Below is a partial list of vocational service projects in District 5190 that highlight our Rotarians in motion promoting Vocational Services in their communities:

<u>4-Way Test Program</u>: Facilitate ethical dilemma scenarios with Rotary Club using the 4-way test.

<u>Business Person of the Year</u>: Many Rotary Clubs honor business and professional men and women. This program is unique in its partnership with the Chamber of Commerce

<u>Rotary Business Academy Program</u>: The Rotary Business Academy is a business simulation open to all high school students.
