Rotary clubs step up to assist victims of severe floods in South Asia

(New Delhi, 10 August 2007) – As monsoondriven floodwaters threaten nearly 22 million people in northern India, Bangladesh and Nepal, Rotary clubs have stepped up relief efforts to deliver food, medicines and clothing to marooned villages.

In the Maharajganj, Gorakhpur and Bara Banki districts of India's northern Uttar Pradesh state, where more than two million people are affected, Rotarians are helping government aid workers distribute water purification tablets in flood-ravaged villages. Rotary-supported mobile medical teams have been dispatched to combat expected outbreaks of gastroenteritis, dengue fever and

malaria.

Shaikh Abdul Hadi, a member of the Rotary Club of Khulna North in Bangladesh, said his club is distributing food, "although it is very little" compared with the overwhelming need. "Large portions of Bangladesh are under floodwater," he said. "Sixty percent of the people in the country are homeless. Every one of us somehow affected."

From the United Kingdom, the Rotary clubsupported charity, ShelterBox, has sent 200 ShelterBox containers to flooded communities in Nepal. Each container provides tents and other necessities to help 10 people survive for up to six months.

"Rotarians who volunteered as relief workers in the affected areas are asking fellow Rotarians worldwide for more help and aid for the flood victims who have been suffering for days," says A.C. Peter, a member of the Rotary Club of Delhi East End, India. "Children are especially vulnerable to waterborne diseases. The UN has described the flooding as the worst in living memory."

The region's Rotary clubs are also looking for long-term solutions to the flooding problem. For example, the Rotary India Water Conservation Trust seeks to reduce flooding by improving the forest cover in the Gangotri basin and encourage sound management of water resources. Said trust Chairman Sushil Gupta, "Much more needs to be done by Rotary to address recurrence of flood every year by jointly addressing the problem along with South Asian governments."

Meanwhile, Rotary clubs in Pakistan and

Afghanistan are seeking additional aid for victims of a 26 June cyclone that killed 324 people and left 224 missing and more than 377,000 homeless in the Balochistan and Sindh provinces of Pakistan.

Polio just a 'plane ride away'

A 22-year-old Pakistani student was released from an Australian hospital on 9 August, after recovering from the polio virus. A national health alert was issued in Australia on 13 July after the student was diagnosed with polio, the first case of the virus in the country in 21 years.

Another case of polio was also detected in Chad last month. Rotary's PolioPlus Partners program quickly released US\$241,000 to support urgent preventive immunization activities in neighboring Sudan, amid continued political unrest in the country.

International PolioPlus Committee Chair Bob Scott calls the outbreaks a "wake-up call."

"It prove[s] beyond a doubt that polio in your polio-free country is just a plane ride away," Scott says. "It's essential to continue with the PolioPlus program."

The student contracted the disease while visiting his native Pakistan, one of the four remaining polio-endemic countries. He experienced symptoms, including initial paralysis, and recovered at Melbourne's Box Hill Hospital. He was isolated from the community until he tested negative for the virus.

After learning about the case from Jenny

Horton, a Rotary club member who consults for the World Health Organization on the Global Polio Eradication Initiative in Pakistan, Melbourne-area Rotarians reacted quickly to support the student's recovery.

Arrangements were made to provide the student with new clothes, since his clothing had been confiscated in case it carried the virus. Jennifer Coburn, of the Rotary Club of Mont Albert & Surrey Hills, Victoria, went to visit the patient in isolation, lifting his spirits by bringing him books, puzzles, and the daily newspaper.

"This is a definite and very easy way to assist a person in need of support," says Coburn, noting how far the student is from his family, and the intense media scrutiny he had been under after the alert was issued. "He is really delighted that he is receiving support from Rotary. The need for human interaction is so important."

Polio exhibit opens in its new home RI News 9 August 2007

The exhibit, Whatever Happened to Polio? opened in its new home at the Roosevelt Warm Springs Institute for Rehabilitation in Georgia, USA. on 15 August.

The exhibit was transferred from the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of American History to be permanently displayed at the Warm Springs Institute, where former U.S. President Franklin Delano Roosevelt sought treatment for polio.

European Rotarians are cycling to serve 23rd Rotary World Cycling Championship coming up at Lake Orta

in Northern Italy

(Evanston, III. – Aug. 10 2007) Cycling enthusiasts around Europe are shifting gears in anticipation of the 23rd Annual Rotary World Championship, set for Sept. 7-9 in Mottarone in Italy's Piedmont region.

Organized by Rotary clubs throughout Europe, the championship is held every year in a different European country, attracting up to 300 Rotarian racers competing in four age classes. The entrance fees are distributed as prize money to the winners, who use the funds to support their Rotary clubs' community service projects.

"This gives us an opportunity to share our passion and do something good," says Franco Piola, president of the event's organizing committee and a member of the Rotary Club Orta San Guilio. "The magic of our enchanting Lake Orta will be the ideal setting for a weekend of sport and friendship."

The first Rotary World Cycling Championship was organized in 1984 by the Rotary Club of Herentals in Belgium as a fundraising activity. After three years the club decided that an annual event of this size was too much burden for a single club. A number of Belgian and Dutch race participants came together to establish the fellowship which allows

Rotarians to share their cycling passion and demonstrate their (strictly non-professional) talents in different locations. Since then the championship has taken place in France, England, Belgium, Germany, the Netherlands, Spain, Turkey and this year for the second time in Italy.

Piola says visiting tourists and local friends will have the opportunity to meet with famous champs of the past – Francesco Moser, Imerio Massignan, Gianni Mottta and Michele Dancelli among others– who will compete in a Champions' Race on Sept. 8.

"Faustino Coppi, the son of the biggest champion of all (Fausto Coppi) has also guaranteed his presence," he adds. A former motor-cross pro turned amateur cyclist, Piola competed along with members of his club in last year's championship on the famous race circuit in Zolder, Belgium.

The Rotary Club of San Giulio also invites bike enthusiasts of all ages to participate in the non-competitive "Tour around the Lake" on Sunday. The tour will have a refreshment stop at Cesera, where riders can sample the region's gastronomic specialties.

All proceeds of this fun race will go to help build a much needed extension of the Health Center at Masango in Burundi, a hospital supported by the Rotary Club of San Giulio that provides free medical care to children and adults, including malaria and aids patients.

"Following this year's motto 'Feel Your Passion – Italy 2007', we want to organize a big cycling party where we can combine our sporting passion with our humanitarian passion," Piola says.

Cultural highlights of three-day event are the "My Doping" show of the theatrical company Casa degli Alfieri on the Piazza Motta on Friday evening (admission is free) and a benefit concert ("Concerto for Organs") with music by J.S. Bach at the Church of San Nicolao, which is included on UNESCO's World Heritage List.
