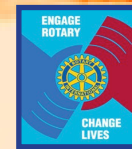

Annual Programs Fund

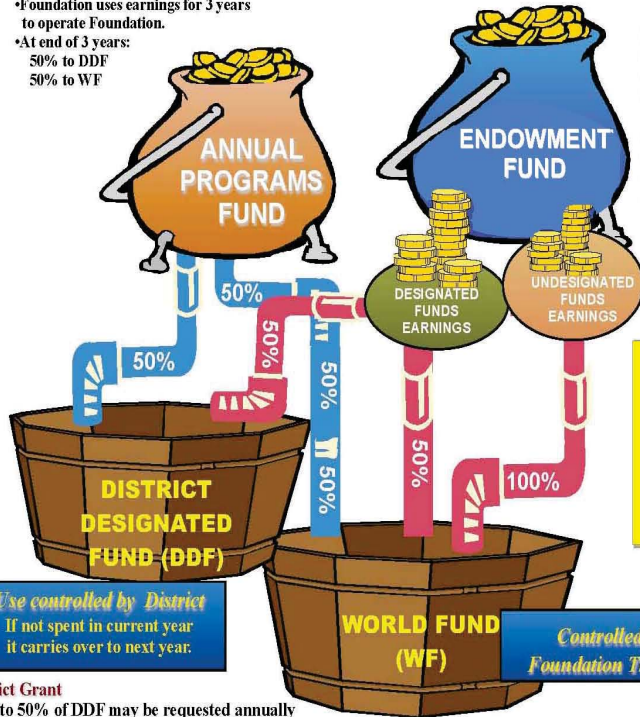
(Get Paul Harris Fellow credit)

- Unrestricted gifts
- Foundation uses earnings for 3 years to operate Foundation.
- At end of 3 years:
50% to DDF
50% to WF

Endowment Fund

Major Donor/Benefactor credit.
(Do not get Paul Harris Fellow credit.)

- Only a portion of EARNINGS are spent.
- Target of \$1 Billion by 2025
- Irrevocable Life Insurance Gifts
- Contributions
- 50% of endowment fund earnings are credited to the DDF **only** if requested at the time the donation is made.



Annual Program Funds Cycle	
Contribute	2013-2014
Allocate	2014-2015
Identify	2015-2016
Spend	2016-2017

- District Grant**
- Up to 50% of DDF may be requested annually for multiple local or international projects
- Global Grants**
- \$15,000 MIN through \$200,000 from TRF

- Global Grants (“match” to cash at \$1 for \$2 or DDF \$2 for \$2)

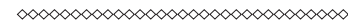

Susanville Sunrise Rotary presenter Melissa Downing of Lassen Family Services said 357 calls last year in Susanville reported domestic violence. Family Services has a shelter and 24-hour crisis hotline. She noted that there is constant need for volunteers.



World Polio Day

Emmy Award-winning actress Archie Panjabi spoke passionately about why she is so committed to her work as a Rotary ambassador for polio eradication. “When I was a child 10 years old, I went to India. As I walked to school, I would see children younger than me with no [use of their] limbs, begging for

money,” Panjabi said. “It broke my heart.” Inspired as an adult to learn more about polio, she was “amazed by the amount of work that Rotary has done,” in helping India be free of the disease since 2011, and joined a team of Rotary volunteers to immunize children there last year. “I will do what-



ever I can to support Rotary and its partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative . . . And if you do whatever you can, then together we can eradicate polio forever.”
