April 3 Meeting Report

Neither sleet nor showers could deter our faithful financial forecasters from making excellent

presentations at the Rotary Club meeting on April 3. President Don Smith, economist, reported that although consumer confidence has dropped, consumer spending is holding on. Federal Reserve Chairman Bernanke didn't want to use the "R" word (recession) in his recent testimony to Congress.



Seasoned stockbroker John Call noted that the US had a much higher percentage of consumer-oriented economy than other countries in the world (Japan



55%; Europe 62%; England 66%; USA 68%to72%). Economies in India, China and Dubai are doing very well. He forecast that a US recession might last three to four years. John provided some tips as to where Rotarians could invest during these trying times. Stock recommendations included Proctor and Gamble, Johnson and Johnson, Nike, John Deere

and Caterpillar. John also had three stocks in a special category, pipeline master limited partnerships: Kinder Morgan Energy Partners, Nustar Energy and Inergy. He also recommended municipal bonds (e.g. 4.96% tax-free AAA Municipal bond pays an equivalent of a 6% investment).

Realtor Tom Leuchtenburg reported further declines in the financial sector aftermath of Bear Stearns with UBS writing down their non-liquid assets resulting in depreciation of 3% to 20% in customer accounts. There was an important announcement regarding home financing: the conventional loan limits were increased from \$417,000 to



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\$729,000. Montgomery County just announced on April 3 that the Housing Opportunities Commission raised their limits so that people with \$82,600 in adjustable gross income qualify for their program. Conventional loan rates were 6.25% fixed rate with 5% down. The same rate applied to jumbo loans (over \$729,000). In Bethesda sellers are receiving multiple offers on houses under \$1M, but the upcounty real estate market is looking pretty cold. As an example, in Germantown there are currently 222 2-bedroom, 2-Bath condominiums on the market. There currently may be some good investments to be made.

Groundbreaking Ushers In New Beginning For Mississippi Seniors

After more than two years of being forced to hold activities in crowded make-shift venues, senior residents

of Long Beach, Mississippi, USA, will soon be able to socialize, play games, and exercise in a new 30,000 square-foot recreation center.

During a ceremony hosted by Rotarians from Mississippi and Illinois on 12 March, anticipation prevailed for a new beginning as honored guests Long Beach Mayor William Skellie, Mississippi Governor Haley Barbour, and other state dignitaries broke ground on the multimillion dollar center. The event signified a commitment that Rotarians from Illinois districts 6440 and 6550 made to help Long Beach rebuild after Hurricane Katrina in 2005. The storm destroyed the recreation center, fire station, two schools, and thousands of businesses.

"After the storm, Rotary put Long Beach on the front burner and kept us there," says Skellie. "Their work on the senior recreation center just shows that Rotary is a go-to organization."

Past district governors from the Chicago area, Brian Andersen (District 6450) and Jack Blane (District 6440), collaborated with Mississippi Rotary clubs in late 2005, pledging to raise more than \$100,000 for the construction of the new senior center, which will double as an emergency shelter. The Long Beach Senior Recreation and Community Center is slated for completion in December and will house areas for craft making and meetings, as well as a cafeteria, two basketball courts, and a gym for seniors and local residents alike. It will be a gathering place and emergency refuge for the Mississippi communities of Gulfport, Pass Christian, and Pineville.

"It will be a place for first responders and a place of last resort for those who don't evacuate in time," says Long Beach club member Bob Kranz. A venue for first responders was desperately needed when Hurricane Katrina razed the local police station, he adds.

More than \$3.3 million has been allocated to the center through grants and contributions. Chicago-based Mittal Steel Company donated \$500,000 and will provide construction oversight. Other groups also have made contributions, including a \$2 million grant from the South Mississippi Planning and Development District and a \$600,000 grant from the Bush-Clinton Katrina

Fund. Donations also came from Rotary clubs across the United States.

"Were it not for the Rotary network, this project would not have worked," says Blane. "Our hearts and our money were dedicated to this."

The groundbreaking ceremony signaled an important and symbolic stage of a new beginning to Long Beach, says Skellie. He adds that he expects Rotary will continue to have a long-term impact on the community. "I applaud Rotary's dedication to bringing this community hope for a new day. We're sincerely grateful."

Helping A Shantytown Help Itself

Egyptian Rotarians have joined forces with a local

charity to help families in a Cairo shantytown become self-sufficient. The project, partly financed by a US\$9,335 Rotary Foundation Matching Grant, provides residents of the poverty-stricken Establ Antar community with vocational training and other educational opportunities.

The idea for the effort came from a group of young Egyptians who had been working with the Sohbet Kheir Organization to provide free meals to families in the shantytown. Though they realized the importance of short-term nutrition, they determined that Establ Antar's residents needed skills to support themselves. The group presented a plan to the Rotary Club of Cairo-Zamalek, which obtained support from the Rotary Club of Berlin-Nord, Germany, and the project was born.

Establ Antar is a community of tiny, one-room homes made of wooden boards and cloth, clustered around the historic Antar citadel. There is no plumbing; water is delivered by donkey cart. "The conditions are quite desperate," says Sohbet Kheir Organization project leader Yasmina Abou Youssef, whose father, Mohamed Abou Youssef, is a member of the Cairo-Zamalek club. "Rotary provided assistance, and now we are making a big difference."

So far, more than 280 people — mostly women and children — have enrolled in courses offered through the project. Children receive instruction in literacy, English,

art, sports, and moral development, and adults take classes in literacy and handicrafts. Project leaders are looking for wholesalers and shops to regularly sell the students' creations, and someone has already purchased 1,500 bracelets. In the future, the effort may provide computer courses and a Montessori school for children.

Meanwhile, community members are being trained to spread messages door to door about health, hygiene, crime, and environmental issues. They're also involved in implementing the overall project, giving them a sense of ownership. "That is something very unique," says Youssef. "This is a one-of-a-kind project in Egypt."



This Month In Rotary History: Rotary in Cuba

The first Rotary club to be organized outside an English-speaking country was established in Havana, Cuba, 29 April 1916, with 22 charter members. The club was admitted to Rotary on 1 June 1916.

During 1923, the Rotary Club of Havana celebrated its seventh anniversary, in what became a very busy year. The club sponsored a carnival attended by more than 1,500 children, won a prohibition against bullfighting in Cuba, worked to get the city's water sanitized and properly purified, and obtained pavement repairs in certain areas.

By the time the RI Convention was held in Havana, 9-14 June 1940, 42 of the 48 clubs that had been chartered in Cuba were still active. Another 20 clubs would be chartered thereafter, ending with the Rotary Club of San Cristobal, on 16 October 1957.

Rotary clubs in Cuba produced four RI directors – Mario Nuñoz Mesa, 1922-23; Felix Silva Fernandez, 1936-37; Manuel Galigarcia Hernández, 1942-43; and Horacio Navarrete, 1953-54. All clubs in Cuba were terminated by 31 January 1979.
