Rotary Support Helps Teen Cancer Patient Return To Peru

Rotary International News 19 March 2007 It has been a long wait, but Rony Montalvan is finally going home. After months of fighting leukemia and other difficulties, the 18-year-old Youth Exchange student's cancer is in remission following multiple rounds of chemotherapy and transfusions. He is scheduled to leave Beaverton, Oregon, USA, for his hometown of Toquepala, Peru, on 25 March.

Just days before his year-long Oregon stay was to have ended in June 2006, Montalvan was diagnosed with T-cell acute lymphoblastic leukemia, a life-threatening disease that required immediate and intensive medical treatment. The Rotary Club of Beaverton did what Rotary does best – they rallied to help a family in need, raising both awareness of Montalvan's situation in the community, and US\$20,000 to help cover medical costs.

Thanks to support from Rotary and the surrounding community, Montalvan returns home with a two- to three-year supply of cancer-fighting drugs. He will continue monthly treatments at a hospital in Lima, Peru. Rotary clubs in Peru will continue to assist the family.

"I am excited and happy to go back home. I have a strong relationship with the Rotarians," says Montalvan."It's like a special friendship."

Montalvan got a special surprise on 3 March, when he was feted as a guest at a home game of the professional U.S. basketball team the Portland Trailblazers. There, he received a team-autographed ball and met courtside with several of his favorite players.

"Rony was walking on air," says Jim Rauh, a Beaverton Rotary member who helped organize Montalvan's support team. In addition, Rauh developed a public relations campaign about the young man's plight that garnered widespread attention and a nomination for best public relations campaign by the American Marketing Association.

Throughout his recovery, Montalvan had been imagining what he'd do upon his return. First on his list: going to the beach. He eventually plans to study at the University of Arequipa.

Deadline For 2006-07 Presidential Citation Approaching

District governors have until 15 April 2007 to submit a list of qualifying Rotary and Rotaract clubs for the 2006-07 Presidential Citation to RI World Headquarters in Evanston, Illinois, USA.

Participating clubs are encouraged to submit certification forms to their district governors as soon as possible. Governors must provide RI with a complete list of qualifying clubs by 15 April in order for those clubs to receive the Presidential Citation.

The purpose of the Presidential Citation is to increase Rotary club involvement in service activities, while at the same time encouraging Rotarians' personal involvement in serving others and promoting a high standard of Rotary service in the community. The award is revised on an annual basis by the RI president and traditionally highlights the president's theme.

To qualify for the 2006-07 citation, clubs must achieve a net increase of at least one member by 1 April 2007 and complete four of the activities listed on the Presidential Citation brochure. The activities listed fall under the categories of membership, club service, vocational service, community service, and international service. Clubs must complete the Presidential Citation certification form and submit it to their district governor in order to be considered. In addition, Rotaract clubs may qualify for a citation by submitting a Rotaract Presidential Citation certification form.

How To Properly Place New Employees
