


It is a Wonderful Life




The movie also provides a powerful message in that we all can make a difference in the lives of others. Even though George Bailey felt he was a failure and

He was one of only thirty participants between the ages of 25 - 40 selected from all over the nation. She offers the following five points developed by Adam for attracting this age group to clubs.


Listen (don't wait to talk) – Many young professionals have great ideas and a different way of looking at things. There is always room for improvement and if Rotary is to remain a worldwide leader in service to others, it must be attuned to new ideas and adaptations that will only make our organization stronger.

Rotary is a verb, not a noun – It's one thing to serve, another to serve above self which is something our society does not see enough of. We must be intentional and inspirational in our excitement and desire to improve the lives of those around us. Rotary shouldn't describe who we are, but what we do!

Stop competing with each other – We are all part of a much larger organization. The desire to change the world is amongst all clubs, districts and zones. If you find someone interested in Rotary, but your club may not meet their needs; find a club to meet their needs or consider starting a new club.

Engage – It is important to invite potential Rotarians to events. After the event, then invite them to coffee or lunch with a couple Rotarians. Now that they've been engaged outside of just sitting in a regular meeting, invite them to a meeting and they'll know more than one person when they come.

The "Yes, and..." Attitude – There are so many different people and goals in Rotary it may seem to the outside world impossible to get things done. However, the beauty of Rotary is our



centered desire to better those in our community, locally and globally. If there is a potential service project, unique fundraiser or chance to go out on a limb for your community. Say, "Yes, and ask what else is needed to accomplish the goal?"




RYLA Deadline December 31, 2014




Feeling Welcomed

A warm welcome is always remembered and treasured. In an article for the Zone, Claudia Mertl emphasizes the importance of the Greeter function. Here are a few of her ideas. Greeting comes from the heart, but it's good to have some guidance on paper so that the key points are covered. Two greeters, with badges displayed, strategically and timely placed at the entrance ensures everyone is personally welcomed. Extending hospitality to guests mean more than directing them to the sign-in desk. Introduce guests to Club members and ask members to accompany guests through the sign-in and food line and assure that they are comfortably seated at a table and introduced. At the end of the meeting, Greeters should bid farewell, encourage guests to return, and perhaps give the guests a memento. It's no different than welcoming family, friends, and guests into your home but so vital to expanding membership.
