasonable,
- 5. Most members participate in projects and activities, and most said that family members are proud of their Rotary involvement.
- 6. Members find the club bulletin to be both interesting and informative.
- 7. A number of members said there should be more fellowship.
- 8. Slightly fewer members feel that club fellowship and Public Relations are adequate and some said that the amount of Rotary content in meetings is insufficient.
- 9. Less than half of the members responding said that they would favor more meal variety.

Areas of Concern:

10. Members expressed concerns about Membership Development and Member Orientation & Education. More than one member said "Not Aware" in response to Orientation & Education. We need to give more attention to Membership.
