

Club Awards District Governor Rich Carson With \$2100 Gift for The Rotary Foundation

District Governor Rich Carson gave a passionate speech on a number of Rotary programs that are making a difference in the world. Governor Rich thanked our club for its participation in district meetings, grants, membership growth, sustaining Paul Harris Fellowship and his induction dinner at the Gaithersburg Hilton. At the Rotary International Convention in Salt Lake City, Governor Rich hosted three breakfasts and a dinner for Rotarians from our district. One of the speakers at the convention was Bill Gates, Sr. who is very successful in his own right. Gates recognized that Rotary has given millions of dollars for polio and was amazed

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about the power of Rotary in eradicating polio. Gates' message to Rotary was to "think big". Governor Rich pointed out the UN Millennium Goal of clean water for half of the world population in need by 2015. The number of people impacted currently is 1.5 billion and is expected to grow to 5 billion by 2025. The Washington DC Rotary Club implemented a water system for a village of 8,000 people. If every Rotary club in the world did the same, it would mean that 240,000,000 people would have clean water. There are challenges of a water well project: villagers want it in the middle of the village but water might be elsewhere; they must decide if the pumps are manual or power driven; how to pay the cost of the power for the pumps; how is the village water management committee structured and specifying equipment from the village level. Fellowship is the basis of good community service and that is the secret of Rotary. The whole structure of Rotary is designed to increase fellowship: weekly meetings; President Elect training and mult-district Zone training. Everyone who moves up builds a bigger network. Governor Rich discussed his plans and goals for the coming year. The District Conference is titled "DisCon 08" and is conveniently located at the Gaithersburg Hilton, May 1-4, 2008. Speakers include past president of Rotary International Frank Devlyn, the deputy director of the FBI and a survivor of the New York trade center twin towers. The international convention is in Los Angeles in June 2008 and highlights include going to the Hollywood bowl and a cruise. There will be a Foundation dinner on

November 13 at the Canadian Embassy featuring RI President Wilf Wilkinson. Rotarians are invited. Mini summits are being held throughout the year on topics of health, hunger, water and literacy (see last week's newsletter for details). Friendship trips are planned for Rotarians going to Rio de Janiero, Brazil, and St. Petersburg, Russia. Governor Rich has held open leadership meetings with up to 100 persons attending. Friendship dinners have been planned This year's Group Study regionally. Exchange Program is with the Netherlands. There will be seminars on setting up microlending programs. District Goals are a 5% net gain in membership and 100% sustaining Rotary Foundation members. There are District-wide Projects including Dictionaries for third graders, Basra prosthetics, Books for International Goodwill, Safe blood, Gallaudet University scholarships and auto technician scholarships. Governor Rich was thanked for his presentation and given a check for \$2100 for the Rotary Foundation.

Potomac-Bethesda Rotary Club Refinishes Floors at Polinger House Group Home

At the club meeting on September 20 Vivian G. Bass, the Chief Executive Officer of the Jewish Foundation for Group Homes (JFGH), thanked our club for the generosity of refinishing the hardwood floors at the Polinger House. Our club's Rotarians repainted this house a few months ago and now it really looks superb with the updated floors. JFGH serves more than 140 adults

with developmental disabilities and chronic mental illness in group homes and apartments.



President Wilfrid J. Wilkinson's Message

All of us in Rotary know that we're a part of something larger than ourselves. We know

that Rotary is an organization that transcends the boundaries of religion, language, and culture. We know that it is a force for peace, goodwill, and fellowship, and we know that it is a force 1.2 million strong. But most Rotarians' involvement in Rotary is made up primarily of club meetings, community projects, and international work through



What this means, though, is that for most of us, the internationality of Rotary can seem distant, and it can be difficult to fully understand. As a new member of the Rotary Club of Trenton, Ont., Canada, I was very happy being part of an organization that I saw doing so much good work locally. I might have stayed focused on that local work for years had there not been an international convention scheduled in Toronto shortly after I joined.

That first convention was what really opened my eyes to Rotary. It brought the world of Rotary, the world that stretches far beyond my own club, all together in one place. I saw how truly international an organization Rotary was, and I understood, for the first time, just what I had become a part of – and just how much there was to do, to contribute, and to become.

At a convention, you start to see your own club in context, as part of a network of

32,000 clubs in more than 200 countries and geographical areas. You're inspired by the work that so many of these clubs are doing, and you bring new knowledge and ideas home to your own club. Most important, perhaps, are the personal connections made at a convention: the friendship and fellowship that will link your club to others for many years to come.

The 2008 RI Convention will be held in Los Angeles, a multicultural city that is a fitting site for such an event. If you've already been to a convention, perhaps you need no convincing to register for this one. Los Angeles is a city of stars, and when you come, you will see the Rotary stars, the Hollywood stars, and the stars twinkling in the sky over the Hollywood Bowl. If you've never been to a convention, then I urge you to join Joan and our whole family for a wonderful few days of fellowship and inspiration. I believe this event will change your life, as it did for Joan and me in 1964.

Fact Sheet: Goodwill Industries International and Rotary International

What is the purpose of this cooperative relationship?

The cooperative relationship between Goodwill Industries International Inc. and Rotary International provides a way to collaborate and combine resources so that more can be achieved to pursue their common objectives in the area of employment and training for people with barriers to employment.

What is Goodwill Industries International Inc.?

Goodwill Industries International is a network of 206 community-based, autonomous member organizations worldwide that serve people with workplace disadvantages and disabilities by providing job training and employment service. To fund its mission, Goodwill collects donated clothing and household goods to sell at more than 2,000 retail stores and provides contract labor services to business and government.

What is the focus of this cooperative relationship?

Rotary and Goodwill recognize the power of work and the critical role of employment and training in building individual self-confidence and personal empowerment, and in strengthening local and broad-based economies. Goodwill's relationship with RI supports its 21st Century Initiative

– a commitment to help 20 million individuals and their families improve their economic selfsufficiency through work by 2020. Goodwill and RI share a commitment to creating and expanding opportunities for steady jobs and reliable incomes for people with barriers to employment.

How will the employment and training of people with barriers to employment be promoted?

Goodwill Industries International and Rotary International will work together to promote greater collaboration and coordination in the field of employment and training for people with barriers to employment. Rotary clubs and districts can promote the importance of employment and training for people with barriers to employment through presentations at Rotary gatherings and at meetings of other interested groups. Rotary clubs and districts may also engage in projects that support these goals at all levels through Rotary Foundation humanitarian grants and other resources. Rotary International encourages Rotary clubs and districts to share their successful projects with RI staff by e-mailing programs@rotary.org so that they may be incorporated into the RI Community Projects Database.

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How can my club or district get involved?

Visit www.goodwill.org to find your local Goodwill and set up a meeting to discuss joint-project opportunities. Each Goodwill and Rotary club can work together on a project that meets the needs of the local community. Some Rotary club projects with Goodwill include:

- Providing Computers for Education (Bogota, Colombia) Goodwill Industries of Eastern North Carolina Inc. worked with the Rotary Club of Research Triangle Park and the Rotary Club of Bogota to supply Pentium computers to high schools in Bogota. The program provides training, vocational services, and educational resources for people with disabilities or barriers to employment.
- Strengthen Each Organization by Pooling Resources (Hamilton, Ontario, Canada) Members of the Rotary Club of Hamilton A.M. established a two-way agreement to share resources that can benefit both Rotary and Goodwill.
- Put a Face to the Future (Johnstown, Pennsylvania, USA) This job shadowing and mentoring program provides participants a unique professional experience, giving firsthand knowledge and information about their field of interest. The goal is to help people obtain gainful employment. Target populations include youth, adults, dislocated workers, individuals receiving welfare, or individuals with disabilities or barriers to employment.
- "Career Connection" Job Fair (Macon,

Georgia, USA) This job fair helps people with disabilities and other barriers to employment find jobs in the community.

• Closet Cleaning Days (Tucson, Arizona, USA) Each spring and fall, Rotary Club of Tucson members clean out their closets and donate clothing and other items to Goodwill.

Consider how your club and a local Goodwill can leverage resources to fulfill both Rotary's international and vocational service goals and Goodwill's 21st Century Initiative commitment to help 20 million individuals and their families improve their economic self-sufficiency through work by the year 2020. The Rotary Foundation's Matching Grants can be accessed to help vocational training organizations in other countries expand or create services that help individuals with barriers to employment gain the training, education, and placement support they need to get and keep jobs.
