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My Fellow Rotarians,

I want to share with you Rotary International President Ron Burton's message on the eradication of polio.

RI PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I've had a unique opportunity to be a part of the polio eradication campaign from its very beginnings, more than a quarter century ago, to where we are now, which is truly "this close" to the end.

None of us knew back then how long eradication would take, or how many obstacles we'd meet along the way. I'm not sure how we would have felt about taking on the challenge if we had known. But there is one thing I know for sure: every single day of the last 29 years has been worth it. Over those years, we have saved millions of children from being paralyzed by polio. There's no way to put a price tag on that. And today, we are closer than ever to a world in which no child will be paralyzed, ever again.

It's been a long race to the finish line. That line is now in sight. But we'll only cross it if we keep moving forward. And the only way to do that is with the help of every single Rotarian, everywhere in the world.

The first thing we need is your voice, and your advocacy. Think ahead to World Polio Day, on 24 October: What can your club and district do to raise awareness? Write letters to your elected officials, hold a purple pinkie fundraiser, plan an event with a local school. If you or someone you know has a story to tell about polio, share it at www.endpolionow.org/stories. The most important thing is to keep the momentum going. Let your community, and the world, know that the fight against polio is at its most critical stage yet.

I'm glad to report that the End Polio Now – Make History Today campaign is going well. Rotary met the terms of the new agreement with the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and received US\$70 million in matching funds in January, which will be fully committed in this calendar year. We have four more years of this agreement remaining, during which the Gates Foundation will match two-to-one every dollar Rotary spends on polio, to a maximum of \$35 million per year. I encourage all of you to do what you can to help us make the most of this opportunity. I know that together, we can engage Rotary to end polio – and change the world, forever.

The Rotary Club of Hanover County is pleased to announce the winners of its first annual Four-Way Test essay contest for fifth grade students in Hanover County. The theme of this year's contest was "*Rotary's 4-Way Test and What It Means to the Conduct of my Daily Life.*"

At the Club's dinner meeting Wednesday night, each of the three students read their essays to the Rotary members and fifteen guests which included family members and classroom teachers.

Club President, JoAnn Meaker, then awarded the winners: Gavin Bralley (1st place, prize of \$200); Dianna Sherrod (2nd place, prize of \$100); and Lexi Johnson (3rd place, prize of \$50).

The contest, which began in January, was open to all fifth grade students in Hanover County in public, and private schools and homeschoolers as well. Advertised in the local newspaper and through the local libraries, the students were asked to submit an essay based on the 4-Way Test. The Rotary Club of Innsbrook joins in for Firefighter Games...



About 7,000 attended this truly inspiring event of the VA Firefighter Games at Short Pump Town Center on Saturday, May 3. There were live demonstrations, over 30 fire and rescue trucks and equipment, opportunities to interact with first responders, climb into rescue vehicles, Jaws of Life demonstrations, rappelling from a ladder truck, live music and a children's area.

Throughout the day, firefighters from across the region competed in a challenging obstacle course featuring a 40 foot tower - a true test of strength, endurance, and character. Visitors gained real insight into the level of performance demanded from firefighters every day as they display the rigorous skills required to save lives.

There are five aspects to the course:

- Hose Carry & Climb: Carry a 42-lb hose pack to the top of a four-story tower and place the hose in a box at the top.
- Hose Hoist and Descend: Pulling a 42-lb hose pack up (dead lift) four stories hand-over-hand, placing on the deck at the top and descending four stories of stairs.
- Forcible Entry: Using a Keiser Machine evolution.
- Hose Advance: Zig-zag through a course of fire hydrants, pick up a charged 1 3/4" hose line, pull it 50' and discharge at a target.
- Victim Rescue: Drag a 165 lb rescue dummy 75 feet to the finish line.

Dozens of club members were on sight beginning Thursday night to erect fencing, Friday to set up, Saturday to staff the venue and participate in the corporate relay competition, and breaking/down packing up after the day was done.
