#### <u>May 31 Meeting Report:</u>



President Jerry installed our newest Rotarian, Anna Dell'Aquila. In addition to the customary gifts, Jerry gave Anna a bottle of fine Italian wine. Anna is embassy military liaison to the attaché at the Italian Embassy in Washington, DC. Welcome, Anna, and her husband Peter to our club!

The speaker for the evening was our own Rotarian Todd Nitkin giving an illustrated talk on the Joshua Youth Academy project in Addis Ababa. Todd told how \$6000 raised from the silent auction in 2005 multiplied into an



\$18,000 program thanks to contributions from the Rotary district and the Rotary Foundation of Rotary International. The staggering statistics of the HIV/AIDS epidemic in the world are currently an estimated 18M now infected burgeoning to 65M in just a few

years. There are expected to be 10M people infected with HIV/AIDS in Ethiopia alone. The number of street children of AIDS orphans continues to grow with currently 250,000 orphans in Ethiopia and 100,000 just in the city of Addis Ababa. The average life expectancy in Ethiopia has dropped into the 30's. The youth

academy in Addis Ababa received 48,000 square meters of land from the government and they plan to build a facility and care for 1000 orphans. The project is self-sustaining with proceeds from crops growing on the property and fees for some of the students attending the academy offsetting expenses.

# Green Celebrations Help The Community and Environment

Independence Day in Bar Harbor, Maine, USA, this 4 July will be red, white, blue – and green.

The Rotary Club of Bar Harbor (Mount Desert Island) has taken steps that can be replicated by almost any club to make its warm weather celebrations and fundraisers good for the community and the environment.

The Bar Harbor Rotary club aims to make its 37th annual Fourth of July Seafood Festival as environmentally responsible as possible by using good recycling practices. The Sysco Corporation will donate to the Rotary club

biodegradable plates, cups, bowls, and napkins for the event. The Bar Harbor Chamber of Commerce will donate compostable cutlery – forks and spoons made from cornstarch.

And these measures will make a difference. On the Fourth of July, the club plans to serve 1,500 pancake breakfasts and more than 1,000 seafood dinners.

Last year, Rotarians set up a waste recycling and composting center at the

town athletic field, where the festival is held. The event yielded hundreds of pounds of paper waste for recycling and gallons of organic material for composting, including lobster and mussel shells, corn cobs, and watermelon rinds.

The Bar Harbor Chamber of Commerce took

notice of the Rotarians' effort to reduce, reuse, and recycle the waste created by the crowds of eager pancake eaters and seafood feasters. Hoping to follow their lead, the chamber president contacted the club to see if the business

organization could help expand the effort town-wide in 2007. In addition to providing the biodegradable cutlery for the festival, the chamber is planning to replicate the Rotarians' waste disposal stations downtown and buy reusable tote bags for retailers to replace plastic bags.

The Seafood Festival is the club's major fundraiser of the year, along with the Fourth of July Blueberry Pancake Breakfast held at the same site since the late 1980s. The day

before the doubleheader event, club members spend hours setting up tents, tables, chairs, grills, and lobster cookers for the 1,000 pounds of lobster sold each year. On the Fourth, Rotarians work from 6 a.m. to 4 p.m. to cook, serve, and clean up. The club expects to raise

about US\$13,000 this year, and it will donate the funds to a variety of community organizations. Recipients in the past have included the local YMCA and YWCA; Island Connections, an organization that provides transportation for older people; Acadia

Affordable Housing; the Bar Harbor Food Pantry; and the Maine Sea Coast Mission.

The festival is attended by thousands of people, and, along with the town's parade and fireworks, helps to make Bar Harbor one of the Maine coast's

major destinations for the holiday.
