April 19 Meeting Report:

Our speaker was Ned Leonard, Vice President of the Center for Energy & Economic Development (CEED), who discussed "Carbon Sequestration". Ned explained how coal, America's most ample domestic energy source, can be a fuel of the future. Coal today is pulverized and blown into a boiler where it burns to make steam to spin a turbine and generate electricity. Half of our electricity today is made by coal in this manner. However, this releases carbon dioxide (CO₂) into the atmosphere and contributes to global warming. A newer and



cleaner method is to convert coal into a synthetic gas (IGCC). For the benefit of climate change, CO₂ must be captured and stored. Terrestrial sequestration could store 20% of current emissions. Geologic sequestration has potential, particularly in the U.S. where geologic conditions are favorable. There is a \$10 billion effort to develop a zero emissions powerplant that will produce electricity, hydrocarbon, and capture and store CO2 created in the process. This represents a huge technological challenge but the stakes are high.

The Solomon Islands Receive Shelter After The Storm

Rotary District 9600 (Papua New Guinea, Solomon Islands, and parts of Australia) is working closely with clubs affected by the earthquakes and tsunamis that struck the Solomon Islands Western and Choiseul provinces on 2 April. Rotarians are assessing the scope of urgent needs and planning longterm rebuilding.

The disasters left about 9,000 homeless. Members of the Rotary Club of Honiara and the Rotary Club of Gizo are on the ground determining the state of sanitation, clean water, shelter, and necessary supplies.

The district contacted suppliers of ShelterBox which sent 200 units, each containing a 10person tent and other survival equipment from the United Kingdom to Australia and on to the island's capital of Honaira. "From there, it's about another 200 miles by sea to the island of Gizo, which is where the worst damage occurred," says ShelterBox spokesperson Huw Thomas.

In addition to the ShelterBoxes, the district arranged for the delivery of 400 Aquaboxes, 30 solar water purifiers, and cooking utensils. The shipping of mosquito nets is also being expedited, as public health experts are warning of the possibility of malaria outbreaks among the displaced.

District 9600 reports many offers of help from local and oversees communities, including Thailand, which was devastated in 2004 by a tsunami. Rotarians previously working in Gizo

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and Babanga are returning to rebuild their businesses and the community's infrastructure.

According to Past District Governor Charles Guesdon, local communities responded favorably to Rotarian fundraising efforts at various Australian shopping centers on 7 April. "Further talks are being held to plan additional long-term responses," he says. The district will now focus on the long-term disaster recovery phase by providing funds to rebuild the island's water supply, schools, hospitals, and sanitation.

RI District Governor Michael Gregory has appointed Director Nominee John Lawrence to handle fundraising, Past District Governor Guesdon to coordinate all relief and reconstruction, and District Governor Nominee Wayne Morris, of the Rotary Club of Honiara, to act as a local liaison.

Kentucky Club Sends Their County To College

Every person with a high school degree or general equivalency diploma (GED) living in Christian County, Kentucky, USA, is guaranteed help with paying their college tuition by the Rotary Club of Hopkinsville, Kentucky. Every April, the club holds a wee klong auction to raise funds for either scholarships or student loans for area residents.

Each year, the club raises in excess of US\$250,000. Last year, the club gave more than \$300,000 to over 200 students. In the 56 years of this service project, the Rotary club has accumulated more than \$8 million in a fund that they use to subsidize the scholarships and loans.

The annual auction that provides much of the funding for the scholarships starts with Rotarians asking merchants for items they can donate. Any item more than \$30 is sold in the main auction, which is held in April, where people can bid on items either in person or by radio or television. Gifts less than \$30 are sold in a separate, mini-auction or in a local store. The Rotarians also raise money by selling dinners at the auction and offering a few ways to donate cash.

The club president, Ted Jatczak, says, "We will sell anything! Last year items ranged from gift certificates, to a used car, to LASIK eye surgery, to hams."

Like many Rotary clubs, the Hopkinsville Rotary club helps their community in times of

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trouble. In 1990, several government assistance programs were cancelled, leaving many area students without a way to pay for college. The Hopkinsville club didn't have the money to help, but helped anyway. The club took out loans from area banks so that no student would be left behind.

Jeanette Newsome received a non-traditional scholarship four years ago from the



Hopkinsville Rotary club. At 43, she decided to pursue a degree in education, and now she'll be graduating in May. While attending Mary State University, Kentucky, on her scholarship, her son is also attending Western Kentucky University on a student loan from the club.

"I am very grateful for the scholarship, so I help out by answering the phones one or two nights of the auction. I wanted to do something to give back. The scholarship and loan are a godsend," says Newsome.

As other Rotary clubs have discovered, this is a program that can be easily replicated. Two other clubs in Kentucky held their own auctions and each raised more than \$100,000 for scholarships.
